There were many years when there were no separate East Orford entries and almost no separate ones by 1940. Orford, Orfordville, East Piermont and Atwell Hill have items concerning East Orford folks and I have included them as appropriate. The communities of East Orford and Atwell Hill [Wentworth] were particularly close, both in geography and social\family interaction. Folks in East Orford who attended church did so on Atwell Hill, at the Baptist Church, where I attended until about 1960 and where some East Orford folks still attend.

Only the Opinion and Gazette covered Orford for more than two-three decades. The Courier is still in business but stopped covering Orford in April, 1925.

Sometimes the entries labeled 'East Orford' are from west of Mt. Cube but I only include those entries east of the end of the mountain unless they are labeled 'East Orford.'

Note; E.C. Chase was Ezra Chase, who built the house on the northeast corner of Route 25-A and Route 10 in the 1880s. He was apparently very involved in Orford affairs, promoting the early installation of telephones and investing in a cheese factory, according to <u>Thanks To The Past</u>. The house burned c.1970.

The exercises were fine, being rendered mostly by children. Remarks were made by Elder H.P. Adams and Henry Chase.

Note: The 'good variety of "Pease" for which the place is famous' would have been Della, 14, Edna, 11, Gladys, 8, and Vernie, 7, all daughters of Francis R. and Mabel Sherburn Pease. Perhaps also Eva, daughter of Chase and Julia Pease.

Alanson Haines

The following in relation to a former New Hampshire man is taken from the Laramie, Wyoming, Daily Republican of Feb. 6. Mr. Haines was, until his removal to the West, a resident of Wentworth, also in his younger days, of Orford.

"Alanson Haines, without doubt the oldest man in Albany county and among the eldest in the state, died at his home this afternoon. He had been confined to his home for two weeks and for the past week to bed. The end came peacefully, Mr. Haines having been in a state of coma for several hours preceding the final dissolution. Mr. Haines was born in New Hampshire June 21, 1812, and came to Laramie with his wife and son, Alanson L. Haines, in 1882, he having been a resident of the city since then. His wife, Hannah T. Haines, died November 28, 1882, shortly after coming to this city. His son, Alanson, died Feb. 16, 1887, and his son's wife, Harriet P. Haines, died June 4, 1904. They are all buried in the cemetery here. Mr. Haines was a man with the keenest sense of honor and the strictest integrity; remarkable for these as well as well as for his wonderful vitality. He has been a faithful, honorable citizen, at all times ready to do the best he knew how. Mr. Haines is perhaps the last of the Haines family. He had brothers and sisters, but they have all gone ahead of him, leaving him alone of a not very large family. He belonged to no church or secret society, but his Bible was his constant companion, its well thumbed pages indicating the trust he placed in its sacred words."

Note: This is the man from whom great-grandfather Luther Perry Sherburn bought the Sherburn\Pease farm in East Orford in 1966. I think he lived in Wentworth after that until he moved to Wyoming.

LIFE IN SUMMER CAMP.

How City Boys Find Pleasure in the Town of Orford.

In the eastern part of Orford on the shore of Baker's pond is a summer camp of growing reputation. Nearly the whole surrounding area or 300 acres of land were purchased by Prof. Virgil Prettyman, principal of the Horace Mann school, allied with Columbia university of New York: The pond, containing about a square mile, is nearly surrounded by heavily wooded hills and mountains, and is ten miles from, the railroad on the Connecticut river.

Here Professor Prettyman has erected suitable structures for carrying on a valuable educational work for the city youths.

The camp is fitted out with a men's hall, containing rooms for eating, reading and recreation on stormy days; fire-place, library and piano. This building is situated on the hill side, almost concealed by the lofty, and thickly leaved trees, while at a little distance are the "boxes" or well ventilated huts for sleeping, each one containing ample room for cots to accommodate a master and eight or ten boys. The boat house by the pond is a large two-story building, with a workshop in the second floor. Here boats and canoes are to be had, some of which are made by the campers under the direction of a practical woodworker, who gives instructions in car-

A former member of the United States Commission of Forestry gives instruction in forestry with the aid of the varied types of trees found in the surrounding country. Metallurgy is also taught, as well as the arts and crafts for which excellent opportunity is afforded.

A typical camp day is reveille at 6.45, followed by setting-up exercises and a hasty run to the pond in nature's apparel for a morning dip, which serves thoroughly to awaken the boys. This causes some grumbling on the part of the tenderfoot, especially on a cold morning or in a drizzling rain, but when the breakfast call at 7.30 is heard the stimulated appetites are appeased by the cook with a meal that satisfies and makes the morning ordeal a thing of the past.

Fach boy has his share of cleaning up to do, followed by inspection of camp by the professor., The ambitious or deficient students may devote the morning hours to study if they wish, or such other occupations as appeal to them. But at 11 o'clock all assemble at the boat house. and indulge in the daily swimming exercise. The novices are taught by a swimming master, while the more skilled are the admiration of the learners.

At 2 o'clock the athletic field with its attractions of diamond, tennis courts and gridiron furnishes amusement and recreation under the supervision of an athletic master. Baseball has been the prominent game with the public. Only one game out of eleven with the neighboring teams has thus far been lost. It is in practice games between masters and boys that the latter pay back for various fancied wrongs, especially if they are able to sufficiently bribe the umpire. However, the wrongs are only fancied, for the masters are not tyrants, but graduates from several colleges selected because of their influence over and ability to handle boys in the right way.

Again the boys are "in the swim" except those who have been "soaked out of the water" for some infringement of the few camp rules. But discipline is not severe. In the years of camping not a boy has been sent home.

Supper is served at 6 o'clock and the boys scatter over the lake as they will until darkness, when they gather around the campfire, where take place story telling and singing with banjos, mandolins and guitar accompaniment. At 9 o'clock tatto starts the boys to bed and fifteen minutes later taps sound and

the camp drops to sleep.

Besides the variety afforded in camp the tramps about the country are a long remembered experience. Parties are constantly on the go. It may be with grip sack to the overlooking Mount Cube where single nights are spent, or on a ten days tour through the White mountains. After a day of chaffed shoulder's, sore feet and weary body, he spreads his blankets upon a balsam bed and eats his bacon and drinks from a tin cup the coffee, all prepared by himself.

While on the longer trips deserted barns are occupied when possible, and if not, shacks are built of available material. The bill of fare, coffee, bacon and oatmeal is varied, according to the stock and proximity of the country store. An occasional meal at a hotel will be remembered by the hard-worked waiters. The boy accustomed to the idleness and luxury of a New York home is somewhat surprised at camp experience.

Nearly seventy, including college stu-dents, are in the Moosilaukee camp and they enjoy it so much that two-thirds of them return a second or third year.



SOLDIER'S BODY HOME

Pvt. Norman E. Nutter Gave Life in France June 23, 1944

The body of Private Norman E. Nutter, 20, son of Mrs. Flora Gilbert of 14 Mill St., Barre, arrived at the Falrice station late Tuesday afternoon for military funeral service and burial here at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. Stores honored his arrival by closing at the time the train arrived.

Private Nutter was killed in action in France on June 23, 1944 and his body is the first of World War II of Orford to be returned home. He was born in Waits River on April 3, 1924. He entered the military service on April 23, 1943 and served with a signal corps unit for a few months and later transferred to desert training in Arizona for infantry warfare before sailing for overseas.

Besides his mother he is survived by the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. Eugene Stefanazzi; Gordon Gilbert, Mrs. Eubun Frost; and Rowane Nutter, all of Barre; Mrs. Dorothy Conly of St. Johnsbury; Mrs. Lucille Perry, Orford; Mrs. Marion Bockus of Kennbunkport, Me.; Deane Kinne of Bedford, Me.; and Kenneth Nutter of Orford; besides several nieces and nephews.

Kenneth Mack, son of the late Mebel and Fred Mack, was born in Orford Sept. 28, 1822. He received his education in this town, and after graduating at High school he was employed by Goodyear Manufacturing company at Windsor, and later by Bryant Chucking Grinder Co. at Springfield.

He enfered the United States service in September, 1943, trained at Camp Croft, S. C., and went overseas for active duty in 1944. He participated in five major battles and was once a prisoner of the Germans. He was one of the first soldiers to march into Rome on July 9, 1944.

His unit was assaulting an enemy position in central Italy when he was struck and killed by shell fire fragment from enemy artillery. He was buried in a United States cemetery in central Italy. Later, when it became necessary to remove the bodies it was decided to bring him home.

He was caretaker of the Moosilauke Camp for more than 50 years and built that camp and Camp Pemigewassett. At the age of 10, I tried to help. I remember Warren telling me those nails go in better if you hit them on the head. I guess I was missing a few as we nailed down the roof boards (no plywood at that time) Cabins 1,2, and 3 were built ready for the summer of '49. Some 32 campers started that year and it was a great success, as we now boast 120 girls per session.

Shortly after that opening season, Warren died. What a fitting tribute to him and a lasting monument.


