WELCOME OUR KEYNOTE **SPEAKER**



Dr. Takeisha Charles Davis was born and raised in New Orleans, Louisiana. After surviving being stabbed three times in her senior year of high school, Dr. Davis entered Xavier University of Louisiana with a desire to serve the public through the field of medicine. Dr. Davis' passion for medicine was nurtured at Xavier, where she graduated Summa Cum Laude, and cultivated at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, where she earned her Doctor of Medicine. During her Pediatric Residency at Children's Medical Center in Dallas, Dr. Davis was selected to serve as Chief Resident and decided to forego a fellowship opportunity to pursue a more nontraditional career path of becoming a public health physician and healthcare administrator.

After securing a Masters in Public Health from the Harvard School of Public Health in 2005, Dr. Davis returned to the Louisiana Department of Health and Hospitals where she supervised the clinical aspects of the Special Needs Shelter and Temporary Medical Operations and Staging Area opened at Nicholls State University to serve over 20,000 residents evacuated during Hurricane Katrina. Over the next 10 years she served in various positions for the State of Louisiana, including the last five years as the Director of the Center for Community and Preventive Health, Office of Public Health Medical Director, and Assistant State Health Officer for the Louisiana Department of Health and Hospitals. In this capacity, she directed public health services delivered through 70 clinics statewide, the state laboratory, and state pharmacy.

Dr. Davis' experience in clinical care, community engagement and healthcare systems, led to her selection to serve as the President and Chief Executive Officer of the New Orleans East Hospital in January 2016. At NOEH, Dr. Davis is committed to reducing disparities in health outcomes and promoting health equity by focusing on evidence-based, clinical and population health initiatives. Since taking the helm as the only African American Female Hospital CEO in the State of Louisiana, Dr. Davis has grown the hospital's admissions and outpatient visits annually, overseen capital expansion, improved quality scores, and increased profit margins by implementing expense controls. In addition, she has championed public health initiatives and innovation including starting a Diabetes Center of Excellence in partnership with the National Diabetes and Research Institute and the Cleveland Clinic.

Dr. Davis continues to chart her own path as a founding member of Achieving Awesome Things Through Inspired Actions (AATTIA), an empowerment group for adolescents. Through this association and Taylor Made Medical Consulting LLC, established by Dr. Davis in 2006, she is able to support and encourage young people to achieve their greatest potential. This led to a preventive health lecture series with incarcerated youth and a feature story in "Against All Odds...Celebrating Black Women in Medicine". Dr. Davis has received numerous awards in recognition of her work including being named to the 2018 Becker's Hospital Review's Annual List of 143 Women Hospital and Health System Leaders to Know. She is a well sought-after speaker and thought leader on issues of public health, healthcare administration, and health equity and served on the Health Transition Committees for both Louisiana Governor John Bel Edwards and New Orleans Mayor Latoya Cantrell. Recently, in response to her leadership in providing lifesaving care to patients in a COVID 19 hotspot and sounding the alarm regarding disparate health outcomes she was appointed to serve on Louisiana's COVID-19 Health Equity Task Force Executive Committee and Centene Corporation's National Health Disparities Task Force.

Dr. Davis currently serves on the governing boards of the New Orleans Medical Association, New Orleans Business Alliance, Camp AATTIA, and United Way of Southeast Louisiana. She is also a member of The National Medical Association, Links, Incorporated, Pontchartrain (LA) Chapter, and is a Past-President of the Louisiana Public Health Association. True to her New Orleans roots, Dr. Davis proudly serves as the President and Founding Parade Captain for the Mystic Krewe of Femme Fatale, the first predominately African American female led Mardi Gras organization in New Orleans. However, Dr. Davis' greatest joy comes from raising her two sons, Waymon and Elie.

William "Beau" Clark , MD

Dr. William "Beau" Clark is a native of Baton Rouge He graduated from Louisiana State University School of Medicine in New Orleans and completed his residency in Emergency Medicine in Baton Rouge. He is board certified by the American Board of Emergency Medicine. Dr. Clark has been the East Baton Rouge Parish Coroner since 2012. Dr. Clark has served as Medical Director for the East Baton Rouge Sheriff's Office SWAT Team, Louisiana State Police SWAT Team, Louisiana House of Representatives, and the Louisiana Department of Health Bureau of EMS. Dr. Clark has been certified as a Diplomate of the American Board of Medicolegal Death Investigators. Dr. Clark is a third degree black belt. He is also an avid endurance athlete who has completed an Ironman Triathlon and several Spartan Races while continuing to train for other endurance events.



Garland Green, MD

Dr. Garland Green serves as the Medical Director for the CIS Baton Rouge location. He joined Cardiovascular Institute of the South in 2012 as an interventional cardiologist. He has provided cardiology care for patients since 2007. Dr. Green earned his Doctorate at Meharry Medical College in Nashville, Tennessee. He completed his internal medicine training residency through the University of Alabama-Birmingham Program, and completed his cardiology and interventional cardiology training at Vanderbilt University Medical Center in Nashville, Tennessee. Dr. Green is board certified in internal medicine and cardiology. He is a member of the American College of Cardiology, the National Medical Association, and the American Medical Association.



Jan Laughinghouse, PhD, LCSW-BACS, LAC, CCS

Jan Laughinghouse, Executive Director at Capital Area Human Services (CAHS), provides prevention, treatment, and developmental disabilities services for seven Louisiana parishes. With over 25 years of experience, she is a licensed clinical social worker, licensed addiction counselor, and certified clinical supervisor. Dr. Laughinghouse, originally from North Carolina, holds a B.A. in Psychology from Bennett College, an M.S.W. from North Carolina A & T State University and The University of North Carolina at Greensboro, and a Ph.D. in Human Development and Family Studies from UNC Greensboro. She has taught at various institutions and uses her clinical skills to educate diverse audiences about substance use disorders, aiming to reduce stigma.

SESSION PRESENTERS

Sunny Wescott, Chief Meteorologist

Sunny Wescott, a Chief Meteorologist at the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA), specializes in national extreme weather hazards and their impacts on key resources. With top honors in Homeland Security Management, Public Safety Administration, and Atmospheric Sciences, she is a member of the American Meteorological Society (AMS) and the International Association of Emergency Managers. Ms. Wescott, a former Lead Meteorologist in the US Air Force, is recognized for her expertise in various climatological events and provides support to multiple federal working groups. In her current role at CISA's Infrastructure Security Division, she conducts Extreme Weather Outreach by delivering targeted reports to regions and critical infrastructure operators during disasters.

Veronica Gillispie, MD, MAS, FACOG,

Dr. Veronica Gillispie-Bell is a Board-Certified Obstetrician & Gynecologist and Associate Professor at Ochsner Health in New Orleans. She serves as Senior Site Lead and Section Head of Women's Services at Ochsner Kenner, and as the Director of Quality for Women's Services for Ochsner Health System. Dr. Gillispie-Bell earned her medical degree from Meharry Medical College, completed residency at Ochsner, and holds a Master of Applied Science in Patient Safety and Healthcare Quality from Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health. She is nationally recognized for her expertise in managing heavy menstrual bleeding associated with fibroids and serves as Medical Director of the Louisiana Perinatal Quality Collaborative. Dr. Gillispie-Bell is a leader in initiatives to improve birth outcomes and eliminate disparities in Louisiana, and she has testified before Congress on maternal mortality issues. She has received numerous accolades for her contributions to clinical care, academia, and community service and has been featured in various local and national media outlets.

Anna Reilly, PhD, MPH

Anna Reilly is an Environmental Health Scientist/Epidemiologist at the Louisiana Department of Health's Office of Public Health. She leads the Louisiana Occupational Health Program, focusing on preventing heat-related illnesses. Dr. Reilly has authored articles and presentations, and in 2021, she secured funding to expand the program's capacity. Using syndromic surveillance, the program provides real-time data on heat-related illnesses to enhance public health response. Dr. Reilly holds a Master's in Public Health in Epidemiology and a Ph.D. in Pharmacology from Louisiana State University Health Sciences Center.

Traci Causey, PhD, MBA, CHES®, SNS

For nearly 20 years, Traci has worked in food and nutrition and public health fields. She managed Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) clinics in Brownsville and Houston, Texas, igniting her passion for public health. Traci held management roles in school districts, state educational agencies, and nonprofits, focusing on health and nutrition programming to address social determinants of health and achieve equity. Currently, as Vice President of Programs & Strategy at the Alliance for a Healthier Generation, she continues her impactful work. Traci holds a Bachelor of Science in Dietetics from the University of Louisiana at Lafayette, and advanced degrees from Texas Woman's University, with credentials as a School Nutrition Specialist and Certified Health Education Specialist.



Earl "Nupsius" Benjamin-Robinson, DrHSc, CPH

Dr. Earl "Nupsius" Benjamin-Robinson serves as the director of the Louisiana Cancer Research Center's Office of Community Outreach & Engagement, while also holding senior roles at the Louisiana Public Health Institute. 


