MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

Marilyn Quinn's story begins in Connecticut, where she was born and raised. Like many in her community, she initially identified as a Democrat. After graduating from Albertus Magnus College in New Haven, CT, Marilyn moved to Albany, NY, where she worked in test development for the State of New York. Her work was crucial in creating exams for caseworkers and probation officers, and she played an instrumental role in developing the very first test for the title "Commissioner of Human Rights" for New York State.

Her first voting experience was in 1964, a year she still recalls with regret, having cast her vote for Lyndon Johnson. However, fate had a different path in store for her. In 1965, she married Jim, a man with a Master's degree in History who had voted for Barry Goldwater in that same election. Through Jim's guidance and his deep understanding of history and politics, Marilyn became a conservative and never looked back.

The Quinns moved to Greenbelt, MD, in 1967 and settled into their first home in New Carrollton by 1970. During this time, Marilyn became active in her local church, serving as president of the Women of St. Hugh's and working with the Ladies of Charity. In 1978, they relocated to Bowie, where they raised their family.

In 1995, Marilyn and Jim made their final move to Dunkirk, in beautiful Calvert County. There, their neighbor, Joyce Terhes, ensured that Marilyn and Jim were registered Republicans. Joyce, a formidable influence in the community, also encouraged Marilyn to join the Republican Women Leaders of Calvert (RWLC) as a charter member. Marilyn served as the club's treasurer for six years and continues to be an active participant in meetings as her schedule allows.

Today, Marilyn is proud to be the mother of four, grandmother of eight, and greatgrandmother of three. Her dedication to her family, her church, and her political values is inspiring, and we are proud to have her as part of our community.
