Levorsen wins 1999 Lifetime Achievement Award

Mush with PRIDE announces the selection of Bob Levorsen as the recipient of Mush with PRIDE's 1999 Lifetime Achievement Award. Levorsen is being recognized for his lifetime devotion to sled dog sports.

The PRIDE Lifetime Achievement Award is presented to individuals who exemplify the goals and spirit of PRIDE and serve as a role model to others in the sport.

Levorsen and his wife Bella first became hooked on sled dogs in 1965 when they were living in Anchorage, Alaska. Upon moving to California, Bob quickly became involved in the Sierra Nevada Dog Drivers. In 1976, realizing the new mushers' need for information about how to train and care for their dogs, Levorsen and his wife Bella worked with the Sierra Nevada Dog Drivers to edit and publish the book "MUSH: A Beginner's Manual of Sled Dog Training."

Levorsen later became President and Chairman of the Board of Directors of the International Sled Dog Racing Association (ISDRA). He was responsible for implementing the ISDRA championship point system and medal awards program, which allows mushers to participate in the points Olympic recognition of sleddog sports has been Levorsen's main goal for several years.

system through local sanctioned races without having to travel all over the country to larger races.

Levorsen was a founding member of the International Federation of Sled Dog Sports (IFSS), and served on the Council from its inception until 1996 when he retired. During his IFSS tenure, he was the driving force in pursuing Olympic recognition for sled dog sports. As Chairman of the IFSS Olympic Committee, he spearheaded IFSS's 1993 application for Olympic recognition of sleddog sports, and since then has traveled around the world to speak on behalf of sleddog sports with Olympic officials and others.

Olympic recognition of sleddog sports has been Levorsen's main goal for several continued on page 2

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years. A decade ago, when people first talked about Olympic recognition for sled dog racing, he was not afraid to take on a task that looked impossible to some. He has invested a tremendous amount of time, and has personally financed his own travel and the travel of others in pursuit of this goal. According to past IFSS President Glenda Walling, who served with Levorsen during his tenure with both ISDRA and IFSS: "This man is a lead dog, a problem solver, a man of action. He is hard working, he is loyal, he focuses on the finish line, he never quits when the go-

ing gets tough."

As IFSS European Continental Director Bernard Pepin of France said, "Bob was convinced from the beginning that the sled dog sport should be recognized as a real sport and would develop through its recognition by the national and international sports authorities such as the IOC and General Assembly of International Sports Federations (GAISF)."

Levorsen co-chaired the IFSS Survey Committee throughout the 1990s. Convinced that the sport needed good data about sleddog sports and its development throughout the world in order to be recognized by international organizations, his committee published two worldwide surveys in 1994 and 1998. These surveys, which documented the types of races, prize money, and numbers of participants in sleddog sports around the world, had the added benefit of showing mushers that their sport was practiced by many more people than they had thought, and in countries they had never imagined.

According to Walling at Levorsen's retirement from the IFSS Council in 1996, "Bob has been instrumental in the evolution of mushing into a global activity. He has begged, pleaded and threatened sleddog racing organizations around the world into providing him with information ... so necessary to painting a vivid picture of the nature and growth of our sport."

As Pepin summarizes: "I do not know anybody in the sled dog sports who has been so dedicated to them, who has spent so much of his time and so much of his money for their development without asking for any personal benefit in return. He is a living example to all of us. He deserves a great appreciation from all of us. I am very proud to know him and to have worked with him."

Nominations Open for 2000 Lifetime Award

Nominations for PRIDE's 2000 Lifetime Acheivement Award are being accepted by the PRIDE board of directors. This award is presented to an individual who exemplified the goals and spirit of PRIDE throughout his or her career. A nominee should be able to serve as a role model for other PRIDE members and the mushing community as a whole.

PRIDE's goals are to (1) establish guidelines for proper sled dog care and treatment, (2) facilitate communication among mushers about the treatment and care of sled dogs, (3) educate young people about sled dogs and mushing, (4) enhance the care of sled dogs by improved husbandry and veterinary practices, (5) promote public understanding about the care, treatment, and traditional and modern uses of sled dogs, and (6) welcome and assist new mushers.

The 1999 Lifetime Achievement Award was presented to Bob Levorsen, a founder of the International Federation of Sled Dog Sports (see article on page 1). Previous Lifetime Achievement award winners have been Dr. Dominique Grandjean, Mary Shields, Roxy Wright Champaine, and Tim White.

Nominations should include a brief letter of no more than 500 words. The PRIDE board is slated make the final selection at an upcoming meeting.

Suggested cover letter for inspecting veterinarian

Dear Doctor:

The Board of Mush with PRIDE has developed a kennel inspection certification program at the request of members, mushers, and kennel owners. We hope this program will be another step in the educational process to ensure all sleddogs are given safe and humane care.

The following form is provided to you as a checklist to ensure the kennel meets all the minimum requirements for basic humane care of sleddogs. Note that inspection is voluntary, and only at the request of the kennel owner, who must be a current member of Mush with PRIDE. Please examine the Sled Dog Care Guidelines, Second Edition prior to your inspection visit for the specific items you will be addressing. Most checklist items have reference to specific page numbers in case clarification is needed.

Please have the kennel owner initial where their endorsement is required. This is required as you cannot verify what kennel practices are on a daily basis. Only if all the mandatory standards are met and all items are checked in the Yes box should you certify that the kennel has met the standards as set forth by the guidelines provided by Mush with PRIDE on the day you inspect the kennel. The optional items are highly recommended by the Mush with PRIDE Board, however the Board does not feel that they are essential. The kennel owner will receive a higher rating for meeting them.

Please provide us with a representative photo of the kennel, and any comments you feel necessary, either positive or negative.

The Board emphasizes that by signing the statement at the end of the checklist, you agree only that you have personally inspected the kennel and it does or does not meet the described standards on that day. You are not personally or professionally certifying that you agree with or endorse any of the specific guidelines or Mush with PRIDE.

After the form is received by the Board, a certificate of inspection will be mailed to the member stating the level of certification that the kennel has achieved.

The Mush with PRIDE Board suggests that inspecting veterinarians set their own fees for service for the site visit/inspection and these fees are the responsibility of the kennel owner. Mush with PRIDE does not provide any funds for the kennel inspections.

Thank you for helping promote humane and proper care of sleddogs.



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
