Her last Sunday at church services was January 6, 1974, Communion Sunday, and she remarked how lovely the Communion table looked.

Her father was George W. Howard, and her mother, Flora (Loud) Howard, brothers and sister Ernest, Frank, Ray and Theda, of which Frank and Theda are still living.

Those of us that knew her loved her. She leaves a vacant spot but memories "I'm sure" will continue for years.
