Proposal for Building of Contemporary Art Scene as a gate from La Gran Plaza to Calle de Morelos

The art community of Monterrey hosts regular contemporary art fairs with two of the largest in Mexico promoting the country's artist. These events have catapulted the art scene of Monterrey into a global venue for Latin American artist and collectors in recent years. With an international audience, the need for a central art destination has risen.

The building proposal houses 13 gallery spaces within a five-story building between La Gran Plaza and Calle de Morelos. Situated in the cultural center, the building becomes a physical gateway between the two active areas. The contrasting scale and character of the surroundings is reflected by the building with street level face decorated in a traditional Mexican ceramic tile and plaster framed openings. The remaining façade plays with shadows on vertical fins plastered in white stucco and a floating roof structure of angled louvers. Interior gallery spaces revolve around two open-air courtyards interwoven into the building. These intimate pathways of clay tiled floors and staircases enclosed by white stucco and glass walls open the interiors to sunlight from above. The building's two volumes are connected by sky bridges that straddle the Calle de Morelos and an open rooftop overlooking the majestic mountains surrounding Monterrey.



Palace Museum located North of Micropaza was created to preserve the tradition of charreria with the permennet exhibition of arts and crafts.



Museum of the Northeast (MUNE) is an artistic and historical space that ihas the purpose of showing the history of the Mexican Northeast.



Museum of Mexican History the MHM offers a journey through the history of the pre-Hispanic civilizations of Mexico.



Barrio Antiguo (Old Town) cultural environment home to various social meeting points to enjoy art, music, dishes and family and friends.



Catedral Metropolitana de Monterrey a mixture of architectural, neoclassical and baroque styles; this is an active Catholic Cathedral within the Archdiocese of Monterrey.



Museum of Contemporary Art of Monterrey, MARCO, an important cultural center whose efforts are aimed at the promotion of contemporary art.



New Palacio Municipal (Municipal Palace) with a central courtyard in which civic acts and social events are held for the community of Monterrey.



Metropolitan Museum de Monterrey Opened in 1974, this
museum houses changing exhibits in a
17th-century municipal palace.

Calle Morelos

Spanning two major neighborhoods in downtown Monterrey - Barrio Antiquo and Zona Rosa - Calle Morelos is a pedestrianized shopping, dining, and art street. West of the Microplaza, find local shops, leather goods, clothing, cool restaurants, cafes, bars, and music.

Calle Morelos was remodeled to make the area more pedestrian freindly. With canopies streatching over the street and wide protected sidewalks littered with outdoor dining and greenery, the street becomes the center of Barrio Antigua and a centerpiece of the local art community within the area and the surrounding museums of Monterrey.




Macroplaza of Monterrey, also know as La Gran Plaza

Microplaza of Monterrey regularly finds itself in the news as a playground for contemporary artists. Anchored on all sides by museums, this large park area with 11 fountains and home of the **Faro del Comercio**, a monument designed by the accomplished Mexican architect Luis Barragán and constructed in 1984, the park is the source of inspiration for many art installations over the years. Bringing Monterrey artist and currators together in an artistic collaboration.





Site - Located in the heart of the cultural center of Monterrey Mexico, the site is boardered by the large Microplaza and it's surrounding cultural museams and straddles the walkable Calle de Moralos in the center of Barrio Antigua or "Old Town" Monterrey.



Skybridge - From the fourth level guest may cross from one building volume to the next through an open air sky bridge stradling the Calle de Morelos and overlooking Monterrey.




Third floor gallery - A view inside a gallery on the third floor of the north tower. Galleries take advantage of natural light streeming in between the facade fins and courtyards.




Second Floor Courtyard - The meandering open air courtyards create an intimate experience within the building allowing guest to pear into gallery through glass walls.


Level 5 Roof and Shade




Level 5 Event Venue and Bar, Guest Suites

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The building is comprised of two volumes connected by sky bridges that straddle the Calle de Morelos, main pedestrian friendly road of the Barrio Antigua leading straight into the city's massive Macroplaza of Monterrey or La Gran Plaza; connecting the symbolic legacy and future of Monterrey. The building is intended to be open to the public, housing an arrangement of galleries on the first through fourth floors, a gourmet restraunt and coffee bar on the ground level, and rooftop terrace bar on the fifth level. The building is arranged with the ground floor also holding offices and support areas that facilitate the execution of galleries activities. The roof level contains luxury suites for hosting special guests, events, and gatherings.


These gallery spaces revolve around two outdoor courtyards interwoven into each building volume. These courtyards facilitate the vertical movement of visitors among the various gallery spaces, while providing an intimate connection to the exterior environment and a preview of the contents within each gallery space. One can enter the building from a public entrance located off the main façade on the busy street of Jose Coss into a reception area in the North Tower. A second, more obscured entrance to the courtyard of the south tower, gives the feel of a more speakeasy-style entrance off the smaller, pedestrian friendly, Calle de Morelos, that requires visitors to have an understanding of the space in order to enter

The development of the program to the schematic design continues to reflect the overarching gesture of this structure as a micro-to-macro filter or sieve through which to interpret Monterrey's progression from the historic old town to its modern Macroplaza and downtown. Sitting at the intersection of this dichotomy, the material and geometries of the building reflect this transition. The street level façade mirrors the scale, patterns and materials of the surrounding older buildings with a traditional Mexican ceramic tile and plaster framed windows and doorways. The traditional tile continues up and over pedestrians as it lines the skybridge and acts as a physical entrance and metaphor for the connection between the old and new Monterrey. The remaining façade of varying vertical fins plastered in white stucco provide a playground of angles for sunlight to interact with the exterior and interior of the building. The interior courtyards connect the meandering staircases with a clay tile floor surface enclosed by white stucco and glass walls allowing the sunlight to play within the interior of the building changing with the day and season.


The work of artists in Monterrey is not going unnoticed. Galleries and buyers around the world are interested in the Latin American art coming out of this region. This new exhibition space gives this community a world class venue to put the contemporary Latin art culture on exhibit. With a combination of varying gallery spaces, event and hospitality space spread across two building volumes, this structure encourages exploration – prodding potential curators and investors from other regions and countries to take notice. The circumambulating staircases and discreet entrances create an intimacy and privacy that encourages engagement with the art and invites the local culture to regularly congregate or contemplate within its walls. It's intimate interaction and prestige within the cultural hub of Monterrey will attract the casual visitor or serious buyer alike.


