If you or your parents don't take my word for it, come and see for yourself, and don't forget to notice the smiles and laughter coming from our faces.

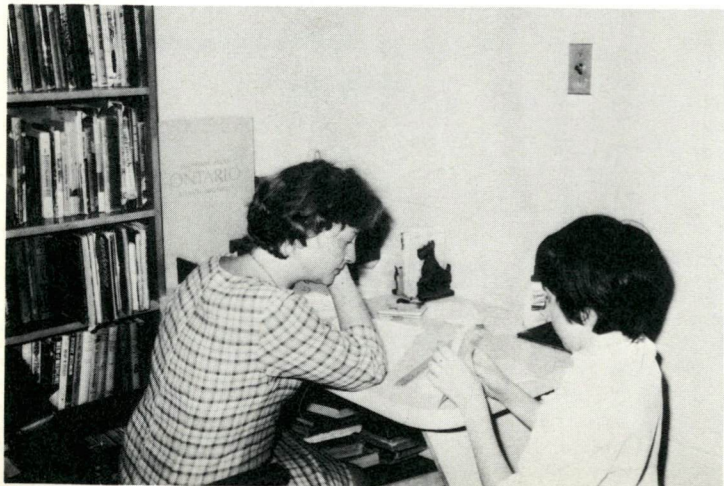

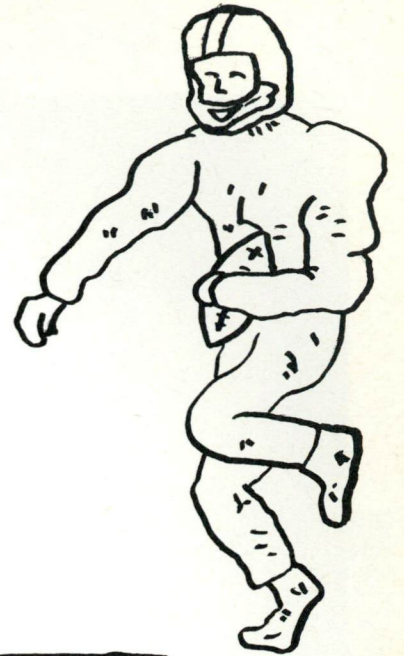

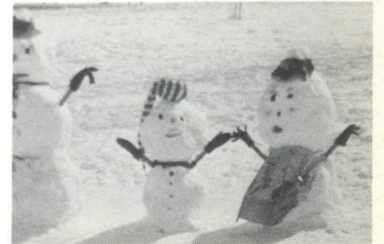

Public Speaking

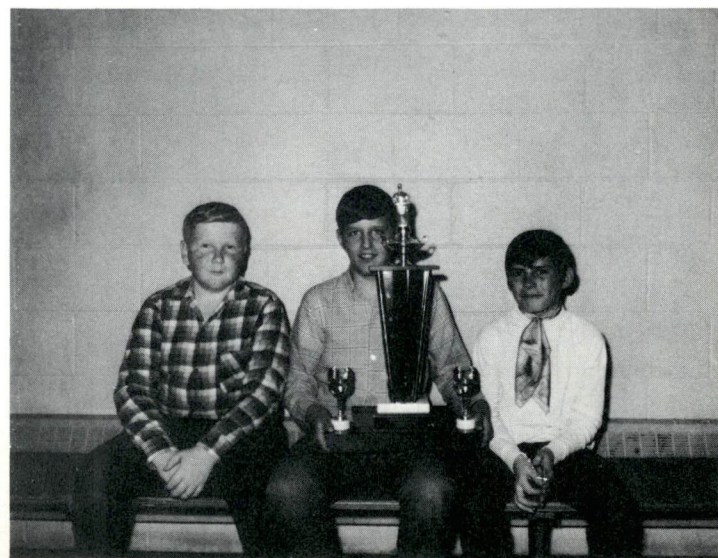
