Guide for Respectful Conversations & Differences

Every Sunday, at the close of worship, the benediction includes the following:

Walk Humbly! Love Completely! Live Differently!

Those are more than words. They are more than words we could put on a bumper sticker. Those word summarize the call that Jesus places on us, each and every day that we draw breath. They are words that require action and intention on our part! We live in a world and a time where the culture and society around us struggle with humility, love, kindness. If ever there was a time for us to live differently, as Christians, now is such a time. One very practical way is in how we interact with one another in our conversations and discussions, especially when we have differences of opinion and strongly held positions.

With that in mind, Church Leadership has tapped into some of the tools that our new region, Evergreen Association of Baptist, has been using throughout their organizational life together. We have taken some of their components and incorporated it with our own ministry context as well as our understanding of scripture. What you have is a simple, straightforward brochure that will serve as a:

Guide for Respectful Conversations and Differences

This is not policy. This is not a passive-aggressive way to say that there are problems within the congregation. This is our way of saying, let us be mindful about how we talk to one another in board and committee meetings. Let us deal with our differences in a respectful and kind manner. When we come together as a congregation to make decisions, we do so in the spirit of Christ and we do it with humility and love.

We think the world is watching. Let us show the world, show ourselves, that the way of Christ and how we deal with differences and talk to one another is indeed different from what is being modeled in our world today.

Here are the options for you to consider:

Canoeing the Mountains by Tod Bolsinger

This is a book that Roger von Gohren was promoting for a small group study before the pandemic. This is a book on church leadership but one that any church member could benefit from. It can give one insight into the challenge leaders and leadership teams face from the "way we've always done it," to new ways of being "church."

Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption by Bryan Stevenson

This a book that's timely as issues around a broken justice system, mass incarcerations and racial injustice are under our societal microscope. Just Mercy is a part of the author's story and experience as a lawyer and advocate for those caught in the web of poverty and injustice. Stevenson is also a Christian. A devoted follower of Christ. His story, this story, is an important one for us to read.

Surprised by Joy: The Shape of My Early Life by C.S. Lewis

This is a spiritual memoir, in which Lewis recounts his early life and eventual conversion to Christianity. As Lewis recounts his lifelong search for joy, he demonstrates its role in guiding him to find God.

Those are your choices. Pick one, find the book and start reading at you own pace. You have the whole month of August! Our hope is that in September, we will have opportunities to have some small group gatherings to talk about our book choice and share the ways it encouraged us and/or stretched us in regards to our spiritual journey and faith.
