The new system for reading at home is well underway. Most children are reading their phonics book three times a week and recording it in their school diaries. The reading wallets are coming in each day and the children love selecting a book for you to read to them at home. School – Home Communications

We are now using a system called 'School Comms' for school to home communication. This means that we can send messages to parents more quickly and cost effectively via email, text and smartphone app.

If you have a smartphone, you can help up save money by downloading the 'Gateway' app from your app store (android and iPhone). It is quick and easy to do.

'Gateway' is a very secure method of making online payments and it means that you can make a payment from your phone to save logging into a PC or laptop. If you do not have a smartphone you will still receive text messages from the school as usual.

Smart Watches & Activity Trackers

Please remember that Smartwatches (devices that can access the internet and can receive messages and phone calls) are not allowed in school and must be handed in with mobile phones if they are brought in. Activity Trackers (devices that monitor health and steps only) are allowed in school but must not be used during lesson times. These devices can be potentially broken easily when children are playing at break and lunchtimes and the school accepts no responsibility for any damage or loss to these devices.

E-Safety Advice

<u>Gaming</u>

Video game ratings using the PEGI (Pan-European Game Information) system became legally enforceable in 2012. This means that retailers who sell titles with ratings of 12, 16 or 18 years to children below the age limits can be prosecuted. The PEGI rating considers the age suitability of a game, not the level of difficulty. For example a PEGI 3 game will not contain any inappropriate content, but it may be too difficult to master for younger children and while a PEGI 18 game may be very easy to play, they contain elements inappropriate for a younger audience.

Many games that young people play are online and allow them to play against their friends and other people in the online gaming community. It is important that young people feel safe and in control when they are playing against others online. As part of our esafety curriculum we stress the importance of being respectful and responsible towards others when online, keep personal information private and to speak to an adult if they are worried or concerned.

There are a number of ways that you can support your child to be responsible and safe digital citizens.

- Have regular chats about what they are they are accessing online.
- Consider setting time limits on the amount of time they spend online or playing games.
- Download or buy appropriate age related games.
- Regularly check your child's privacy settings on phones and tablets.
