



Our annual Bicycle Rodeo was held in early June, but the winner, John Donovan, was not announced until the last day of school.







OUR CHRISTMAS CONCERT




Our tree looked lovely with decorations made and hung by the children in many classes.


WINTER WAKE-UP WEEK



THE BICYCLE

A modern useful method of transportation requiring neither gas nor hay. Honourable judges, ladies and gentlemen, fellow contestants, the topic I have chosen to speak on is the bicycle.

It comes in all colours and various speeds and sizes. The bicycle of today is lightweight averaging twenty-five pounds, with a frame of hollow, metal tubing. It has wheels in suspension, ball bearings and pneumatic tires along with a comfortable spring seat that can be adjusted. For girls there are bicycles with drop frames.

The first development of the bicycle is not known although it is thought, the ancient Egyptians thought of it first, for frescoes, portraying figures, sitting on a stick connecting two wheels were found in the ruins of Pompeii.

A Frenchman devised a type of two-wheeled mechanism which the rider steered with his feet while sitting on its wooden, horseshaped body. This was developed in 1690. A number of similar inventions appeared during the 1700's but no real progress was made.

In 1816, a German, Baron Karl Von Drais, invented the "drasine" or "dandy horse". What was important about this was that the front wheel pivoted and there was a handle-bar for steering. The Baron got a patent on this model and introduced it in England where it made a sensation. By 1819 the Dandy Horse was a fad in the U.S.. Later, in 1840, a Mr. MacMillan improved the Baron's invention by putting cranks on the rear wheel axle connected to the pedals by driving rods. A Frenchman named Lallement was the first man to use the word "bicycle" for his invention completed in 1865. Meanwhile, the French were constantly improving their contraptions so that by 1867 cycling was their most popular sport.

During this time the Americans were giving patents for new features right and left. One week a bike would sell for \$150.00, then a new gadget would be invented and the week-old machine would already be outdated. This craze soon ended and people sold their bicycles for scrap. One of the bicycles of this period was the "Ordinary" with a 40-48" front wheel and a 16" rear wheel. There was also a bike with a front wheel measuring 64" for a man with long legs. Interest in the bicycle was revived when the British exhibited their models in the 1876 Centennial Exhibition.

In 1889 a Mr. Fillinghast, of Providence, Rhode Island, patented a hollow, air-filled tire along with steel tube frames and wire spokes, the air-filled or pneumatic tire made bicycle riding more fun and more comfortable. At the turn of the century, the automobile replaced the bicycle and the craze died down. In Europe, however, there are still more bicycles than cars. In Denmark it is common to see rosy-cheeked old ladies going down street on a bicycle.

As well as being a fad, the bicycle is good healthy exercise and a cheap method of transportation.
