This month's Destiny Spotlight is on Mrs. Kelly Bolen, an entrepreneur, daughter, wife, mother, grandmother, friend. The following is our interview with Mrs. Kelly Bolen.

I am the owner and originator of Wigology, Incorporated, which specializes in clients experiencing hair loss due to chemotherapy, Alopecia, or genetic patterned baldness. It was never my intention to be a hairstylist. It was something that came to me naturally and was just a means to an end when I needed a couple of dollars. My mother, her girlfriends, and my godmother would give me a couple of dollars to do their hair.

My mother had hair issues and she started going to a hair restoration place and would come home with Caucasian wigs on her head and unhappy with the way they looked. They didn't know how to give her a style that reflected her black culture and ethnic beauty, so I would restyle her hair for her. I was interested in how they were actually putting on the wigs so I went with her to an appointment to see for myself.

One day the hair restoration company came to my mother and asked her to model for a magazine they were creating for women of color. When we went to the photoshoot, my mom didn't like how the stylist had styled her hair. We went into the restroom so I could restyle it, and another woman walked in who also didn't like her hair style either. So now I'm in the restroom restyling two women's hair, and saying to myself, "I'm about to get kicked out of this place". I restyled their hair, and they walked out looking beautiful and feeling proud! While the original stylists were not happy, the owner agreed the women looked beautiful, and asked me if I was interested in working for his company. I had an interview, he hired me, and that was how I was introduced to working with women with hair loss. Eventually, I got a business partner and opened Hair Systems by Kelly before branching out on my own with Wigology, Inc.

Never, ever did I think this was where or how I was going to be touching lives. I 've worked with children, men and women with hair loss, and it's unbelievable how people (especially black women), come to life when their hair is professionally done. Styling hair and speaking to my clients when they're feeling down and discouraged, encourages, and nurtures their spirits as well as mine. I became known for providing professional, life changing haircare advice and services to uplift and inspire. Working with my clients fulfills my day, and even though they're customers, they feel more like friends. My clients say, "Kelly, I couldn't wait to get here, I couldn't wait for us to talk". They know they can be open and vulnerable, and I'm grateful they trust me with what they share.

Before starting Wigology, Inc., I worked in many professions including being a military veteran with the Army, Fashion Model, Singer, Interior Decorator, Event Planner, Playwright, Caretaker, and a Hair Stylist. I've had many experiences in my life working in those professions and with people of diverse backgrounds, which all worked together to form my destiny. My Destiny was something that was already printed out and written for me, my blueprint to where I was supposed to go.

Born and raised in North Philadelphia, we had a very exciting upbringing. When I was young, my parents separated, and we were raised by my grandmother. My mother went to work for a magazine, and I helped raise my siblings. We lived in a row house in North Philly, and it was very colorful and creative. On the weekends my grandmother would have basement parties where I learned very early the significance of working and making money. I also learned that you had to be very watchful in the

streets. As I grew older, I learned that I internalized a lot of things. I had a hard shell and I protected myself by not allowing people to see my weak spots. I learned that I internalized a lot of things; I protected myself by not allowing people to see my weak spots.

I had the opportunity to attend the Scotland School for Veterans' Children near Chambersburg, PA. Being there created a whole different view on life for me including meeting and living with different types of people and having a sense of independence. I flourished at Scotland. I got into sports, became the class president and captain of the cheerleading squad, was the homecoming queen, and the valedictorian of my graduating class. In fact, until I graduated, I was also the only female officer in the ROTC program at the school.

I've had some tragedies in my life. When I was 18 years old my father was murdered by his best friend. My ex-husband and his brother were shot, and my brother was killed. The violence in the city today is troublesome and needs to be vigorously addressed. I believe the one thing that would make a dent is for parents to be parents. Not being their children's best friend, but rather their parent, by teaching them right from wrong and discipling them when necessary. Years ago, there was more parenting going on than there is today, and we did not have all the problems we are having with our young people today.

When my brother was killed, I lost myself. I pretty much died with him. It took me many years to understand what I was going through. I was making myself visible to other people and providing for them what they needed but at the same time I was lacking what I needed. Now I'm singing in the church choir. I believe my newfound faith and trust in God will allow me to let go and let God take the wheel. I'm just trying to let God handle things instead of me because that wasn't working.

One of the most precious joys in my life is my grandson Kierington Zyck. He is the love of my life and I enjoy spending time with him.

I have been given the opportunity to nurture and care for others by doing hair and sharing my creativity. You have no idea how you can brighten a person's day just by listening to them. A caring spirit is not just something that you decide to have; it's something that is put in you.

We at YDH thank Kelly for sharing the creativity and talents God placed within her. We pray that you who are reading this, will have the courage to do the same.

FALL VACCINATION INFORMATION

(from American Family Care)

We have been through a lot together over the course of the last few years. While we are grateful to have those intense months and years of the pandemic behind us, Covid-19 is still circulating.



Different strains and variations still have the possibility of making you really sick, so you can't let your guard down. This is especially true as we are headed into the cooler months, and we have already seen an uptick in cases.

Covid-19 has the ability to make anyone sick, but it is still especially dangerous for young children, older adults and immunocompromised people. The different strains are constantly changing and evolving, and we know that the current strains are still really contagious.

We are thankful that there have been some recent breakthroughs with antiviral drug treatments. Certain medications are available either intravenously or in a pill form, and can help you manage your symptoms and feel better quicker. The faster you are able to take these medications, the higher the chance you have of avoiding serious illness.

Here again are symptoms to look out for: sudden fever, chills, persistent cough, shortness of breath, and fatigue or muscle aches.

It is still important, even after almost three years to avoid large crowds and individuals infected with Covid-19. Continue to wash your hands frequently, cover your cough and sneezes, and stay home when you are sick.

If you experience any of these symptoms, contact your doctor or take a Covid test: respiratory distress, persistent chest pain or pressure, confusion, pale, gray or blue-colored skin and lips.

LIHWAP crisis grants may be available if you have an emergency situation and are in jeopardy of losing your water service. You can receive one crisis grant for your drinking water service and one crisis grant for your wastewater service, up to \$2,500 each.
