The past two years of working as the Founder and Chief Executive Officer of <u>Your Destiny is Here, Inc.</u> (YDH), a registered 501c3 non-profit organization dedicated to sharing the love of God through service to others, has been incredible.

YDH's mission is to reach everyone who has a desire for greater, by dedicating ourselves to working with individuals within our communities to help them prioritize their goals, examine their strengths, eliminate their challenges, and link them with resources that offer pathways to their divine purpose, their goal of "Greater".

YDH grew out of my researching and interviewing 16 Christian women for my first book, <u>The Marys; Amazing Women Who Answered God's Call; Will You?</u> Their lives and journeys were so captivating that the experience compelled me to connect

with and support other women and men who were helping others in their communities.

As CEO, I have also had the privilege of working with an outstanding group of 18 Advisory Board members who have been generous with their time and talents working with our Christian and Community-related advocacy projects. YDH's board members are community focused individuals whose efforts have helped others locally, nationally, and internationally. Our local and national efforts have helped parents feed and clothe their families, provided emergency air travel, arranged emergency housing, assisted with the purchase of permanent housing, and helped funeralize victims of tragic accidents and gun violence. YDH has also donated to disaster relief efforts for New Orleans' underdeveloped 9th Ward and internationally helped with efforts towards Haiti's recovery.


YDH has partnered with three powerful community groups who focus on protecting the city's most vulnerable and exploited populations: Northwest Victims Services, Women Against Abuse Shelter, and the Philadelphia District Attorney's Office.

We lost a dear member, Sigmund Jackson who passed earlier this year, and two other members who realized early-on that being on the Board was a significant commitment of their time and talent. DESTINY SPOTLIGHT



Mr. Jerome Henry

This month's Destiny Spotlight is on Mr. Jerome Henry, a Philadelphia native, who is the founder and owner of The Philadelphia Custom Design School of Carpentry & Cabinet Making, which has been operating since 2008. Mr. Henry's philosophy: When you do good, good follows you, just as surely as your shadow follows you wherever you go. Raised by compassionate parents, Mr. Henry has always had a heart to edify those around him. His training program provides hundreds of students with technical skills as well as the decision making, team building, leadership skills and life soft skills needed to be positive members of their communities. Mr. Henry's program has a 100% success rate for graduating students, with many starting their own successful businesses. Following is our interview with Mr. Jerome Henry.

I've been in business for 40 years. I earned my teacher's certification and have been teaching at several schools and , including trades at Orleans Technical Institute (which is now a college), Architecture and Building Construction at Temple University for 15 years, Carpentry and Math with the School District of Camden since 2019; and the School District of Philadelphia and Youth Build Charter School as well. That's how I got started with my own school. My mother kept saying I needed to start my own school and so I did. I have a contract with the Veteran's Administration and now also with the Free Library of Philadelphia. We have a GED program and a Computer Literacy program that I offer free scholarships for. And I'm especially proud of my Returning Citizens program. Many people coming out of prison have a hard time finding employment. Through my program they can earn trade certifications, business licenses, and contractor's licenses. Then they are able support themselves finding jobs in construction, the building industry, and the renovation industry.

Growing up, my father was the father of the community. 'Mr. Jim' always gave back. I learned a lot about compassion from him. He would sponsor block parties and monthly picnics in the park where anybody could eat at my fathers' table. As a youngster, I remember when a man came to an event and went to the table to get a plate of food. One of the servers said, "You're not from around here." The man replied, "Mr. Jim said, everybody eats." When the rest of the servers heard that, they just piled his plate high with food. As a young man, I discovred that was the standard of a strong black man, making sure everybody inside and outside the community had a fair chance to advance.

I came up in the 70s, during the era when the Nation of Islam, the Black Panthers, and black Militancy were in the forefront. During that time my siblings and I were enrolled in Catholic school, where I served as an altar boy. I used to question the nuns about why there were no blacks in heaven, why all the saints were white, why all the angels white, why there were no blacks anywhere to be found. The nuns disapproved, especially since I asked these questions in front of all the other students. At the time I was between 13 – 15 years old. The nuns complained all the time to my mother so she finally came up to the school to find out what was going on. When she found out what was going on, she was going to take all of us out of the school, but she only took me out. My siblings ended up graduating from Roman Catholic and Little Flower, I graduated from Gratz. When I arrived at Gratz, the grade

materials we were given were what I learned in the third grade at the Catholic school. This was not the equitable, equal, fair chance I observed via my father's table. Interestingly, one of the ironies of my journey is that one of the buildings I purchased for my school used to be a Catholic school building.

As a teenager I trained in Joe Frazier's gym. I asked Mr. Frazier what advice he had for a young person. He told me, "work hard and keep your nose clean". That's what I've done all my life. And like my father, I make sure everybody who comes to my school benefits, succeeds, and wins.

Right now, 'our children' are lost. They don't have anything to do, they don't have any hope, they don't have anything to look forward to, they're not interested in school, they don't have anything. But were *they to be given something*, there would be a change across this whole city. The world is waiting for us to come of age, when we work in our community to help each other, network with each other, promote each other - that's the day you'll see us really come into our own. Which is coming. We have a lot of work to do right now, but we're on the case.

This is what my school is about. Reaching out to young men, older men, and women, helping them get a trade, get training, get skills so they can work for themselves or someone else. The school is here for the community's benefit. This is the legacy I leave behind, me giving back.



RESOURCES (In Philadelphia and the surrounding areas)

YDH endeavored to provide resources to help in times of need and to help move people to better. We've shared approximately 414 covid-19 related resources including vaccine pop-up clinics and testing locations; 246 food resource locations; 58 job and training opportunities; and at least 10 financial resources. We've shared many household and home assistance information as well as safety tips. The covid-19 and food resources have lessened since the beginning of the pandemic, and some of the information we provided is no longer available, however we will continue to list what we find.

At the time of publication, resources listed were obtainable.

Covid-19 resources change daily. We recommend you call and verify that what you are interested in is still available.

COVID RELIEF

Philadelphians who have lost loved ones due to covid, can receive FEMA aid to cover funeral expenses, up to \$9,000 per person lost. Call 844-684-6333 to apply.

COVID-19 VACCINATIONS

Many local pharmacies in the city offer covid-19 vaccines and boosters. Check with your local pharmacy for details.

The City also offers a program that helps homebound older adults and people with disabilities schedule in-home vaccination services.

FOOD RESOURCES

The City and its partners provide free food and meals to supplement the existing food pantry network.

- Food distribution sites offer free food for residents. No ID or proof of income is required.
- Student meal sites provide free meals for children and youth in safe spaces throughout the city, senior meal sites offer grab-and-go meals for older adults. You must contact the site to reserve your meal for pick-up.
- Meal sites for residents experiencing hunger and homelessness. Please confirm mealtimes prior to arriving at the site.

HOUSEHOLD ASSISTANCE

▶ Housing Assistance

<u>Homeowners</u> and <u>renters assistance</u> is available for those struggling with monthly payments due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

Philly First Home

A first time Home buyers down payment assistance program.

The City of Philadelphia is offering a homebuyer assistance grant of up to \$10,000 (or 6% of the home's purchase price, whichever is lower) to assist first-time homebuyers reduce the principal, cover down payment and loan closing costs for those purchasing their first home. ▶ How To Prevent A PECO Or PGW Shutoff | Info from the Community Legal Services of Philadelphia

If you are behind on your bills or have already received a shutoff notice, follow these steps right away:

1. **Apply For Grant Assistance**: Apply for utility grants from LIHEAP (applications are open from October 18th - June 17th) and Utility Emergency Services Fund (UESF). These grants can be used to pay your gas or electric bill, rescind a shutoff notice, and do not need to be repaid. LIHEAP: You can apply online through compass.state.pa.us, in person at your county assistance office or by phone by calling (866) 857-7095. Call 215-972-5170 (Requires service shutoff or shutoff notice).

2. Apply For A Low-Income Assistance Program:

PECO's Customer Assistance Program (CAP) or PGW's Customer Responsibility Program (CRP) help low-income customers lower their monthly bills and assist with debt forgiveness. Enrolling in one of these programs may prevent a shutoff.

PECO's CAP: Call (800) 774-7040 or apply online at tinyurl.com/Apply-CAP-PECO PGW's CRP: Call (215) 684-6100 or apply online at www.pgworks.com/customercare/crp

- 3. **Request A Payment Arrangement:** Anyone, regardless of income can request a payment arrangement. Do not agree to a payment arrangement that you can't afford. If you're denied a payment arrangement and you wish to challenge that decision, request the reason for your denial and call the PUC's Bureau of Consumer Services office. Call PECO at (888) 480-1533 or PGW at (215) 235-1777 and ask for a payment agreement on your balance.
- 4. **Request A Medical Certificate:** If you or someone in your house has a serious illness or medical condition that would be impacted by loss of utilities, you may be eligible for a medical certificate, which stops termination for 30 days. (Additional 30 day renewals may be possible.) Call PECO or PGW. Give the utility your medical provider's fax number. The utility will fax a medical certificate to the medical provider.
- 5. **File A Dispute With The Public Utility Commission (PUC):** If filed before the day of shutoff, an informal complaint, regarding your bill or pending termination, will temporarily stop the shutoff while the PUC investigates. Call the Bureau of Consumer Services at (800) 692-7380.

Smoke Alarms

Philadelphia residents call 3-1-1 to receive a free smoke alarm installation. You can also <u>submit a request to Philly 311 online</u>.

▶ Water Assistance Program/LIHWAP

The Low-Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) is a temporary emergency program to help low-income families pay overdue water bills. LIHWAP is a grant. **You do not have to repay it**. LIHWAP crisis grants may be available if you have an emergency situation and are in jeopardy of losing your water service. You can receive one crisis grant for your drinking water service and one crisis grant for your wastewater service, up to \$2,500 each.
