





If You're Stopped By Police





- Stay calm. Don't argue, resist, or run.
- You have the right to remain silent. Say so out loud.
- Ask, "Am I free to leave?" If yes, calmly walk away.
- Do NOT consent to a search of yourself or your belongings.



If You're Stopped In Your Car





- Pull over safely. Keep hands visible.
- Show your license, registration, and insurance when asked.
- You can refuse a car search unless they believe there's evidence of a crime.
- Both drivers and passengers can remain silent. Passengers can ask to leave.

- Do not open the door unless they have a signed warrant.
- Ask to see the warrant.
- If they enter with a warrant, you can remain silent or step outside and close the door.

Questions About Your Immigration Status

You have the right to remain silent. You do not have to answer questions about where you were born, whether you're a U.S. citizen, or how you entered the country.

If you are not a U.S. citizen and have valid immigration papers, you should show them if an immigration agent requests it.

O If You're Arrested By Police

- Do not resist.
- Say you wish to remain silet and ask for a lawyer. The government must provide one if you cant afford one.
- You have rights to make a local phone call. The police cannot listen if you call a lawyer.
- Do not talk about your immigration status with anyone but your lawyer.
- Do not answer or sign anything without speaking to a lawyer.
- Read all papers fully. If you do not understand or cannot read the paper, say you need an interpreter.



If You're Taken Into ICE Custody



- You have the right to a lawyer, but the government will not provide one. If you need one ask for a list of low-cost legal services.
- You have the right to contact or Know your immigration have police contact your consulate to inform them of your arrest.
- Do not sign anything without talking to your lawyer. If you sign something, you may be giving up your opportunity to try to stay in the U.S.
 - number and give it to your family. It will help them locate you.



If You Feel Your Rights Have Been Violated





- Write down everything you remember: badge numbers, patrol car numbers, and officer details.
- Seek medical attention for injuries and take photos.
- File a complaint with the agency's internal affairs or civilian complaint board.
