Literacy	 This term we continue to develop early literacy skills such as our visual descrimination skills, auditory and visual sequential memory in preparation for phonological readiness. The focus this term will be: Recognising rhythm in spoken words. Blending compound words, e.g "snow-man". Developing an awareness that signs and symbols within the environment carry meaning. Filling in the missing words or phrases in known stories and rhymes. Ascribing meaning to the marks I make when I draw or paint. Encouraging children to provide a running commentary as they make marks. Talking about key features of favourite stories I have heard by stating who was in the story (character) and where they were (setting). 		
Mathematics	 This term we will begin to learn the meaning of numbers and their quantity. We will learn how to represent the numbers using our hands, counting objects and writing the number. We will begin to make size comparisons and order items in size order, using correct mathematical language. The focus this term will be: Reciting number names with the intention of counting, although not always in the correct order. Understanding the concept of first and second by telling you who the winner is after racing cars etc. Use some positional language. 		
Understanding the World	 This term we will continue to learn about celebrations as they occur on the calendar, e.g. Chinese new year. In the outdoors, we will begin planting seeds and observing new growth as the weather becomes warmer. We will be learning more about ourselves, talking about our strengths and qualities that make us special. The focus this term will be: Operating simple equipment. Commenting and asking questions about aspects of my familiar world and traditions. Show interest in different occupations and ways of life. 		
Expressive Arts and Design	 This term the children are beginning to use less familiar themes within pretend play, but still based upon first hand experiences. Key Workers model pretend play skills, such as pretending without an object and substituting objects that do not resemble the real thing. The focus this term will be: Give puppets, role play characters and small world characters a 'voice' so that they can 'talk' to each other. Build stories around toys.
