First Baptist Church of Olympia Minutes of Annual Meeting

November 6th, 2019 6:30 p.m.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Pastor Mark Rambo.

The minutes from the November 7th 2018 annual meeting were read and approved.

Church Moderator, Jean Heidal, confirmed we had 74 members present and we have a quorum. Jean went on to speak about her heritage at Olympia First Baptist Church and the importance of her church family.

Pastor Dave Roberts spoke about the hard work of the Pastoral Search Committee. He thanked them for their contribution and time.

Pastor Mark asked those present "what do we want people to experience when they come to this church?" He cited James 2:13 Don't make decisions out of fear.

Rex Comstock presented the 2020 spending plan. Rex called for approval of the 2020 spending plan. It was moved, seconded and approved to accept the 2020 spending plan.

Wayne Hallmeyer presented the slate of officers for 2020. It was moved, seconded and approved to accept the 2020 slate of officers.

Hans Stoker, President of the Corporation asked that we suspend Roberts Rules, a typical approval percentage of 51% in favor of an 80% approval percentage when voting on changing regions. The motion was seconded. Ken Lewis asked to amend the motion to a 51% majority. A vote was taked and 39 present voted to approve the suspension of Roberts rules and require the 80% approval.

Vern Blair moved we withdraw from Mission NW and move to Evergreen Region. Several individual made comments about the benefits of changing region affiliation. The vote was taken. There were 67 in favor of changing to Evergreen region and 8 opposed. The motion to change region affiliation was approved by the congregation

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

And let your living spill over into thanksgiving.

Colossians 2:6—7 – The Message

I think it is safe to say that all of us are looking forward to 2020 going away. It has been a year of deep anxiety and isolation. It has been a year of death and destruction. It has been a year of social unrest, injustice, and deep pain. It's been a mess. That doesn't even include our personal challenges, demons, losses, grief, outrage, bewilderment at what has been thrust upon us. What we have been given this year, we would rather give back. But that's not what the Apostle says up above. Nope. We are reminded that we have also been given this great gift in Christ Jesus and whatever our circumstances may be, we are to **live Christ!** Faithfully! Patiently! Trusting in God's goodness and character as exemplified by God's own child, Jesus Christ. Again, we are reminded above that you and I, we, as a community, are **rooted deeply with Christ** and that we need to stop pretending that we don't know what we are to do or to be about.

You and I, WE, know what living Christ looks like: Love, forgiveness, reconciliation, grace, kindness, gentleness, self-control, etc. It's making sandwiches and sack lunches for others. This is our challenge going forward. To Live Christ! To be Deeply Rooted in Christ! To be a thanksgiving people, who recognize their strengths and weaknesses, their blind-spots, but can still remember to walk humbly, love completely, and live differently.

Year in Review – First off, you and I were blessed by the presence and leadership of Pastor Dave Roberts, who along with his wife Merletta, were a blessing to our community of faith. Covid stole our opportunity to thank the two of them properly, but we still plan to bring them back for a joy-filled Thank You, when things settle down and we can gather again in larger numbers. In the meantime, the holidays are coming up fast and furious, so it would be a kind and loving gesture to make sure to add them to your Christmas Card lists.

February 23rd, you gathered in the sanctuary for worship and then afterwards voted to call Rev. Mark Rambo as your next Senior Pastor. It was a joyful, humbling display of unity as well as an atmosphere of excitement about going forward toward a future that God was planning for us. Unfortunately, March came and with it, the beginning impact of Covid-19 and a global pandemic. March 15th was the last time we would gather collectively in the sanctuary, before measures were taken to limit the spread of the virus. Since that day, we have used the technology at our disposal and have streamed worship services and bible study live, on Facebook, as well as board and committee meetings. As we went further and further into the effects of the virus, we have been able to upgrade our technology and offer a more effective experience online. Special thanks to those who have been working and helping behind the scenes to keep all of us connected: Hans Stoker, Kathleen Rambo, Roy Spaulding, Mike Bradburn, and Alex Stoker have had a HUGE helping impact, whether filming, sound, procurement and/or set-up and direction of the technology that we have upgraded. Both the Executive Council and the Board of Trustees have seen the need and vision in all of this, not just for the immediate now, but for the future of the church as well. You can expect a few more twists and updating in the next few months.

It is hard to plan for a future, when you are in the midst of such an unprecedented time. The best we can do at the moment is to be prayerful, patient, and put the safety, health and well-being of others over our own. That's what living Christ looks like, for now. The good news is that you all have done a marvelous job of praying for one another, checking in on one another, encouraging one another, in a faithful and grace-filled manner. Yeah, you-all! We are also blessed by great church leadership. All of our boards and committees have done a really good job of connection with each other and the different responsibilities they have been entrusted with. The Executive Council, under Jean Heidal's leadership have their fingers on the pulse of the congregation and have worked hard to be supportive and forward thinking in the midst of this pandemic.

One note of concern. Again, the pandemic has challenged us in a variety of ways. I think this includes our giving. As I recently stated, giving is down 12—13% from this time last year. We are running a deficit, year-to-date, of around \$5400. We have challenged you to be prayerful, consistent, intentional, and joyful when it comes to your tithe and offerings. No guilt, not shame. Our giving is a recognition of God's presence and activity in our lives. So, again, consider what your giving, your tithe, for 2021 will be? Can you increase your tithe next year by ____%? Can you be a new tither/giver to the mission and ministry of Olympia First, in 2021?

We are looking at Re-Opening Worship, starting November 1st. We will be limited in the beginning to 50 worshippers, not including support staff. The decision by the Executive Council is conditional and based upon the latest information and statistics we have concerning the Virus in Thurston County. Guidelines for Re-Opening were included in the October Windows and will be again in November and December. We will also be sending out a letter as well, so I won't repeat the details here.

Finally, you and I are blessed by a wonderfully talented and dedicated staff. It starts with Lela DePaolo in the church office. Lela brings an organizational calm to the chaos that is my office and style. She is creative, relational and does a little spiritual guidance on the side. Gary Rogers,

our Caretaker, is an early riser, so most of us don't even see him. But he's at the church each and every morning, making sure things are clean, sanitized and ready for the day. His job also requires a bit of troubleshooting but he's pretty good at that too as well as communicating with the Trustees about needs around the church. We are also blessed to have two really, talented musicians in Darrell Born and Nick Carlson. Though we haven't been able to have a choir or in-person worship services, Darrell and Nick have worked together to pre-record a variety of music selections and options for each worship service we have streamed live! That takes a lot of team work and back and forth between the two of them. Luckily, Nick also has the technology chops to mix the final product before sending it on to me for the service. They both have been flexible during this time and we are so lucky to have them. Pastor Caroline Lehman, keeps her fingers on the pulse of the congregation. Knowing who is sick, ill, challenged, struggling and connecting with them in significant, but safe ways. She's been known to deliver a bouquet of flowers to the front doors of folks who have struggled with loss, health issues, and other challenges. She is rock solid and an immense help to me, personally.

Last word. The election hangs over us. We are a diverse congregation when it comes to theology and politics. God's Spirit, somehow, keeps us together. Whatever the outcome, we give thanks that we live in a country where the ideas and ideals we espouse are rather lofty and hard to achieve. I would encourage us to not settle on those ideals. Let's not lower the bar. If we believe that all people are created equal, then our society should work tirelessly to make it so. We, as followers of Jesus Christ, believe that each person carries within them the Imago Dei, the image of God. Created by the Creator for God's good purposes. We have an obligation to not just talk about justice, equality, and liberty but to live it out, to model it, to advocate for those whose voices are muted by the powers that be. Jesus models that throughout the gospels. The early church gave voice and status to all spectrums of society. That is our calling, regardless of election outcomes. To see the Imago Dei in each and every person and to make sure they have a voice, that they are loved, seen, recognized and welcomed!

I'm excited for what is to come, even though the path is shrouded in unknown shades!

MINISTER OF VISITATION

On the phone one day, Carolyn von Gohren asked me, "How do you do visitation in a pandemic?" Answer: "Very Carefully, with God's direction and help."

At the beginning of Covid-19 Joanna Miller was telling me on the telephone that she was making hundreds of masks for the community. I wanted to do something for the community also but my sewing machine is up a steep stair and I had a bum foot. Sewing masks was out. What could I do for the community? That was my first prayer.

My answer? At the same time that we were learning just what all this Covid-19 meant, our Farmer's Market opened. As a teen-ager, picking our raspberries and selling them to a local store, I learned that farm produce is available only now when it's ripe, not when this COVID thing would be over. Was it possible to help our community farmer's market?

My next prayer question was how do I continue to connect with the people of our church when I'm not allowed into the hospitals, health care facilities, other corporate living places and people's homes? One answer - lots of telephoning but I wanted more.

So the next prayer question was, "If I could find a way to support the Farmer's Market, how would that help me connect with all of us individually? Taking kale and spinach to peach and berry lovers might not work so well. But I did find myself occasionally taking berries, peaches, corn and cucumbers to folks along the way. Answer - FLOWERS!! So starting with daffodils, hyacynths, tulips, onto peonies, onto roses and many different summer flowers, onto gladiolas, dahlias and sunflowers each week, the flower farmer filled my shopping bag.

Third prayer question - "How will I know who will be most needing the flowers?" Answer - "Start with the single people living alone because they have no one to talk with." So I did start there but almost weekly some people not in the single, living alone category would be encountering new and hard challenges in their lives. So flowers went there also.

Along the way these months of Covid plus the smoky times have felt depressing to me. I was surprised to read in the newspaper that mental health experts think of flowers as a mild anti-depressant. How about that?

So, Whew! This is not my usual annual report. Because of my work for all of you calls for me to enter your lives so very often at life's low points, I respect and honor the need for confidentiality. My annual reports have been brief just enough to let you know - I'm out there trying to follow up with Christ's love with whomever I encounter.

But I need to tell you this story of God's direction being so very much a part of my journey with all of you. I've been surprised and delighted and have been so blessed over and over just taking flowers.

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

If I tried to describe this year my mind goes to the big wooden roller coaster in Puyallup. It starts off so easy, but things quickly go up and down and around tight curves and fear sets in, at least for me! Let's just say it is not my favorite ride and let it go at that. On February 23rd, the congregation voted by almost 90% to extend the call to Pastor Mark to be the Senior Pastor of First Baptist!

Then Covid hit and everything changed. Worship and all meetings were suspended for a time while we could make plans as to how to continue with worship, Bible Study and essential meetings. Thank you to the Trustees for their leadership in working to bring our technology into the 21st century. A special shout-out to Hans Stoker, Alex Stoker, Roy Spaulding, Kathleen Rambo and all others on the "tech team " to make this all happen for us. Also, many thanks to Darrell Born and Nick Carlson, our musicians, who have coordinated the music week by week, from different places, sometimes miles apart.

There is so much more that could be written about this year. The people who have come to work at the church in the gardens, those who continue to help with Table Grace, all of the phone calls and cards and flowers exchanged to let people know they are remembered. Maybe this "roller coaster" of a year isn't so bad after all. With the love and support of our church family we will be alright.

Since then, everything has been through Zoom, text, Facetime and the occasional drive-by check-in, socially distanced, delivery of some kind or the other.

Serving others, has evolved around Table Grace. Some have helped with the lunches, others have contributed homemade cookies. We have looked for ways to be supportive of our teachers and students. One of the Emmaus House community members, Jodi Honeysett, has been working with a small team from the Evergreen Association of American Baptist Churches, around Anti-Racism training.

Like all of us, the Emmaus House supports one another and others the best we can. We look forward to gathering in person, starting in November, in the Fellowship Hall of the church, on Saturday nights, masked and distanced.

As redundant as it sounds, with current state of our lives due to the Covid-19 pandemic, there is little to share. From January until the 15th of March, we were offering Sunday school classes, Bible study, live and in person. We prepared for the season of Lent, with an Ash Wednesday meal and worship service. We followed that up with our annual Lenten Prayer Retreat out at Camp Bethel the end of February as another layer of preparation and spiritual connectedness. We were in the midst of planning small group encounters and other spiritual/educational opportunities when everything came to a screeching halt due to the Virus.

Since March, we have met a few times, looking for ways to stay connected. Pastor Mark continued Thursday morning Bible Study, using Facebook Live as well as recording it so it could be posted on the church website. Overall, that has worked out well, though we have had the occasional "technical difficulties." Camp Bethel's summer camps were cancelled. Anything "in-person," was put on hold as we prioritized the health and safety of others. We found and have posted on the church website resources that families can access that will continue the spiritual development of their kids and the family as a whole. Finally, we encouraged members of the congregation to read one of the following books, *Surprised by Joy*, CS Lewis; *Just Mercy*, Bryan Stevenson; and *Canoeing the Mountains*, by Tod Bolsinger. We hope to form small book club gatherings in November.

The majority of the Board are also working in jobs that require a lot of attention and extra-work due to the virus. Prayers for them as well, as we look for ways to keep the congregation connected in their spiritual growth and engagement.

WOMEN'S MINISTRIES

To write a complete report I have to go back to November and December of 2019, for events that happened after our Annual Meeting last year.

In October and November, 2019, the women were collecting diapers for the Foster Care Clothes Closet coordinated by Jane Van Deventer, daughter of Rex and Julie Comstock. We invited the congregation to join us in providing diapers and we able to deliver more than 4500 diapers at the end of November! Thank you to all in the congregation who gave diapers, or cash so that they could be purchased! It was amazing to see all that we were able to provide.

December was our Annual Christmas Brunch, again a sell-out. We were entertained and challenged and had the opportunity to fellowship with many women from our church and community! The Cookie Room was very popular with almost all of the cookies sold out. After all the bills were paid we profited \$2600 for our missions and ministries.

We have used these monies to support Camp Bethel, Mylinda Baits, Sarah Jean Matos, our White Cross quotas, and local ministries.

At our February meeting we made fleece tie blankets for the Foster Care Clothes Closet. Janice Holcomb did all the prep work on the fleece blankets so we were able to do the tying of the two sides together and Eva Davis made a number of soft, satin edged baby blankets. The blankets were displayed in church on a Sunday morning and "blessed" before being given to the Clothes Closet.

Even though our meeting times have ended for now, the women have continued to serve the church and community. One of the most significant ways was to help with the making of 10,033 masks for Wheaton College, a project presented to us by Sarah Jean Matos. I do not have a count as to how many masks our women made, but I know it was a significant number. Thank you to all who participated in this project.

This summer we hosted a "drive through Wedding Shower" for Sarah Jean and Luis Matos! It was a new experience for everyone, but seemed to be a well received event. We celebrated Sarah and Luis' marriage and got to "safe distance" and "mask visit" with friends from the congregation.

Despite Covid, we have continued to keep in touch with each other, reach out to those in need and remember the women we have lost this year. As always, thank you for your support of Women's Ministries!

MISSION BOARD

The Mission Department promoted local and global mission as we seek to be the hands and feet of Christ.

We have worked to keep you up to date about the missions and ministries we support. Just recently we have been able to share mission moments during Sunday worship with video resources from International Ministries and our American Baptist partners. Sarah Jean Nash-Matos' ministry in Bolivia has been affected by covid and political unrest, and she was forced to return to Olympia for the time being. Sarah stays in touch with ministry partners via technology, encouraging them and the ministry of House of Hope. She also continues to work on curriculum for a program for vulnerable and underserved girls. The program provides tutoring, discipleship, and empowerment, encouraging the girls to be who God created them to be. These clubs help prevent human trafficking, abuse, and pre-adolescent pregnancies.

Sarah Jean's 16-month mission journey has been a roller-coaster, with all the excitement, but little of the fun. However, she has remained faithful to the call, and we are blessed to have her and Luis with us for this time, living at Emmaus House and sharing our community. Luis continues to work, continue his college studies, and learn Spanish to prepare for life and ministry in Bolivia. Luis and Sarah's wedding in July was a joyful celebration, proving that Baptists do indeed dance, and that parking lots can be beautiful.

I'm sure the ABW report will mention the win-win that was the 10,000 mask project. ABW continues to faithfully and generously support mission and ministry around the world.

*Mylinda Baits was giving trainings in Cuba in March, working with ministry leaders and using expressive arts tools for trauma, grief recovery and community building when covid was blowing up.

Mylinda was lovingly nagged by her grown children to cut her trip short and get home. Thankfully, she did. Mylinda stays in touch with Cuban ministry leaders as they continue to use art practices like drawing, movement, storytelling, and music-making to heal, serve, and build community

The Cuban Baptists are resourceful and resilient, and Mylinda misses people like Ernesto and Marisol, though they all stay in touch with the help of technology. Sadly, Mylinda has not been able to travel for her ministry.

It's been frustrating for Mylinda not to travel and see her ministry partners in person. However, she has been able to spend more time in town, and has been facilitating an Expressive Arts in Transition Group via zoom with a group of women that came out of a pilot group that began Panorama Retirement Community. The group has created a close community as they find artistic ways to share their stories, grieve their losses, and discover how to stay connected during the pandemic.

The Williams family has been serving in Thailand (for about a year now). The Williams are training and supporting Southeast Asian leaders to build bridges across tribal lines in the Mekong region of Thailand. Together they are combating human trafficking which affects so many ethnic minorities

CAMP BETHEL

Our spending plan supports the ministry of Camp Bethel, and several volunteers from Oly First and Emmaus House have done a tremendous amount of work to improve the camp and maintain it. Due to the pandemic, summer camps were offered virtually.

REGION LIFE

Since voting to become a member of the Evergreen Baptist Association at the annual meeting in November of 2019, we have been welcomed by the association. Executive Minister Doug Avilesbernal was helpful in our process of calling Mark as our senior pastor, and has continued to consult with us during the transition. Pastor Mark enjoys the support of ministry colleagues, meeting regularly with a group of Evergreen pastors. Vern Blair and Jodi Honeyset are participating in an online Anti-Racism Network group facilitated by Evergreen leaders. We are scheduled to use our gifts of hospitality by hosting next fall's Evergreen annual gathering.

TABLE GRACE and DEBUT OF THE ART SPACE

Table Grace continues to faithfully serve meals every Sunday afternoon. Please pray for our guests and our serving teams, and please consider volunteering. I'm afraid to list the volunteers because I know I will forget someone. Thanks for all you do.

A group of creative, determined women worked to create an open art space in the Emmaus House basement for Table Grace guests. Six to ten guests were showing up regularly to work on mosaics, painting, and handcrafts, before enjoying the meal across the parking lot. Thanks to all members of the Mission Department for their faithful work and prayers.

TABLE GRACE Freda Spaulding

Because of the Covid-19 pandemic we have returned to making sandwiches to hand out to our needy. We started our Feeding Ministry 28 years ago by handing out sandwiches.

From March 15th through October 4th we have handed out 6,601 lunches—an average of 220 a Sunday. If we have left-overs, we share them with First Christian Church and the Salvation Army.

We couldn't do this without the help of all the volunteers from our church and other area churches. These people make sandwiches, pack lunches and hand out lunches and personal items

We thank all of you wonderful cookie bakers, and Dorothy who provides items from the Nancy Room. These items are necessities for many of our guests.

We are blessed by the volunteers who pick up donation from Safeway, Panera and Target.

And Thank you church members for the use of the church facilities and for your prayer and support.

THE NANCY ROOM

The Nancy Room is cherished both by those who serve and those who benefit from it. It operates exclusively through the generosity of donations from church members, others, and by retail establishments such as Target. Other retailers such as Panera Bread and Safeway donate perishable goods. We also get toiletries from AAA under their Soap for Hope Program. Due to less travel this year, we may receive a smaller quantity of items.

The Nancy Room has typically been open all but the first Sunday of the month from 4 p.m. until 5:15 p.m. at the same time the Table Grace meal is served. Workers consist of an order taker, "runners" (order fillers) and backroom personnel, such as re-stockers. A Board displays available items in categories such as food, personal, household, pets, and babies/children. Due to the pandemic the room has largely been closed since March. Details about the room's current use are set forth below.

Typically the shelves are currently restocked on Mondays or Thursdays. This includes refilling plastic bottles with such items as dish soap, laundry detergent, fabric softener, and hand wash. Items such as baby wipes and dryer sheets are bagged, and toilet paper piles are replenished. Food and toiletries are also restocked from backstock.

Items are most frequently received Thursdays from Target. (Occasionally, they are delivered on Friday or Saturday.) They are sorted and organized. Expiration dates are marked on food items. From these items a whiteboard is marked with available items from which people may request needed items. Again these procedures have changed due to the pandemic and are outlined below.

Previously on Sundays, workers usually assembled between 3 and 3:30 p.m. Working with the homeless and working poor is life-affirming and life-transforming. One is likely to find that those who are served by the Nancy Room are polite and grateful. Exceptions are rare.

A whiteboard on the wall is located outside the Nancy Room. A container is located below the sign for people to drop off donations. The whiteboard itself is updated regularly with a list of needed items for those wishing to donate. In addition, anyone with unused blankets, sleeping bags, tents, coats, gloves, socks, umbrellas, or toys may drop them off. They are so welcome to protect our guests from the elements in fall and winter, and to give joy to the homeless community children. Always needed are 8 – and 12 oz empty plastic bottles with lids.

This year, the pandemic has caused special issues for the Nancy Room as it has for everyone. We have been closed on Sundays since March. Nevertheless, we still process donations during the week, and prepare a minimum of two large "grab boxes" for the guests who receive the sack lunches prepared by Table Grace on Sundays. One consists of various food items, including coffee and tea. The other box consists of personal, household, and pet items. Pet food is bagged and separately made available for distribution to the Sunday guests. We appreciate the opportunity to serve, and appreciate those who contribute to the mission of the Nancy Room, either through service, donations, or prayers. For those looking to donate a new item, the Dollar Tree is an excellent and affordable resource for household goods, socks, gloves, toys and personal household items. Cover memo for First Baptist Church of Olympia Spending Plan for 2021

Greetings fellow congregants of First Baptist Church.

As we gratefully begin the closeout of 2020 and prepare for 2021, remarkably little has changed in our spending plan during this tumultuous 2020.

That said, here is a summary of the significant changes in the 2021 spending plan compared to the 2020 plan:

- The Executive Council budget for Transition/Renewal is \$4,000. This is reduced from \$10,000 in 2020 which allowed for travel and moving costs for a new senior pastor. Fortunately we have Pastor Mark now as the Senior Pastor. While we don't have moving expenses we still want to have a proper installation of Pastor Mark and celebration when we get past the pandemic. This line item funds that.
- A part-time pastoral position is being maintained as an item in the budget. When and how this position will be filled will be determined by appropriate committees and boards respecting our actual income.
- All salaries have been kept the same from 2020.
- Minor increases in Worship & Service as well as Administration.

Overall the 2021 spending plan represents a decrease of \$4,577 compared to 2020. Please maintain your steadfast faith that most church budgets are "aspirational". As we have always done in the past, we manage our <u>actual</u> spending to what we have actually available during the year. Some line items are place holders, not certain if they will actually be needed or not.

I am grateful, during these trying times that we can produce a spending plan that we can all agree with. It's very stable compared to last year.

We all need to continue our faith in the collective wisdom of the Trustees to guide us as they have always done before.
