

In November, we will celebrate our 150th Anniversary as a faith community, the Olympia First Baptist Church. It is a long, cherished and distinguished history. As the current Pastor, in a long-line of Pastors, the twist, or challenge, for me, is that as we look back at our history in this present moment, we stand at a crossroads where the future is in sight but the details are yet to be determined. We wrestle with questions around who we want to be, what are our essential values as well as what we wish those who come to our church, experience when they are here?

I've spent a lot of time during the pandemic, praying, listening and pondering what the future might hold for us as well as what it might look like. I am working with the Deacons to provide some time together where we can pray for one another as well as discussing/answering some of those questions above. For instance, I am meeting with Pat DeNeui's deacon group, on Sunday afternoon, August 8th, 2:00 at Pat's house. As we move forward into this unseen, unknown, we call the future, we realize that there will be changes along the way. Not necessarily big changes, but perhaps smaller and still impactful as we discern God's Spirit and direction. I look forward to hearing from you as we find opportunities for prayer and dialogue.

The other avenue I want us to explore as we move into our unknown future is to talk a bit about culture, specifically, the culture of our church community. 150 years is a long time to develop a "this is the way we do things," attitude, that is often unspoken. Our mission and vision determine the **what** and the **why** of what we do. Our culture reflects how we as an organization **feels** and **behaves**. And for better or worse, culture can trump one's mission and vision. The challenge isn't necessarily what you believe, as an organization/church, it's how you behave. Again, it doesn't mean sweeping change(s) but it does require taking an honest look at how we are structured, our decision-making processes, etc., that leads us to the ultimate question: does our actions – how we do things – line up with our beliefs, our mission, our vision and purpose for being the church of Jesus Christ on the corner of Washington and 9th?

The good news is that I don't think there is a huge gap between our actions and our beliefs. It's more about being aware of those differences, then being flexible and adaptable, when we can recognize, name and then hopefully, change those discrepancies/differences.

Like I have said, there is much to talk about, to share and ponder. It doesn't require 100% agreement, or an official "vote." It's about, for me, taking designated moments to stop, look, listen and then make whatever adjustments we need to make as we continue to move forward into God's future for us as a congregation.

Looking forward to the conversations!



Stewardship

Our giving continues to be an up and down endeavor. Our overall giving is going up slightly every month but still well short of our monthly giving targets. The good news is that our spending has been limited as well and we are taking in more than we are sending out! And while we have money in the bank, we are also looking at some building improvements that will stretch us. But then, when isn't life a challenge?

Currently, as of July 1st, 2021 we have received \$133,288.41, in income.

We have spent \$128,716, our expenditures, year-to-date.

Year-To-Date, we are \$4573.26, income over expenses.

Yeah Team First Baptist!

Overall—Total Church Funds, we are at \$219,916, in the Bank!

August also begins our Spending Plan/Budget Building Process. Under the guidance and leadership of the Board of Trustees, our Boards and Committees will begin the prayerful discernment of what they will need to carry out the different aspects of the mission and ministry of Olympia First Baptist that they are responsible for. It is a process that requires prayer, patience, listening, discernment, a bit of risk and a whole lot of faith. Trying to discern what people may or may not give in tithes and offerings is challenging. But try we must as we attempt to build a budget that is grounded in reality but with enough built-in challenges to remind us that faith is part of the process as well.

This is I know: God is Faithful...All the Time! We, as the people of God, do our best to be faithful to God, in return. We do our best to be Faithful, Consistent, and Joyful in our giving! I hope you will be in prayer for those involved in our budget-building process. I hope you will be prayerful and begin to discern what God would have you give in the form of tithes and offerings, in 2022, toward the mission and ministry of Olympia First Baptist.

Spiritual Formation & Discipleship

One of my main emphasis as Pastor surrounds our formation as the people of God. Our spiritual development doesn't end after we stop going to Sunday school. Discipleship is an ongoing, never stopping process that lasts as long as we do. The past month, during my sermons, I've emphasized two different spiritual exercises that I'd like for you to consider. The first is:

Choose 5 Jesus stories from the Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke, & John) that exemplify for you, what it means to be a follower of Christ and guides your life where it needs to be. This is an exercise I learned from one of my mentor's, Dr. William Herzog II, who was my New Testament Professor in Seminary. It's harder than you might think. One of the benefits is that it helps you clarify what are your essential values, and/or faith practices, etc., as a follower of Christ.

As an example, here is my "Gospel According to Pastor Mark":

Jesus Heals a Paralytic – Mark 2:1—12

Love for Enemies – Matthew 5:43–48

The Rejection of Jesus at Nazareth - Luke 4:16-30

A New Commandment - John 13:31-35

The Walk to Emmaus - Luke 24:13-35

I have had a handful of people who have shared their "gospels" with me. I'd love to hear from more of you.

The second exercise centers around the simple, but profound question of:

What is God Like?

Rachel Held Evans wrote about faith, doubt and life in the Bible Belt. She called eastern Tennessee, home. Rachel died suddenly and unexpectantly in 2019. She was near the completion of a children's storybook when she became ill and died. Family friend Matthew Paul Turner finished her project along with illustrator, Ying Hui Tan.

The book is:

What is God Like?



A Brief History of Festus Campbell (1822-1910)





Vernon Blair and I have been participating in the Evergreen Anti-racism Network twice a month for over a year. One of the assignments we had was to look at the history of our church and its relationship to communities of color. Vern looked over and compiled the relevant history for the assignment and when he was doing that, he came across this paragraph:

"Festus Campbell was a member of the church. He had been a slave but somehow been able to get schooling and when he became a member of First Baptist he was a well-educated man. In 1879 he became a pastor for one month."

In Vern's summary of our history he noted, "There's a story in there that I would like to know."

So I did a little digging, and found out the following about Festus Campbell.

Festus Campbell was born a slave in Louisiana in 1822. In 1849 he escaped to Pittsfield, Massachusetts where he became servant to Dr. Robert Campbell where he assumed Dr. Campbell's last name. Throughout his life Festus Campbell travelled across Europe, and the Holy Land as a valet to a judge, and other prominent men. In 1906 he donated ancient relics he gathered on his travels to the Berkshire Museum. He mastered French, Spanish and Italian. He opened multiple restaurants, in-

Olympia Sweet Potatoes.

At R. A. Weston's Farmers Exchange, on Main street near Seventh, will be seen samples of some excellent sweet potatoes grown by Festus Campbell, at his place near the capitol grounds. They are probably the first to be grown in this city.

Morning Olympian, 29 October 1893

vested in real estate in Pittsfield, MA, operated a successful greenhouse and became an ordained Baptist minister.

In the 1860's Festus Campbell hired a woman named Mary Quincy to manage one of his restaurants. The two became close friends, and when Festus's businesses began to decline in Massachusetts, Mary was hired to work at the

Pacific House Hotel and so they relocated to Olympia, Washington. Festus and Mary lived together in Olympia platonically the rest of their lives. Mary worked as a cook and Festus applied his extensive knowledge of horticulture to grow flowers,

Olympia First Baptist Church Presents: Repurposing Youth Ministry in conjunction with Emmaus House

As some of you may know, we are repurposing the Youth Ministry approach here at Olympia First Baptist. The last few years we have had a down-tick in the numbers and availability of youth and their schedules to have a traditional youth ministry program. We have focused on more one-on-one mentoring relationships. And then there was Covid-19.

However, Covid did allow us to do some praying, planning and putting a team together that were committed to ministry with young people here at Oly First and Emmaus House. Currently we have 14 youth who are in Middle School and High School.

Our Youth Ministry team is comprised of Gary Baits, Pat DeNeui, Jodi Honeysett, Ricky and Carrie Bowman. In addition, we have one 20-something adult who is discerning their role with this team.

We started the kick-off of our new approach to Youth Ministry for the Summer in June. Now we continue with the schedule in August etc.

Below is what the schedule looks like, with a few, brief, explanations:

August 7th – Emmaus House – 6:00 p.m. – No youth Group Gathering August 14th – Emmaus House and Youth Group Gathering – 5:30 p.m. – Food

August 21st – No Emmaus House – No youth Group Gathering Clambake at the Honeysett's – More details to come!

August 28th – Emmaus House and Youth Group Gathering – 5:30 p.m. – Food September 4th – No Emmaus House or Youth Group Gathering September 3rd – 6th – Family Camp @ Camp Bethel

I hope you will be in prayer for this restart to an important ministry.

We hope that if you have any questions that you can talk to Pastor Mark, Gary, Jodi, Pat, etc.

This is a ministry in process. It will take patience, prayer and holding our plans lightly as we build trust with the youth and their families.

fruits and vegetables for sale and to help others with their gardens. He won a medal for his produce at the Seattle Alaska Yukon Pacific Exposition World Fair in 1909. During his time in Olympia, Festus also became an interim pastor at the Olympia First Baptist Church in 1879. Festus Campbell and Mary Quincy are buried in the Masonic Memorial Park Cemetery in Tumwater.

While these are just a list of events and interests that make up one man's life, it is more than enough to spark my imagination and wonder what sermons Festus Campbell might preach today. What was his message 142 years ago? I wonder how he was received when he stepped into his role, and I wonder how we would receive someone with a similar background today. Just one month of our church's history that has captured my imagination!

A YOUTH MINISTRY UPRISING, MY COUSIN VINNY,

AND WHAT WOULD YOU DO WITH \$20?

There are young people among us! While it has been hard to notice during the pandemic, Oly FBC and Emmaus House are blessed with the presence of more and more young people (middle schoolers and high schoolers).

This is a glorious uprising! I, (Gary Baits), along with supportive youth parents like Jodi Honeysett and Amanda Mackison, as well as other caring adults like Pat DeNeui, Carrie and Ricky Bowman, Mylinda Baits, and of course, Pastor Mark, have teamed up with the young people themselves to create an ongoing youth ministry, with the following values:

Middle Schoolers and High Schoolers coming together,

Welcomed and welcoming
Building community, exploring faith,
Sharing the journey with Jesus
To be servant leaders in a hurting world.



We've offered youth activities on a regular basis since March. The focus of these events has been getting to know one another, conversing about the life of faith and discipleship, and sharing our hopes and dreams for what such a group could be and do.

We talked around the swimming pool about Jesus' feeding of the 5,000, focusing on his challenge to his disciples, "you give them something to eat." We talked about favorite snacks or beverages, and how many of them we could get with \$20. Then we watched on of the One Great Hour of Sharing Offering videos about water projects. Then I asked, "Who wants \$20?" They were surprised. But these teens are also smart enough to know that there was a catch. The catch was, "here is 20 dollars, do something this summer to make a difference in the world." Or, as the Jesus story challenges us, "what are you going to do with your five loaves and two fish?"

In the coming weeks, you will be hearing some stories about what these young people did with their \$20. (By the way, have you thought of what you might do with an unexpected twenty dollars?) As jazzed as I am about what these youths have done or will do with twenty dollars, I'm more excited to see how they employ their multiple gifts and passion as followers of Jesus to be servant leaders.

By the way, this group has a name. They are YUTS. No, that's not a typo. Here is the backstory. From time to time, Pastor Mark and others have lovingly referred to young people as *Yutes*.

It's a reference from the 1992 movie, *My Cousin Vinny* (worth watching, by the way). In the movie, two young men are falsely accused of a murder, and are defended in court by their cousin Vinny, a brash New Yorker with a strong accent. That accent means that his reference to "these two youth," comes across as "these two yutes." So, out of YUTES, I created the following ACROSTIC:

Young -Unique-Travelers-Exploring-Servant-Leadership

They mostly liked it, but decided to tweak it, deciding they wanted to do more than explore servant-leadership. 
