Homily Summary – 25th Sunday of Ordinary Time – God and Wealth

Overview: God has given us many good things—money, possessions, opportunities—but these gifts are not ends in themselves. They are meant to serve the two great commandments: to love God and to love our neighbour (cf. Mark 12:30–31). Today's readings challenge us to reflect on how we use the blessings entrusted to us. Are we trustworthy stewards who use God's gifts for His glory and the good of others, or do we allow greed, selfishness, or waste to guide us?

Main Points

1. Gifts Are for Love, Not Greed

- Money and possessions are not bad in themselves, but their purpose is to serve love of God and neighbour.
- o Greed corrupts this purpose, as seen in scams, unfair practices, or self-serving dishonesty.

2. The Parable of the Dishonest Manager (Luke 16:1–13)

- Jesus doesn't praise dishonesty but the cleverness of the steward.
- We are called to use our resources wisely—not for self-interest, but for God's kingdom.
- o One day, God will ask us to give an account of how we used our resources.

3. You Cannot Serve Two Masters

- Jesus warns that no one can serve both God and wealth.
- Wealth makes a terrible master, but when surrendered to God, it becomes a tool for love, justice, and mercy.

4. The Call to Generosity and Detachment

- Simplicity brings freedom, as seen in preparing for seminary with very few possessions.
- Generosity—giving to the poor, supporting the Church, and helping the needy—brings lasting
 joy.

5. Christian Stewardship

- Wealth can solve some problems, but not the deepest ones (cf. St. Teresa of Kolkata).
- God invites us to radical trust: to give Him a "blank cheque," allowing Him to direct our lives.
- True happiness is found in surrender and faithful stewardship.

- **Deuteronomy 15:7–11** Do not be hard-hearted toward the needy.
- Psalm 113:7 "He raises the poor from the dust, and lifts the needy from the ash heap."
- Luke 16:1–13 The parable of the dishonest manager; you cannot serve God and wealth.
- Matthew 6:33 "But strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well."
- 1 Timothy 6:10 "For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil."

Reflection Questions

- 1. Am I a trustworthy steward of the blessings God has given me—my wealth, talents, and opportunities?
- 2. Do I ever allow greed or selfishness to guide how I use my resources?

- 3. Where is God calling me to be more generous—with my time, money, or possessions?
- 4. Can I surrender to God with a "blank cheque," trusting Him to direct my life and resources?
- 5. How can I imitate Mary's example of total trust and offering to the Lord?

Rhyme summary:

God's gifts are blessings, so we're called to be wise, They're meant to love God and our neighbor likewise. We can't serve both money and God up above, True riches are found when we live out God's love. The manager was clever, but he acted wrong, We're called to be faithful to God to whom we belong. So give God your blank cheque, and let His will be done, Your treasure in heaven will outweigh every sum.
