Pastor Dave's Ponderings

The interim pastor's Thoughts Along
The WAY ...

It's been a month already since Merletta and I attended the ABCUSA biennial gathering. It was a good time, with helpful learning opportunities, catching up with friends, and challenging, inspiring worship experiences.

I periodically reflect on a phenomenon that I suspect you've also experienced. In this case we were in a group of American Baptists, all members of the same "club" so to speak, and yet it was much easier to talk to, sit with, travel with people from Washington that we already knew.

Do you find it easier to sit with people you already know rather than with "new" people?

A couple of times we deliberately sat at a table for a meal with people we didn't know. We made some new acquaintances. However, if the people new to us knew other people at the table, our conversation with them was sporadic. They more frequently turned to their prior friends.

We generally take the easier way. It's easier to pick up the relational threads we already have with another person than it is to find what threads we may have in common with a person new to us.

Excluding or ignoring someone is easy. You just turn your back on them, literally or figuratively. Then you don't have to think about them any more.

Including someone is more complicated. It takes a great deal of thinking and listening when we take into consideration their experience, history, feelings, and so forth.

If I'm to include someone new into my system of relational connections it means that I will have to adjust, change and rearrange some things. At the very least I'll have to add to my (pick one) card file, directory, Rol-a-Dex, contact list.

If we agree that welcoming someone new into the group/family/church means change—who does the changing?

Since we're the established group/church, do we expect the new person to do all the changing?

I've heard people say in various ways, "It sure would be good if we could get some younger people to join the church."

So we'd like to attract younger people. Diving deeper into that question, does it mean:

What can we do to the young people to make them more like us?

How can we do what we do better so they will come?

Do we expect them to change in order to fit in with us? What changes are we willing to make?

It's one thing to welcome someone to worship. To really include them is to allow them to express themselves in a manner comfortable for them.

In order to understand and live into this unsettling idea of inclusion, we need to understand grace. Only by the grace of God can we have the openness required to extend ourselves to listen and understand another's point of view with which we might disagree.

Only by the grace of God can we have the patience to work through our differences.
