Yet, in spite of our humble beginnings and God's intention and want for us to live in the fullness of God's love, and relational mutuality, God's story with us becomes broken and the reality of sin, suffering, pain and death enter. Now dust takes on a different feel, a different emphasis. It's that annoying side of my life. The things, behaviors, impulses, attitudes that seek to hide in corners and under the furniture/carpet. The dust is my brokenness that lands in so many different places, some that even makes one exclaim, "how did it get there?"

Again, for me, part of my journey during Lent is to acknowledge this side of "dust." To look at myself and the world around me, for what it is: A Hot Mess. Once I can own that, acknowledge that within myself, then I can identify with suffering that happens around me. I can become more empathetic to those who experience suffering and injustice much, much more than I ever will or know. That too is what Lent offers us. The other side of being dust.

We hold both of these truths in tension with one another. Dust as the material God uses to make us in God's own image and dust that reflects our brokenness and how we try to ignore it and/or hide it – from ourselves and others, including God.

Good news? We are not alone on this journey. We follow the One, the Beloved One, who came up out of the waters and heard the voice of the Creator:

#### You are my Child, chosen and marked by my love, pride of my life!

Who then is driven, by the Spirit, into the wilderness. Who for the next 40 plus days, will ask us to follow; to deal with this tension of being dust – to deal with our re-created image and our brokenness – that gives us hope and distress – good news and grace.

We have Jesus and we have one another.

You are dust, re-created in the image of God. Go in peace.

#### Water and Spirit – Devotions for Lent – 2023
