If anyone hasn't seen the post on our Facebook page, at our General Meeting Cde Mel Lee donated an original Edmonton Journal newspaper reporting on the end of the war in Europe. This paper is a real piece of history and we are honoured that it can now be hung on the walls of our Legion.

It's one again a busy time at the Legion with the Poppy Campaign kicking off shortly and the Remembrance Day ceremony. Our current social situation had us make some adjustments on how we can do these this year, but with the planning from our Poppy Chair, Cde Andrew Benkovich, and our Sgt-at-Arms, Cde Larry Funge, I'm confident that both will be successful.

Next month is traditionally our elections month and we do have some executives and committee members stepping down. Once again, due to our current social situation we have to make a change to how these are done. Dominion has advised against holding elections until distancing restrictions have been lifted. Until that time, any positions that need to be filled are to be appointments by Branch Presidents until the time comes when Branches can hold regular elections. We have had people come forward stating they would like to fill some of our positions so they will be appointed by me next month. There are still positions that need to be filled for our committees, so again, if anybody is interested the board will remain up in the foyer of the Legion for people to add their names. Committee Chairs are appointments and are for a one year term.

The President along with fellow Executive Committee members met on Thursday evening October 22 to plan November 11 Remembrance Day Service. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the Service will be of an altered format and follow AHS guidelines and recommendations.

This year the Branch is planning to host an In-House Remembrance Day Service on November 11 commencing at 10:45 AM. The Service will be held in our hall with the maximum seating allowed by AHS guidelines. As seating will be limited we will be giving priority seating in the hall to our Branch Veterans and our invited dignitaries. We are in the process of contacting our Branch Veterans via phone to confirm their participation at this years Service. Once we confirm the Veteran count which has a deadline of Nov. 7, we will then let everyone know how many seats will be available for branch members. We will be using the lounge as it is presently set up for overflow seating for the Service only. After the Service our lounge will open from 1200-1800 hours. After the Service we will reconfigure the hall with tables and chairs to allow for seating as per AHS quidelines for socializing.

As per recommendations by the Government of Canada there will be no public participation at Remembrance Day. It is recommended that the public stay home and watch the Service in Ottawa on November 11 on TV or their mobile devices. We are actively pursuing a Live Streaming of the Service in our hall on mobile devices so our members can watch from home. We will let the membership know as soon as possible if this can be accomplished.

As there will be no public participation this year it was decided to hold the service in our hall to overcome any inclement weather and allows parking for our Veterans and guests.

This year has been a difficult one for our Branch. The planning for this years November 11 Service has been a challenge but I wish to thank our branch President and Executive members and our membership for assisting me in what we believe is the best solution for this year.

There will be minor changes that may be needed prior to November 11. I ask that our membership please be understanding of the situation we are all experiencing. I will endeavour to communicate any further information as soon as it is available.





10 Quick Facts on... Remembrance Day

Remembrance Day was first observed in 1919 throughout the British Commonwealth. It was originally called "Armistice Day" to commemorate armistice agreement that ended the First World War on Monday, November 11, 1918, at 11 a.m.—on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month.

From 1921 to 1930, Armistice Day was held on the Monday of the week in which November 11 fell. In 1931, Alan Neill, Member of Parliament for Comox—Alberni, introduced a bill to observe Armistice Day only on November 11. Passed by the House of Commons, the bill also changed the name to "Remembrance Day". The first Remembrance Day was observed on November 11, 1931.

Every year on November 11, Canadians pause in a moment of silence to honour and remember the men and women who have served, and continue to serve Canada during times of war, conflict and peace. We remember the more than 2,300,000 Canadians who have served throughout our nation's history and the more than 118,000 who made the ultimate sacrifice.

The poppy is the symbol of Remembrance Day. Replica poppies are sold by the Royal Canadian Legion to provide assistance to Veterans.

Remembrance Day is a federal statutory holiday in Canada. It is also a statutory holiday in three territories (Yukon, Northwest Territories and Nunavut) and in six provinces (British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland and Labrador).

The national ceremony is held at the National War Memorial in Ottawa. The Governor General of Canada presides over the ceremony. It is also attended by the Prime Minister, other government officials, representatives of Veterans' organizations, diplomatic representatives, other dignitaries, Veterans as well as the general public.

In advance of the ceremony, long columns of Veterans, Canadian Armed Forces members, RCMP officers, and cadets march to the memorial lead by a pipe band and a colour guard. At the end of the ceremony, they march away to officially close the ceremony.

Some of the 54 Commonwealth member states, such as Canada, the United Kingdom and Australia, observe the tradition of Remembrance Day on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. Other nations observe a solemn day but at different dates. For example, ANZAC Day is observed in New Zealand on April 25. In South Africa, Poppy Day is marked on the Sunday that falls closest to November 11.

Many nations that are not members of the Commonwealth also observe Remembrance Day on November 11, including France, Belgium and Poland.

The United States used to commemorate Armistice Day on November 11. However, in 1954 they changed the name to Veterans Day.
