From the Pastor

Stay with us, O Lord

God has made us for Himself, and we cannot live without Him; we need Him, we hunger and thirst for Him; He is the only One who can satisfy our hearts. St. Paul says, "If you be risen with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is sitting at the right hand of God; mind the things that are above, not the things that are upon the earth" (Col 3:1-2). Just as physical hunger is an indication of living, so the spiritual hunger is a sign of God living in us. The soul which feels no hunger for God, is a dead soul or a weakened soul.

We read in the story of the disciples at Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35), the earnest supplication to Jesus Christ, "Stay with us". It is the cry of the soul who has found its God and never again wishes to be separated from Him. God draws near our soul, makes Himself our traveling companion and lives in us. He may not reveal to us in clarity of the "face to face" vision which is reserved for eternity; we see Him only as "through a glass in a dark manner" (1 Cor 13:12). He alone can kindle in our hearts. The disciples



at Emmaus said to themselves, "Was not our hearts burning within us whilst He spoke in the way?". God always remains with us; it is for us to remain with Him. Let us therefore, beg Him ardently: teach us, O Lord, to stay with You, to live with You.



Catholic Home Missions Appeal -

PARISH HAPPENINGS

From the Parish Nurse

April became National Volunteer Month as part of President George H. W. Bush's 1000 Points of Light campaign in 1991.

"God is not unjust, He will not forget your work and the love you have shown him as you have helped his people and continue to help them." (*Hebrews 6:10*)

In the United States, volunteerism is instilled at a young age. In many parts of the country, it is the cornerstone of summer vacation or woven into afterschool programs. Most organizations in small towns, rural counties and the largest cities would not function without volunteers. In some families, the baton of volunteerism is handed down generation after generation.

Rural fire and ambulance departments remain staffed due to the efforts of volunteers. The underprivileged receive much needed medical care thanks to volunteers. Long overdue repairs and upgrades are made to a senior woman's home thanks to an organization's annual call for donations and skilled workers. A woman answers a call on a suicide hotline because she cared enough to give up a few hours to train and listen to someone desperate and alone. A team sets up tables at a soup kitchen every week. Another group delivers meals to men and women who can no longer cook for themselves. Boys and girls sell ice cream sandwiches during a fair to raise money for a homeless shelter.

Volunteers come in all shapes and sizes. They pick a cause and make a difference in someone's life. Sometimes the difference is a drop in the bucket. Other times it creates a tidal wave of change. From the anonymous volunteers who donate their resources to those whose efforts are part of larger national organizations like 4-H, Boy and Girl Scouts of America, American Red Cross, or a local grassroots group, their missions provide valuable support to communities in times of need.

Reflection

3rd Sunday of Easter

We often act out of ignorance. Armed with the best of intentions, we think we are seeing clearly and correctly, but we are not. We don't always understand the full meaning of things and only perceive part of the truth. Hence, our judgments and actions can be impaired by myopic, incomplete or erroneous perceptions. The meaning of life, understanding of human experience, and negotiating life's challenges can all become skewed without proper understanding and vision. The resurrection of Christ is the corrective to our incomplete and limited view of life. Looking at things with the eyes of faith brings a depth of clarity and understanding to how we see God, ourselves, others, and the world.

Even the disciples struggled with their limited understanding and ignorant perceptions. It was only when Jesus opened their minds to understand the Scriptures that their eyes were opened. It was their "aha" moment when everything clicked. We all want the substance of our lives to come together, make sense, and have meaning. This is easier to achieve when things are going positively, and life is good. It is when suffering, disappointment, death, hardship, and injustice enter the picture that things can become unsettled and disoriented. Our faith in the goodness and love of God is tested. We tend to shift our focus on these difficult and challenging moments and do not see them within the greater picture of how God intends life to unfold. We can gain, from the passion and resurrection of Christ, the clear vision we need in order to move away from ignorance to enlightenment.

We need our "aha" moment when everything comes together and clicks. It can come in a fleeting instant when we feel totally connected with God, where we find ourselves, others and all of creation. It is a moment when all is right and good, regardless of how difficult our journey. Our "aha" moment assures us that God is here, right with us, in us and around us bringing us a gift and blessing we can receive nowhere else: peace. In those brief sacramental encounters when we are lifted up out of ourselves and centered, we can hear God say, "peace be with you," and we feel secure. It's all okay. The resurrected Christ has the power to bring this gift to us. Some people, as they are facing their deaths, remark about this peace. When looking into the window of eternity, they experience a depth of joy and are amazed at God's goodness and closeness. We are called to be witnesses to this Good News.

St. Mary's Pastoral Council will have three vacancies in May, due to the expiring terms of current members. The primary purpose of the Council is advisory--to advise the pastor in his role of leading our parish. Though the role of the Council members is extremely important, it does not require a big commitment of time -- usually one meeting per month for approximately 60-90 minutes. Adult members of the parish can be council members if they regularly attend Mass, can commit to the monthly meetings, and have a sincere desire to help with the spiritual, social and evangelical future of the parish through all of its ministries. Effective councils are team-spirited, dedicated to the spiritual needs of the entire parish community, and welcome diverse viewpoints through collaborative discussions. **Please consider becoming a member of the Pastoral Council**--it's a wonderful way to serve the parish and shape its future. At the conclusion of ALL Masses someone will be reciting a Consecration prayer to St. Joseph out loud. A reminder of what a strong intercessor and advocate he is for us. Feel free to stop and ask questions.

Act of Consecration to St. Joseph by St. Bernardine of Siena

O my beloved St. Joseph, adopt me as thy child. Take charge of my salvation; watch over me day and night; preserve me from the occasions of sin; obtain for me purity of body. Through thy intercession with Jesus, grant me a spirit of sacrifice, humility, self-denial, burning love for Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, and a sweet and tender love for Mary, my mother. St. Joseph, be with me living, be with me dying, and obtain for me a favorable judgement from Jesus, my merciful Savior. Amen.
