The Thin Place: Where the Ordinary and Sacred Collide

Change. According to Webster's, *change*, used as a verb, means to make something (or someone) different; to alter or modify. Used as a noun, change means the act or instance of making or becoming different. Given this rather generic definition, the gospel of Jesus Christ is about change, being changed, if you will. From the false self to one's True Self. From a life of separation and death to new life filled with hope, light, and grace. In Christ, we believe, change is not only possible, it is inevitable. Yet, we struggle with the ideas and actions that lead to change. What an interesting and challenging conundrum we face as followers of this change agent, Jesus Christ.

The Evergreen Baptist Association, our American Baptist Regional affiliation/partner, gathered in Denver, Colorado for its Annual Meeting, October 13th—15th. It was my pleasure to represent you and participate with our brothers and sisters from other congregations from Alaska, Washington, Utah, and California. Our theme was:

Navigating Changing Times: Responding Together

For I the Lord do not change; therefore you,
O children of Jacob, have not perished.

Malachi 3:6

What a timely and relevant theme and a scripture that comforts and challenges us! I think we can all agree that we live in a time that is changing rapidly (or so it seems). Culturally, politically, spiritually, etc., things are not the way they were and/or the way we remember them being. We are still in the throes of a global pandemic, that is waning, but most likely, will never be completely gone. Politically, we are fractured, suspicious, and cynical. Culturally, we long for the good old days, while struggling to remember that the "good old days," were not so good for all people groups, and in fact, had its own set of problems, dysfunction and the like. Spiritually, the church of Jesus Christ has a lot of repair work to do. We have confused service with power. We have taken good news to be for some but not for

others. We have wounded each other and those we claim that God loves, who are on the outside looking in and not finding it very appealing. Change, it seems, is needed. Change it seems, is necessary. Change it seems, is even, on some level, desired. Yet, change causes us anxiety,

discomfort and a bit of angst.

Change is hard.

The good news, from my perspective and time with our Evergreen family, is that I/we, are not alone. We have each other. We have this wonderful, diverse tapestry of perspectives, stories, experiences that have the power to carry us through the sea of change we find ourselves in the midst of as well as the change that must be taken to make us communities of hope, good news and light. We can respond to the challenges before us, in all of their complexity, messiness, and/or madness, together. Prayerfully. Faithfully. And even, Joyfully.

The X-factor is that we are loved, carried, sustained by a God whose character never changes. God is dynamic and alive. That means that God is not static and never changes. There are stories in scripture of God changing God's mind, but the core of who God, what scripture, in Hebrew, calls Hesed, is everlasting and immovable. One of my favorite definitions for Hesed is:

...wrapping up in itself all the positive attributes of God:

Love, covenant faithfulness, mercy, grace, kindness, loyalty...

In short, acts of devotion and loving-kindness that go beyond the requirements of duty.
