News from Stewardship & Executive Leadership Teams

We are entering the budget forming process for 2026. That means that the different ministry teams are working on putting together and submitting their budget requests for the 2026 season. Below are important dates that you need to be aware of as this part of our overall ministry plan(s) are taking place.

October 29th...

is the deadline for Ministry Teams to submit their proposals for the 2026 budget.

The Church Treasurer then puts those numbers into the budget framework we use, so that we can discuss in detail any questions the Stewardship and Leadership team(s) has about the budgetary draft proposal.

Tuesday, November 11th...

the Stewardship Team will be the first group to look over and discuss the proposed draft. At this gathering, the Team will discuss, clarify, as well as change and/or approve the proposed budget. Once they come to consensus on the draft, they will move it along to the Executive Leadership Team.

Wednesday, November 12th...

the Executive Leadership Team will have their turn going over the budget draft and after discussion and dialogue, will come to consensus on modifying and/or adopting the proposed Budget for 2026.

Once the proposed Budget has been approved by consensus, we will make the Budget available to the congregation by supplying physical copies here at church as well as including them in the Thoughts and Things document(s) that Pastor Mark sends out twice a week. We want you, the congregation, to look it over and highlight areas that you may have questions about. That process will bring us to...

A Budget Hearing that is scheduled for Sunday, November 23rd...

after the morning Worship service. This will be your opportunity to ask questions that you may have about the budget as well as hear the thought behind some of the decisions that were made. From this gathering, if changes are needed, based upon the discussion, and direction from those gathered, the final proposed budget for 2026 will be finalized. Again, this finalized version of the budget will be made available to the congregation and will included in the Annual Meeting booklet.

The Annual Meeting will be Sunday, December 7th...

after the morning worship service. We will, by consensus, approve the 2026 Budget as well as affirm the Executive Leadership Team for 2026. We will be joined by the Rev. Paul Schneider, the Executive Associate Minister of Operations and Administration for the Evergreen Association of American Baptist Churches. Paul will act as a "Consensus advisor" since our new consensus model is still rather novel to us. Paul will only share if there is a question and/or some confusion over the consensus process. We are fortunate to have him be with us as a resource as we become more accustomed to Consensus making decisions.

THE VIEW FROM THE DEACONS' BENCH BY VERNON BLAIR

October 8 -12 I travelled to the deep South for my somewhat annual blues trip. I have been making this trip since 1991 annually until COVID. I decided that I wanted to do one last trip to the Mississippi Delta and urged several friends to join me. This was an eventful part of my life that I did not want to fade away; I wanted to be intentional.

Every year on the weekend before Columbus Day Indigenous Peoples' Day, Helena, Arkansas, celebrates the King Biscuit Blues Festival. I have seen wonderful performers there: B. B. King, Taj Mahal, Bonnie Raitt, Irma Thomas, Robert Cray and the list goes on and on. Over the last few years the talent level has been downgraded. This year the Festival lost funding from the National Endowment For the Arts so that they had to eliminate the Thursday night performance.

The Festival itself was disappointing. The crowd was probably about 25 per cent of the years before COVID. Previously both sides of main street was lined with food venders of two blocks with locals selling bar-b-que on the side streets. This year there were no local vendors and only three food trucks.

The Festival has been the occasion for a bunch of Louisville lawyers plus folks from other environs to hang out, eat Southern food, and enjoy music. The festival was disappointing, but the friends, music, and food all hit the spot, even though I didn't get to eat any bar-b-que.

The Biscuit group has been an important community for me – many long time close relationship. Although we have different religious values I fine a spiritual connection with this group.

The Blues arose from the cotton fields of Mississippi, as well as from the other Southern states. It is the plaintiff cry of the oppressed, the disenfranchised. Much like the Psalms, the Blues lament loss and estrangement. It has the power of honest feeling and angst, sometimes with no resolution. "The Blues ain't nothing but a good man feeling bad." The world has turned away —your lover has done you wrong, you worked all day, all year, only to be deeper in debt, Whisky and tobacco has pulled you down. The Blues are a moan of the pain of life.

The tradition is the blues at a juke joint on Saturday night; then the same singers get up on Sunday morning to worship and perhaps find the hope the answer to their Saturday night lament. When morning comes, hope arises in the music of the gospel. However, sometime the only cure for the Blues is the Blues. Sing, Moan, Weep. Wait for the sun to rise.
