
COLLECTING THE DREAM

I collect the dream.

That dream is a homeland for the Jewish people. The collection is the artifacts of the struggle and sacrifice that sustained the dream.

Even though that homeland exists, it doesn't mean that the dreaming has ended. It hasn't.

Theodor Herzl, the founder of the Zionist movement, the visionary of the State of Israel, and its dreamer in chief, famously said "If you will it, it is not a dream." He also said, "For Zionism includes not only the yearning for a plot of promised land legally acquired for our weary people, but also the yearning for ethical and spiritual fulfillment."

Herzl's dream was not only about having a land, but of building a model society in that land. His dream has been fulfilled, but it has not yet been completed. Completing it is up to all of us.

I have the world's largest collection of Theodor Herzl memorabilia. I didn't set out to own such a large collection. Truly, it just happened.

Why do I have the collection? Because for me it serves as inspiration to continue to work toward completing the dream - and maybe it will do the same for you. Maybe it will inspire you to determine what work you can do and what completion means.


My interest in Theodor Herzl began at a very young age.

When I was twelve years old, my friend Barry Simon and I wrote a play that was performed by our Grade 7 class at Toronto's United Synagogue Day School. Modelled on the then newly opened Hall of Presidents attraction at Walt Disney World, the play was called the *Hall of Zionists*. The play portrayed sculptures of prominent Zionists talking to one another after the last show of the day, with each one trying to convince the others why he is the most important.

Herzl, performed by the play's co-writer Barry, said:

If it wasn't for my dreaming, none of us would be in this Zionist Hall.


Already in Grade 7 we understood the power of a dream.






In 1984 I was working at Camp Ramah in Canada. To raise money for charity, something called a Shabbat-O-Gram was sold every Friday. Basically, this was a themed piece of stationary that you bought to write a note to a friend that was delivered on Friday afternoon. Herzl died on July 3, 1904 and to commemorate this date 80 years later, we sold Herzl-O-Grams. Each one was ten cents. The next week, Designer Herzl-O-Grams were sold, this time for twenty-five cents each. It was identical to the prior week's stationary, with the addition of a drawing of a Ralph Lauren polo horse. The campers learned a valuable lesson in branding - although I would note that there was no meaningful decline, or increase, in the number of Herzl-O-Grams sold between the first and the second week.

Why do I still have the original *Hall of Zionists* script from 1973 or the Herzl-O-Grams from 1984? It is because I am a collector, and a collector collects.







I am often asked what was the first item in my Herzl collection. It is a portrait of Herzl from the home of my grandparents, Archie and Goldie Matlow, in Ramat Gan. My grandparents moved from Toronto to Israel in 1955. We spent three summers there in the early 1960s enjoying much time at the beach in Herzliya (coincidence? I think not) and visited often until my grandmother died in 1991. In a prominent spot in my grandparents' living room, in a very regal frame, was this portrait. I asked for it as my inheritance. When I opened the frame I discovered that it was a giveaway from the Haaretz newspaper in 1960 to commemorate the centennial of Herzl's birth. This is Item One in my collection. I have since acquired 5,000 more.

Through this book I will share with you some of the most interesting items of my Herzl collection, and introduce you to some of the people who have helped me on this journey.

This book is not intended to be a history lesson. There are more than 40 biographies of Herzl, and new ones are being written each year. Historians can teach you about Herzl much better than I can.

This book is intended to show you what passion can achieve. I don't mean my passion, but the passion of Herzl and his followers through to today. He and they had a dream for a better future for the Jewish people. They were real people who worked to make that dream come true. They needed symbols and objects to motivate others to sign on to the program. They needed something to touch and to hold, to keep the struggle alive. This is the stuff that my collection is made of.

I hope this book inspires you to be a little bit like Herzl, and use your skills and talents to benefit the things that you care about. I hope that one of those things is our tiny State of Israel. It will always need your help.

Danny Levinson rescues Judaica from abandoned synagogues and Jewish centers in the New York area, and preserves them in his New Jersey home. Abraham Madeisker introduced me to Danny in connection with the purchase of the inverse painting that appears on the cover of this book. Danny educates me on collecting and on Israel's history. He is often brought to tears in our phone conversations when he describes his recollection of the day when the Jewish people finally had our own country. He believes we all must continue to support Israel, rhetorically asking "How do you build the State of Israel?" The answer: "Yidl by Yidl."



This is the only Herzl in a bottle anyone has ever seen. Where, when and why it was made is unknown.



The SS Theodor Herzl was a passenger ship that operated from 1957 to 1969 as part of the ZIM line. While at sea, patrons could relax in the Altneuland Hall. *Altneuland* (Old New Land) was Herzl's 1902 novel which depicted what the Jewish State would look like 20 years in the future. The Hebrew translation of the book's title is *Tel Aviv*.


Manfred Anson (1922 - 2012) was introduced to me by Alan Scop who took me to Bergenfield, New Jersey to meet him. Manfred amassed a vast collection of Herzl memorabilia which he exhibited at the Yeshiva University Museum in 1997. That exhibition serves as a model for my exhibits. Manfred's collection is now at the Central Zionist Archives in Jerusalem, and his passion for Herzl collecting lives on through those (like me) who had the privilege to meet him.



When Herzl visited Jerusalem in 1898, he stayed at the Stern House in the Mamilla neighbourhood. Manfred asked the Stern House owner for, and was gifted, a ceramic plaque that was hanging at that site. Manfred made two castings from the original. I have one and the other is in the Manfred Anson collection that was donated to the Central Zionist Archives.




Arnie Druck was once referred to as "the Israeli man who collected everything." The neighbour of my sister in Jerusalem, I had heard about Arnie's collections for years. On one trip to Israel, Arnie graciously invited me to see them. After seeing the highlights of Arnie's Herzl collection, I left feeling a little down since my own collection paled in comparison to his. Within about a year, he offered to sell it all to me. It arrived in 15 boxes. In selling the collection to me, he promised me that if he finds other Herzl items that he owned at the time of the sale, he will send them to me as I bought "all of it." Several years later, we met in Jerusalem for coffee and Arnie handed me the additional articles he found after the initial sale. Sadly, Arnie passed away in 2017.



Carnet de Bal (lady's ball notebook) given as a gift to Mrs. Fanny Wolffsohn in September 1899 by Dr. Max Maldestam, one of the leaders of the Russian Zionists. Includes 14 greetings from prominent Zionists including Herzl (signed as Benjamin): "To my dearest friend for eternal memory." Fanny Wolffsohn was the wife of David Wolffsohn who succeeded Herzl as the President of the Zionist Organization after Herzl's death in 1904.



Herzl convened the First Zionist Congress in Basel in 1897, and attended five more Congresses during his lifetime. Artist E.M. Lilien took this iconic photograph of Herzl on the balcony of Basel's Three Kings Hotel at the Fifth Zionist Congress in 1901. The image was reproduced on postcards and other items. This postcard was signed in August 1903 by Herzl and other prominent Zionists (Max Nordau, Israel Zangwill, Jacob De Haas, David Wolffsohn, Oscar Marmorek and Alfred Klee).



Dr. Yermiyahu (Yeri) Rimon (born in Haifa, 1933 - 2018) amassed one of the largest and most important collections on the history of Palestine and Zionism. Dr. Motti Friedman called and advised me that Yeri's collections of Herzl, Zionist Congresses and Zionist Shekels were being sold. Meron Eren of Kedem Auction House in Jerusalem coordinated the sale. Each item was accompanied by a handwritten description including when it was acquired and at what cost, demonstrating Yeri's devotion to the scholarship of his collection. Sadly, Yeri died shortly after this photograph was taken.





Not one but two brands of Herzl sardines: the 1934 Levant Fair Gold Medal winning Portuguese sardines sold in Palestine, and Norwegian sardines purchased for The Oriental Fisheries Co. of Chicago.



The 20th Zionist Congress was held in Zurich in 1937. This map of Zurich was prepared by the Organization of Women in Support of Restaurants in Zurich That Do Not Serve Alcohol.

Postcard from the Seventh Zionist Congress in 1905, the first Congress held after Herzl's death. Herzl watches as the march to Jewish sovereignty continues without him. Signed by many Congress delegates bringing "Greetings from the Seventh Zionist Congress to our friends in Toronto."





Moshe and Mira Romano operate the Romano House of Stamps from Tel Aviv's Dizengoff Center Mall. Among other things, the Romanos sold to me a collection of envelopes addressed to Herzl at various locations which they had acquired from a collector in Switzerland.

Envelopes addressed to Herzl, including one to him at the Hotel Castille in Paris where three years previously he wrote *Der Judenstaat* (The Jewish State).






Isidore Baum from Montreal has been sending me the new issues of Israeli stamps and first day covers since I was ten years old. He has found for me Herzl on stamps from various countries, and made special commemorative covers to supplement my collection. I once asked him to find for me a Herzl autograph, which he did at an international stamp exhibition in Jerusalem. I have since acquired 27 more.

Stamp signifying an instalment payment towards the purchase of a share of the Jewish Colonial Trust, the first Zionist bank, which was incorporated in England in 1899.





Shaul Ladany lives in Omer, Israel. He is a survivor of Bergen Belsen and of the 1972 Olympic Games in Munich, at which 11 of his fellow Olympians were murdered by terrorists. Each year on his birthday, he walks his age in kilometres. He has amassed a very significant collection of Herzl memorabilia that is displayed together with his other collections on shelves and on every inch of wall space in his home. He combines his passion for Herzl and for racewalking by participating in the annual Herzl March.


There is an annual Herzl March in Israel's Hulda Forest. The Hulda Forest was planted by the Jewish National Fund in Herzl's memory starting in 1904.





Yacov Tsachor owns Tel Aviv Stamps (Y. Tsachor) Ltd. and is recognized by the Israel Philatelic Federation as an expert for all Holy Land areas. His auctions include Zionist Congresses and Herzliana. As Herzl and Zionist Congress postcards are philatelic items, many items in my collection originate with Yacov, and his catalogues (which preceded eBay) gave me the first indication of the breadth of the Herzl items that are available to collect.

In 1913, enterprising students at Tel Aviv's Herzliya Gymnasium operated a local mail service. For the price of a Jewish National Fund Stamp, letters deposited in a blue and white mailbox, bearing a Magen David and the inscription "Hebrew Mail", would be delivered. This first ever Hebrew postal service operated during the High Holidays of 1913 and 1914 until closed by order of the Turkish authorities.



I first met Alan Scop of Menorah Antiques Ltd. of Brooklyn, New York when I purchased an item from him online. He quickly called me to ask who I was. He said he knew most of the Judaica collectors and didn't know me yet. After I told him of my interest in collecting Herzl, the emails with offers started to flow: Zionist Congress postcards, share certificates, Herzl portraits and a red Bohemian crystal goblet, for starters. Alan was a friend of Manfred Anson and took me to visit him in Bergenfield, New Jersey. Through Alan, I purchased all of Manfred's Herzl items that were discovered in his house after Manfred's collection was donated to the Central Zionist Archives.




Herzl died on July 3, 1904 while convalescing in Edlach, Austria. He was 44 years old.

Notice of Herzl's funeral on July 7, 1904 in Vienna, together with Chevra Kadisha (Burial Society) pin.






Beseler Lantern Slide Company (New York), colourized slide of Herzl's funeral.






Program for Memorial Mass Meeting in Carnegie Hall, New York on July 17, 1904.



In accordance with Herzl's will, on August 17th, 1949 he was reburied in the Jewish State which he envisioned, on what is now called Mount Herzl.



Herzl's three children, Paulina, Hans and Trude, were dependent on others for financial support after their father's death in 1904 and their mother's death three years later. Receipt signed by Hans Herzl for funds received from the Union of Zionist Revisionists on September 9, 1930, six days before his death from self-inflicted bullet wounds shortly after attending Paulina's funeral.



In 1903, Herzl met Boris Schatz for coffee and strudel in a Viennese cafe. Schatz was a successful artist and sculptor who envisioned the land of Israel as the centre for a new national Jewish art form. Schatz moved to Palestine in 1906 and founded the Bezalel School in Jerusalem. He made this terracotta relief profile portrait of Herzl in Vienna (ca. 1903 to 1905) and took it with him to Palestine as it appears in this photograph from 1907 on a postcard from that time.



Meron Eren co-founded Jerusalem's Kedem Auction House in 2008. Meron's focus is on items related to Jewish and Israeli history and culture. Over the years, I have purchased many items offered at Kedem's auctions (experts are hired to describe each item, making their auction catalogues a valuable resource) and Meron acted as the agent of Yeri Rimon on the sale of his collections to me.



Theo, the Herzl mascot, has appeared in the Celebrate Israel Parade in New York, Toronto's UJA Walk With Israel and other celebrations. Manufactured by Street Characters Inc. of Calgary, Canada in 2015.


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



I was wandering the streets of Jerusalem one day and fell upon a flea market. There was an unaccompanied table that had a box of postcards for sale, some of which were from the Zionist Congresses of the early 1900s. I was told to return in a few hours to meet the person whose items were for sale, which I did, and met Tomer Kaufmann. Tomer told me he had lucked upon the Jerusalem home of Egon Zweig, a prominent Viennese Zionist who died in 1920, while the apartment was being positioned for sale by a descendant. He acquired the treasure trove of Zionist papers in the house, and years later sold Zweig's correspondence with Herzl to me.

Abraham Madeisker owns Trionfo, an antique store off of Ben Yehudah Street in Jerusalem. I initially found the store while wandering downtown, and among old records, vintage clothing, dusty books and various knickknacks, often a Herzl item can be found. Abraham also emails me when something Herzl-related arrives in his shop, which keeps the conversation going between trips to Israel. Abraham introduced me to Danny Levinson.





Ofek Wertman is an artist, designer and animator who lives in Tel Aviv. He creates contemporary, colourful, Israeli, pop art style designs featuring Zionist historical figures, one of whom is Herzl. Ofek's items are sold in museums and gift shops and he has had a significant role in making Herzl cool (at least to the extent that a person who died in 1904 can be made cool).

I first met Dr. Motti Friedman when he was the Director of the Herzl Museum in Jerusalem. He was later the Academic Director of the Central Zionist Archives and arranged for me to visit the Herzl Room, which contains Herzl's personal papers and manuscripts, and the Manfred Anson Room next door which hosts Manfred's donated collection. Motti introduced me to Yeri Rimon, which resulted in my purchasing Yeri's collections. Motti spent two days in my Toronto home looking at the collection, and after arrival did not leave the house until returning to the airport.






Hadi Orr has a vast collection of all things Israeliana, and is a connector among the most serious of Israel's collector community. Hadi introduced me to Shaul Ladany. Hadi and Shaul and others attend the weekly flea markets in Tel Aviv and Jaffa. As (fortunately for me) Hadi does not collect Herzl, he searches for Herzl items for me all year and annually delivers them to me in Canada at his cottage property north of Toronto.

Israel Herzl is a visual artist who lives in Kfar Saba, Israel. His aim is to specialize in painting Zionist leaders. He is a descendant of Theodor Herzl's uncle - in other words Israel is Herzl's first cousin three times removed. He has exhibited six different solo exhibitions in galleries in Jaffa, Caesarea, Jerusalem and Kfar Saba. Israel Herzl's artwork was featured in "Herzl Paints Herzl", a series of exhibitions that ran from 2016 to 2018 in three locations across Europe under the auspices of the Israeli Foreign Ministry, and another three locations across Israel.






Martin and Shelli Kalson moved from Ottawa, Canada to Ginot Shomron, Israel in 1995. They transform historical maps of Israel and other Holy Land documents into framed gift items primarily for diplomats, executives and professionals. Martin's father Ivan was evacuated from England during World War II and lived in Toronto in my grandparents' home.

Jonathan Fishburn deals in antiquarian and second-hand books, specializing in Judaica and Hebraica from Golders Green, London, England. Through Jonathan, I acquired a bound set of England's Jewish Chronicle newspapers from 1896 to 1904, the period of Herzl's Zionist efforts. He found for me a letter from Israel Zangwill that describes his excitement about his upcoming attendance at the First Zionist Congress in 1897. Jonathan sourced for me the bound volume of the 1902 Royal Commission on Alien Immigration which contains Herzl's statement, delivered in English, to the commissioners.





The sculpture of Herzl was made by Boris Schatz, the founder of the Bezalel School, for the Theodor Herzl Public School in Chicago which opened in 1915. The bust is now located at the head office of the United Jewish Fund of Metropolitan Chicago.

Chicago's Herzl School was built in 1915 in the then predominantly Jewish North Lawndale area. Over the last century, the neighbourhood has changed to be primarily African American and Hispanic, but the name of the school has not. Principal Tamara Davis and her team of dedicated educators refer to Herzl as a Martin Luther King Jr., an inspiring leader who worked hard to improve the future for his people.

Berlin's Theodor Herzl School operated until it was closed by the Nazis in 1939. In 1942, school principal Paula Furst, who signed this report card, was deported to Auschwitz and murdered.






Eli Tal-El is a Jerusalem-based documentary film maker. He is also my brother-in-law. *My Herzl* is Eli's film about me and Herzl, and how we are connected through the collection. My fiftieth birthday celebration was held at the Three Kings Hotel in Basel, where Herzl stayed and was photographed on the balcony. I asked Eli to bring his camera (he later said this was like asking a dentist to bring his drill on a vacation). At the beginning of the project, Eli found my passion for Herzl to be absurd. By the time the movie was done, he saw Herzl as I do: as a normal person who accomplished great things through his intellect and effort.

When My Herzl was screened at the Chicago Festival of Israeli Cinema, we had the opportunity to visit the Theodor Herzl Public School in North Lawndale where Herzl continues to serve as a role model to work to make change, as proof that the past does not need to dictate the future, and as an inspiration that if you want something badly enough it need not remain a dream.

Herzl's dream was fulfilled.

This book combines the talents of many people, starting with the individuals who made the items that appear in the book as a tribute to Herzl, and to keep his memory alive. It worked, because we are still talking about him today.
