Homily Summary - 2nd Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C

Themes of Ordinary Time:

- **Growth, Going, and Hope:** The green color symbolizes growth, forward movement, and hope, echoing Pope Francis's Jubilee Year of Hope. What do you hope to make more ordinary in your walk with God?
- **Reflection on Life:** Ordinary Time offers a chance to reflect on our lives, consider our routines, and make resolutions to grow closer to God. It's a time to appreciate and find God in the everyday.

- **Gospel:** Jesus turning water into wine symbolizes the extraordinary potential in ordinary moments.
