We have had an successful Summer of rugby, when we flew to Gibraltar, in September for our annual fixture where we won against a Gibraltar National Select XV.




Once again we had an enjoyable trip which was hosted impeccably by Gibraltar RFC and strengthened our bond with the Royal Marines Association RFC.

Summit Attack challenge raises over £14,500 for RMA – The Royal Marines Charity

Ben Clough – a super-fit Royal
Marines Physical Training Instructor
at Commando Training Centre Royal
Marines in Exmouth – spent the first
part of his summer break tackling an
ultimate endurance challenge: running
482 miles from Scotland to Wales,
climbing the three highest peaks in
the UK.


Ben completed the challenge in an amazing nine consecutive days – a day earlier than projected. Despite battling the wind and rain he'd encountered earlier on the last evening atop Snowdon, he finished just before midnight. He ran an average 50 miles daily, summiting Ben Nevis, Cumbria's Scafell Pike and Yr Wyddfa (Snowdon) on days one, five and nine, and climbing a total elevation of 14,500 meters (47,592 feet) – more than one and a half times the height of Mount Everest!

Ben raised over £14,500 for two charities close to his heart, RMA – The Royal Marines Charity and the mental health charity, MIND.

He says: "'Summit Attack' was definitely the biggest challenge I've done to date. I finished way under schedule so was definitely shifting throughout each day.

It was very mentally draining and I had a few niggles physically but a solid mindset made me get the job done.

I spent the rest of my leave getting my body back moving properly again – and catching up on all the calories I missed along the way!"

Colour Sergeant Paul (Charlie) Charles Invictus Story

After spending 21 years in the Royal Marines, Charlie's career came to an end in 2020 when he was seriously injured in a cycling accident while cycling home from the barracks. He sought to rebuild his confidence and reconnect with his fellow vets by applying for Invictus. Charlie, 45, originally from Plymouth, was diagnosed with Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) after being hit by a car while cycling home in July 2020. He sustained a broken neck. broken ribs, a fractured skull, a shattered nose and a blood clot in the spinal cord and bleeding in the left lobe of his brain.

"We had only just gone into the Covid lockdown, so I wasn't in hospital for long. I had to wear a collar for three months, and during this time I couldn't have any of my injuries repaired because of my neck injury."

"I have some numbness from my left shoulder to my finger, which can still be painful, and I have painful joints, and really struggle with cognitive processing and can become fatigued easily as a result."

As Charlie approached the conclusion of his 22-year service, with the expectation of an extended career and

promotion, he found it difficult to adjust to the sudden change in his life. He underwent rehabilitation at the Defence Medical and Rehabilitation Centre (DMRC) in Plymouth and at the Naval Service Recovery Centre Hasler before being released in January 2023. Charlie's journey to recovery began with the realisation that the Royal Marines was all he had ever known and wanted to do, and he is still struggling to come to terms with the idea of no longer serving.

"I've had such a long career in the military and felt like I'd

lost part of my identity. I'm very much still in recovery and trying to work out what to do with my life."

He heard about the Invictus Games at Hasler and was encouraged to go along by the people there.

"I liked the physical challenge side of Invictus, but for me it was mainly the confidence building that inspired me to apply. Meeting new people is really tough for me, but I like being able to help them and in turn they help me."

Selection for Team UK

Charlie couldn't believe it when he was told he had been chosen to represent Great Britain at Invictus Games Dusseldorf.

"I felt chuffed! I was very thankful and grateful, and I wasn't expecting it. The training camps and, everyone at RBL have been amazing and I feel like this came at the right time for me, to give me a focus on something," Charlie explains.

As a result of training for the Invictus Games, Charlie began to experience the advantages of sports recovery.

"In the Royal Marines, you're pushed to your limits in everything you do. When I was injured, I didn't like to moan about it, I would tell everyone I was fine, as we're almost trained to be like that. I saw my injury as another challenge, but at the same time I've learned to stop,

reflect, and pay attention to my body and what it needs, instead of just pushing through."

Prior to the competition, Charlie expressed that winning a medal would be a goal, however, competing with Team GB was a significant accomplishment in itself. His family, including his wife Jenny, son and daughter, and grandson, travelled to Germany to support him and the other GB competitors. His family were able to witness his medal haul for the first time

Charlie swam in the following categories and brought home 4 medals.

Men's 100m Freestyle ISE -GOLD CHARLES Paul GBR

It governs the delivery of the Invictus Games, runs an online community, as well as provides sport recovery and adventurous challenge opportunities beyond the Games across 23 nations. Prince Harry, The Duke of Sussex is the founder of the Invictus Games and Patron of the Invictus Games Foundation, created following the delivery of the inaugural 2014 event.

Through providing sport recovery opportunities and adventurous challenge, the Foundation's work supports long-term improvements in physical and mental health, inspires and motivates wider society, and helps wounded, injured and sick servicemen and women re-engage with their families and communities.

The online community is facilitated via We Are Invictus, a bespoke mobile app and platform built by and for the WIS community.

At the sixth Invictus Games the RBL supported 59 veterans and serving personnel, plus their friends and family, in partnership with the Ministry of Defence.

Each year, Valentine's Day triggers poignant memories for Becky, a former member of HM The Royal Marines Band Service.

Because it was on 14th February that her promising and much-cherished career in the Royal Marines came to an end. She had no idea just how much her life was about to be turned upside down.

As a child, Becky loved playing the piano and she became a talented pianist and flautist. On leaving school, she joined the RM Band and was steadily climbing the ranks. She was picked out for a Junior Command Course and was full of enthusiasm and hope for the future.

All was going to plan – and the physically demanding endurance course was all that stood between her and the next stage of her career progression.

How or what happened on that fateful day has never been fully understood, but half-way through successfully tackling the various obstacles, she started to experience pain in her hip. It gradually became worse but she nevertheless managed to make it back to camp.

Over the next few months, in increasing discomfort and personal distress, she underwent lots of treatment and a myriad of tests to try and establish the cause. Unable to sit or stand for long periods of time, it became evident that she would no longer be fit enough to remain a Royal Marine nor to play again professionally.

She was having to face inevitable medical discharge. A successful, colourful and high-profile career as a member of the world-renowned Royal Marines Band, was over.

Not only having to endure ongoing pain, she believed also that she had no marketable skills whatsoever to do anything else. With no idea about what she was going to do with the rest of her life, she was suffering severe physical and mental distress.

Cue RMA – The Royal Marines Charity's Employment & Education team who specialise in supporting into 'civvy street', those whose career in the Corps has been cut short due to injury or sickness.

In just a few one-on-one sessions, they helped her recognise the many skills she unknowingly possessed, helping her adjust her CV to emphasise the advanced database skills and practical event management

experience she had gathered over 14 years in the Royal Marines.

This played a vital part in her transition to the commercial world. All her misgivings of being 'just a musician' without any useful transferable skills were completely dispelled.

"At the time I was very nervous and apprehensive not only about leaving the military, but also whether I would be able to get a job," Becky says. "I had been a musician my entire career and suddenly had to look in a different direction for employment. I was totally overwhelmed and in a bad place physically and emotionally."

RMA - The Royal Marines Charity secured Becky a trial position in the marketing team of a large construction company where she quickly excelled and helped to greatly improve efficiencies.

The good news? She was offered a full-time job and has never looked back. Becky has since continued to move onwards and upwards and is now the Proposal Manager with one of the UK's leading construction and engineering companies.

She says: "Without the support of the RMA, I wouldn't be where I am today. I cannot thank them enough for the help they gave me to transition so successfully – and happily - into civilian life."

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














STUDENT OFFICER CADETS COMPLETE EPIC CHARITY WALK ALONG PLYMOUTH BREAKWATER


