

#### The First 100

- Contacting your first 100 DXCC entities
- Challenging but not difficult
- Contest weekends will offer lots of DX
- Even a casual operator can earn DXCC
- Call CQ DX often




#### The First 100

- 100 to 150 of the 340 total entities
- DX stations may need you too (state or county)
- Some DX stations looking to practice English
- Most QSO are short (name, QTH, weather, etc)




#### The First 100

- First 100 easy accomplished using SSB
- Digital modes like FT8 can ease the journey
- After the first 100-150 learning CW is helpful
- Use spotting networks



#### **The Station**

- A modest station can earn DXCC
- No matter the station it takes:
  - Patience
  - Persistence
  - LUCK



#### **The Station - Radio**

- Comfortable to you
- 100 watts (QRP special skill set)
- Variable filtering, passband, notch, etc
- Speech processor, keyer, DVR (helpful)
- Keep the manual nearby
- Not going to make recommendations
  - That is like Ford vs Chevy






#### **The Station - Radio**

- Amplifier (nice to have but...)
- Tuner (manual or automatic)
- Headset with boom mic
- Computer for Ham Shack
- Interface for digital modes
- Get the best you can afford





#### **The Station - Antenna**

- Wire antennas
  - Dipoles (single and multiband)
  - End feds
- Verticals
  - Single and multiband
  - Flagpole
- Yagis/Beams
  - Single and multiband






# **QSOs and Logging**

- Most QSO are short (name, QTH, weather, etc)
- Paper or computer logging
- Paper works but is manual no automation
- Computer logging is preferred
  - Tracks QSOs, Award progress, QSL confirmations
- Most of all have FUN!






## QSLs, Paper, Electronic or Both?

- DXCC requires confirmation to count
- Traditional QSL cards
- LoTW (Logbook of The World)
- Can be a combination of both
- eQSL and QRZ Logbook do <u>not</u> count






#### QSOs and QSLs = DXCC

- Submit LoTW QSOs for Credit
- Use online or manual DXCC application
- Contact field card checker to verify QSLs
- Checker submit form on your behalf
- DXCC certificate AWARDED!



- Make and work towards personal GOALS






#### **DXCC Best Practices**

# **DXCC The Operator**

- Number One Rule LISTEN
- Develop good listening skills
- Follow the DX operator's instructions
- Timing, understand when to transmit
- Call CQ DX





# **DXCC The Operator**

- Use proper phonetics
- Use spotting clusters
- Keep up with current DX Bulletins
- Join a DX club
- Listen












# **DXCC The Pileup**

- Recognizing patterns
- Don't be intimidated
- Follow DX instructions
- Both sides of the pileup







# The DXpedition

- Aren't they just a vacation
- Are they really needed
- Why do they happen
- Why don't go to the one I need
- What's the cost







## **DXCC Hints and Final Thoughts**

- Be available on as many bands and modes as possible
- Listen, Listen and Listen some more
- Call CQ
- Use spotting networks
- Use LoTW
- Use computer logging program



## **DXCC Hints and Final Thoughts**

- Upgrade antenna before buying an amplifier
- Learn CW, enough to recognize your call/5NN
- Use a keyer both voice and CW
- Join a DX club
- Follow the DX Code of Conduct
- Have FUN as DXCC can be a journey of a lifetime



#### **DX Code of Conduct**




- 1.1 will listen, and listen, and then listen again before calling.
- 2.1 will only call, if I can copy the DX station properly.
- 3.I will **not trust the DX cluster** and will be sure of the DX station's call sign before calling.
- 4.I will not interfere with the DX station nor anyone calling and will never tune up on the DX frequency or in the QSX slot.
- 5.I will wait for the DX station to end a contact before I call.
- 6.1 will always send my full call sign.
- 7.1 will call and then listen for a reasonable interval. I will not call continuously.
- 8.I will **not transmit** when the DX operator calls **another call sign**, not mine.
- 9.1 will not transmit when the DX operator queries a call sign not like mine.
- 10.1 will not transmit when the DX station requests geographic areas other than mine.
- 11. When the DX operator calls me, I will not repeat my call sign unless I think he has copied it incorrectly.
- 12.I will be thankful if and when I do make a contact.
- 13.I will respect my fellow hams and conduct myself so as to earn their respect.
