

To them, Mr. Allen, Mr. Birt, Mr. Locatelli, Mr. Kennedy and Mr. MacDonald, this dedication is happily given.




Again, under the able supervision of Orma Allen, mothers have been serving soup and hot dogs on Thursday. Once again, "Many thanks, Orma."

MY FATHER'S ACCIDENT



ANNE THAXTER EATON LIBRARY

Do you sometimes feel our library is too small, too cramped, too cluttered? Consider yourself lucky, for at one time it was located in the present teachers' room. When the school first opened in 1965, the Anne Thaxter Eaton Library was in Mr. Kellar's present office.

Location of our valuable library is just one major change in the last decade. At one time we had no librarian. Mrs. Steacy served as librarian from 1971 - 1973. Our helpful, hard-working resource teacherlibrarian now is Mrs. Beryl Blancher.

Over the years, our supply of books has doubled, and our audio visual aids are in generous supply. Given advance notice, Mrs. "B" can locate information and equipment to make the teacher's and pupil's endeavours more enjoyable and simpler.

Perhaps the most important event in the life of our library happened in 1974 when our library was organized "Escott Township Public Library". Now, open to the public, the school population benefits from Public Library Grants. This provides

more books, magazines, periodicals, and newspapers (approximately 165).

As a Public Library, the Anne Thaxter Eaton Library is a member of the Eastern Ontario Library System (E.O.L.S.). This enables Mrs. Blancher to order special books on topics people request. They may borrow books from libraries in Brockville and Ottawa.

The E.O.L.S. has donated over 250 books to our library collection. Also, every 3-4 months, the E.O.L.S. Travelling Library lends 120 books to our subscribers.

The children have enjoyed many special E.O.L.S. programmes, films; singers such as Claude Labrecque and Tom Kines; and the Poppen Puppet Players.

The adults have had free demonstrations on crafts, antique glass and Japanese Flower

Arranging.
The children of Escott Public School know the value and enjoyment of our library. We hope more adults in the community will discover our "Anne Thaxter Eaton Library" soon.




The day ended with all classes gathering in the gym at 2:00 for the Winter Carnival Sock Hop.






SPORTS SECTION

sportsmanship:








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
