Baptist Distinctives – A Refresher Course

I was spending some time last month with a friend, who reflected back to me something I had said to him once before. In talking about what we as a church "believe," I had responded with:

#### **EVERYTHING**

Baptists to be precise.

What does that mean, exactly? For me, the image that I like to use is equating God's Kindom to a circus tent. This means that God's Kindom is pretty big, pretty deep, and pretty wide, with Christ as our centering pole. Christ is what holds us up and binds us together. That means you will find churches across the spectrum of belief and practice. From immovable fundamentalists to woke liberals or whatever you consider to be the two extremes, and everything inbetween. All of these churches, despite these differences, also subscribe to this:

#### Love God and Love others. Also known as the Great Commandment.

### Love the Lord your God with all of your heart, soul, mind & strength & love your neighbor as yourself.

Since a number of folks in our current congregation did not grow up in an American Baptist church, our diversity of thought & theology as well as how we balance the unity and freedom we all have in Christ, might seem strange, peculiar, or down right crazy.

Autonomy of the Local Church - The local church is an independent body accountable to Jesus Christ, the head of the church. All human authority for governing the local church resides within the local church itself. Cont. pa 2...

Lord God, Maker of heaven and earth, the sea and everything in them-You remain faithful forever. On this day when we celebrate our freedoms, we remember those in different circumstances. Set prisoners free, give sight to the blind, lift up those who are bowed down, wherever they are, whatever language they speak, whatever nationality they claim, that they too may soon possess the kinds of benefits we enjoy today.



### The Thin Place: Where the Ordinary and Sacred Collide

I'm sure I was being a tad ornery and flip, but I was also serious at the same time. I think that our congregation, like many faith communities, have a wide spectrum of ideas, beliefs, values and the like, within whatever faith tradition they represent. Pick a social issue or cultural hot button and I can guarantee that you will find a variety of opinions and beliefs on the subject within the congregation. Theological issues like women in ministry, leadership roles, biblical inerrancy, or something easier, like the nature of God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit, will also find a wide swath of "beliefs," opinions and so-on. Some of those supported by the Bible, both for and/or against, others by personal experiences, and for those who struggle articulating what they truly believe, "because that's how I feel." When I am asked if we are an evangelical congregation, my answer is, yes, in some ways. Are we progressive in our theology? Yep, again, in some ways. We have folks who feel strongly about a wide-variety of topics, issues, and/or theological beliefs and systems. We are Baptists, after all; American

#### *Here are 4 Distinctives that make Baptists, well, Baptists:*

Thus, the church is autonomous, or self-governing. No religious hierarchy outside the local church may dictate a church's beliefs or practices. Autonomy does not mean isolation. A Baptist church may fellowship with other churches around mutual interests and in an associational framework. For instance, we are in a Regional/Association relationship with the Evergreen Association of American Baptist Churches. We are in "association," with Evergreen because we share similar values around missions and ministry. Evergreen does not dictate how we do ministry or what areas of missions we choose to engage in. They do provide us with resources, support and relational encouragement, but they do not tell us what to do or how to think. We are autonomous!

Individual Soul Liberty/Freedom - Every individual, whether a believer or an unbeliever, has the liberty/freedom to choose what they believe is right in the religious/spiritual aspect of their life. Individuals have a God-given competency to know God and God's will. God, who is sovereign over all creation, has provided this freedom. This competency or ability, is a gift from God and not a human creation. You and I, therefore, are free to make choices; we are not puppets. God does not force or coerce compliance; neither faith nor love can be forced. With this liberty and freedom comes responsibility and accountability. Choices have consequences. In exercising soul freedom, a person should seek insight from members of the faith community, both present and past that they have chosen to be a part of. The individual is still responsible for their choices, but the community plays a role in discerning those choices.

It is also important to remember that soul liberty means that governments and religious organizations ought not force persons to belong to any particular church, confess any specific creed or conform to any form of worship.

Priesthood of All Believers - "Priest" is defined as one authorized to perform the sacred rites of a religion, especially as the designated intercessor between humans and God. Every believer today is a priest of God (part of the priesthood) and may enter into God's presence in prayer directly through our Great High Priest, Jesus Christ. No other mediator is needed between God and people. As priests, we can study God's Word, pray for others, and offer spiritual worship to God. We all have equal access to God-whether we are a preacher or not, ordained or not, etc.

Separation of Church and State - God established both the church and the civil government, and gave each its own distinct sphere of operation. Having grown up in an American Baptist church I was taught that the government's purposes are outlined in Romans 13:1-7 and the church's in Matthew 28:19-20. Neither should control the other, nor should there be an alliance between the two. Christians in a free society can properly influence government towards righteousness (right relationships) & justice, which is not the same as a denomination or group of churches controlling the government. We worship the Living God, not a particular form of government and/or the nation we live in.

In addition to these four distinctives, as American Baptists, we observe and practice two ordinances or for those of you who grew up Catholic, sacraments:

The Lord's Supper/Communion and Believers Baptism (By Immersion).

The Lord's Supper symbolizes and reminds us of the sacrifice of Christ. The bread and cup represent the broken body and the shedding of blood offered, freely by Christ, that reflects God's great love for us.

Believer's Baptism means that we offer baptism to those who show the maturity to understand its profound significance – resurrection to new life in Christ.
