The interim pastor's Thoughts Along The WAY ...

I've been thinking about the word "new". I suppose this is the season for it, given the New Year and all. But my thoughts, while including the new year, begin with the Christmas story.

Even though the retailers are getting close, they still haven't reached back into the year far enough for a nine month pregnancy. And while we focus on a four week Advent season in preparation for Christmas, Mary and Joseph had far more time to get their minds around the coming birth.

I assume you've learned something of the societal norms that were in play for Mary and Joseph. Pregnant outside of marriage often led to stoning the woman to death. The gospel of Matthew says that Joseph planned to break off the relationship, perhaps hoping for a lesser penalty for Mary.

What was the foundation for transformation, to use Doug Avilesbernal's words, that allowed these two people to wrap their minds around

something so "new"? I assume this pregnancy was not part of their plans.

Angels? Dreams? Visions? And probably not something

they were anxious to consult about with the local rabbi.

Something new was afoot, and they were willing to be a part of it. I hardly think they could see the end from the beginning. They didn't know how it was all going to turn out.

And then Jesus is born. If the parents had any glimmer of Jesus' eventual high calling, giving birth in a barn probably didn't fit neatly into their imaginative construction of how things would be. But then, would they have imagined shepherds suddenly appearing talking about having seen and heard angels?

They may have been further blown away by the words of Simeon and Anna when they went to present Jesus at the temple per the law of Moses. (Luke 2:22–38)

All of these things crowding in on Mary and Joseph, confronted with something new every day it would seem. What was their foundation for transformation? I'm guessing it was something more than a New Year's resolution or two.

All new things have strings going back to something old. Sometimes we don't recognize the strings. One of our granddaughters loves books and loves going to the library. Merletta found a mug to give to her for Christmas the outside of which is printed with a library checkout card form.

We think it's a great gift even though our daughter reminded us that Leah has never seen an actual library checkout card. In her experience checking a book out is done with computers, bar codes, scanners and printers. But the string of history goes back to something written down connecting you to that

book.

Likewise, our foundation for transformation that allows us to move into something new is built on

previous experience, our understanding of how things "are", and the way we think about the future.


