Pease Family News In Plymouth, N.H., Record, 1940-44

Compiled by Art Pease, 2023

There is some family news beginning in 1887, mostly from Wentworth, with some random items from Ellsworth, Plymouth, Warren and occasionally an Orford report. In February 1899, there begins to be a report from East Orford almost every week. It only lasts until early 1900, but there is some material I have not seen, such as that there was a Clifford and another Sherburn family in that part of Orford. There are also sporadic Orford reports in later years. I'll move the specific East Orford, Camps, Sherburn and Goodwin items to those compilations but otherwise, there is so much Pease family material that I won't transfer.

When an item concerns East Orford, I have written that even though it usually just says Orford. I also got sick of making name corrections, so have written the correct name when I know it. For example, Dorice and Mabel Pease, instead of Doris and Mable.

When I was in the first grade, I used to run to my grandfather's house (Sam Alessandrini) for lunch on occasion, and after returning to school for the afternoon, I'd fall asleep at my desk. Barbara contacted my mom (Marion Alessandrini) to ask if I was getting enough sleep. It took them a few days to figure it out. When I was eating lunch at my grandfather's house, he would give me a small glass of red wine. I was used to seeing the men around the table drinking red wine during our Sunday dinners, so I would drink the whole glass. Going back inside the classroom after lunch, where it was warmer than it was outside, made me sleepy and I'd doze off. I remember the "talk" my mother had with my grandfather and that stopped.

I was also good friends with Richie's grandmother Dot and grandfather Alanson Pike. When Richie was learning to drive, Alanson would load their garbage into his station wagon, then drive to Richie's house to get his garbage. At that point, Richie would take over driving and come to my house to get me and take us all to the dump, where we would unload everything. Then Richie would drive us back to his house where we'd watch the New York Giants football games with his father "big" Rich. Good times.

Richie's grandparents were retired but during the summer they used to do the laundry on weekends for the Camp Moosilauke "city" boys. They would have returned almost immediately but doctors didn't want them traveling cross country with me only a few days old so waited until I was 6 weeks.

About San Francisco, Westley Muzzey from Wentworth was in the navy. At some point his ship was in to Hunters Point for repairs. Somehow, through letters from home I guess, Dad learned Westley was there and he looked him up. I didn't know Westley until I started working at Thermal Dynamics in 1979, he was there for several years until he retired. He would often tell me about that Dad was the only person from Wentworth that he saw during all the time he was in the navy.

Dad's eyes were fine. I understood they rejected him because of nerves. Don't really understand it, never seemed especially nervous to me. I've know of people you couldn't walk up behind the without speaking before you got close or they would jump and likely swing at you before they even realized what they were doing. He wasn't like that. Anyway it was a good thing, he wouldn't have been there when my Grandmother Tatham's house was washed away later in 1942. And who knows, maybe he wouldn't have survived the war and I wouldn't have been born. Looking forward to you coming across the newspaper articles about that flooding."]
