

2023 Membership

It's a new year! Time to join or renew your membership in the Hammond Ranch Landowners Association. 76 residents took advantage of last year's promotion and joined for 2023 as well as 2022. This is directed towards those that didn't take advantage of the reduced rate for 2023.

Included with this newsletter is the 2023 Membership Application. 2022 had the highest membership, 120! Hopefully, more will join in 2023.

As some of you already know, there are many reasons to join:

- HLA provides road signs;
- Presents new residents with a welcome basket;
- Publishes the Hammond Ranch Handbook;
- Provides and maintains trespass authorizations;
- Negotiates with the County for needed improvements and support for the Ranch;
- Promotes the maintenance of our roads by reimbursing road maintenance costs according to a prescribed schedule established by the HLA Board;
- Hosts a website that is helping to inform residents of issues related to the Ranch (www.hammondlandowners.org);
- Assists with the resolution of neighborhood issues;
- Members are eligible to purchase PHI (Mercy Air) emergency medical evacuation services at a discounted rate;
- Publishes The Hammond Ranch Scene, a quarterly newsletter, informing members of important issues;
- Members work with road committees, the fire department as well as the County and local Fire Safe Councils; and
- Hosts an annual picnic in July as well as the annual luncheon meeting in November.

Love's Truck Stop Update

In June 2022, the Appeals Court in Sacramento ruled that there were deficiencies in Love's EIR and CEQA reports and returned the case to Siskiyou County Superior Court. At the November 11 Weed City Council meeting, the Board unanimously approved the following resolution:

"B. Development - by Motion, adopt Resolution No. 29-2022 Rescinding Adoption of Resolution No. 32-2018 and setting aside Certification of the Final Environmental Impact Report, CEQA Findings, Statement of Overriding Considerations, Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Project and Approval of the Love's Travel Stop Project."

At this time, there has been no statement or declaration from Love's about their intent. After communication with our attorney, it appears that the truck stop project is dormant, but Love's could conduct a new study, prepare a revised EIR and resubmit the project. If they do that, the process starts over, including public comment.

Wildlife Near the Ranch



Two endangered gray wolves, OR-85, and his female mate, WHA01F, welcomed eight new pups in 2022, the largest litter of gray wolf pups California has seen in more than 100 years. Wolves typically give birth to two to six pups at a time. That's why the eight gray wolf pups are a cause for celebration among wildlife enthusiasts.

The wolf parents are formerly known as the Whaleback Pair, and they showed up in Siskiyou County in November 2020, as the Mount Shasta News reported at the time. They became the Whaleback Pack when they gave birth to seven pups in 2021. According to the California Department of Fish and Wildlife, "The Whaleback Pack consists of the male wolf OR85 and an uncollared female. They occupy a 480 square mile home range in eastern Siskiyou County. OR85 was collared by the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) in February 2020 and was likely born in 2019. He dispersed from the Mount Emily Pack near La Grande, Oregon and entered California in November 2020. Genetic analysis indicates the female is closely related to southwestern Oregon's Rogue Pack. In 2021, the pair produced seven pups."

The male OR85 is named as such because he wandered into California from Oregon. The female is named WHA01F, as the Mount Shasta News explains, "WHA for Whaleback and 01F for the first marked female Whaleback wolf."

There are just two other known wolf packs in California, the Lassen Pack and Beckwourth Pack. The Lassen Pack currently sits at approximately 12 wolves, while the Beckwourth Pack is around two to three wolves.



Watch Duty

There is a free mobile app available you should take a look at, Watch Duty. Watch Duty provides realtime push notifications about wildfires in California. According to their website, Watch Duty is a non-profit wildfire alerting, mapping and tracking service operated by experienced fire reporters and many other collaborators who diligently monitor radio scanners and other data sources 24/7. They have created dozens of tools, from messaging to alerting systems, to be notified of every fire start across the great state of California. At any given time there are a half-dozen reporters monitoring everything. The app has a Visual Map with newsfeed that provides up-to-theminute information, Push Notifications to receive alerts about the conditions on the ground as they change and can help first responders and loved ones by sharing photos of fire conditions and other hazards.

Watch Duty focuses on high-risk vegetation fires and fires that have the potential to become high-risk vegetation fires. They will typically not report on structure fires unless they spread to the vegetation nor will they report minor fires that are classified by arriving first responders as having slow or no rate of spread within a small area, not threatening structures, and are expected to be handled quickly. They will sometimes post fires with negligible risk when there is obvious smoke visible over a large area or aerial resources are present that may be concerning to residents.

It's a good idea to keep informed. You can go to the website www.watchduty.org or your app store and download it.

Zonehaven Aware

In order to be prepared for fire season, another good source of information during a fire emergency is Zonehaven Aware. It is a Community Evacuation Interface (CEI) that serves community residents as the most reliable source for first-order evacuation updates and preparation resources. During an emergency, every second counts. Start preparing now to ensure you are ready in the event of an emergency.

Knowing your zone is critical to the evacuation process. If there is a wildfire or emergency situation, this is how you will check if you are in an impacted area. Find information about your zone, familiarize yourself with local fire and law agencies in your area, and find resources that will help you prepare: https://www.zonehaven.com/aware/.
