## Why Plan for Evacuations of Animals?

- Pets Act
- Refusal of Owner to evacuate without their animals
- Owner early return to unsafe areas
- Public health and safety risks caused by loose animals
- Economic considerations primarily agricultural
- Control of self responders



### PETS ACT


#### The Federal Act Provides

- Pet evacuation and Transportation Standards
- Signed into law in 2006
- Authorizes FEMA to provide RESCUE care, shelter, and essential needs

#### **Key Points**

- Covers household pets and service animals Domesticated animals such as, dog, cat, bird, rabbit, rodent, or turtle
- <u>Does not cover</u>, horses, livestock, reptiles (except turtles), amphibians, and spiders

## ACTIVATION STEPS AT ERT LEVELS


- ACTIVATE TEAM MEMBERS BY PHONE AND TEXT
- IDENTIFY STAGING OR ASSEMBLY AREA LOCATION
- FORM EVAC. TEAMS AS VOLUNTEERS ARRIVE

- Dispatch and communication










## POTENTIAL RESPONSES

- EOC Initiated request or dispatch
- Outside Request communicate with EOC
- Evacuation categories may be mandatory, voluntary recommended, or individual requested.









#### CONVERGENT VOLUNTEERS



Who are they?
Community volunteers – may have no affiliation with a Team.

Expect large numbers to show up to help – Good intentions

- Prevent "Free lancing" by directing them to an appropriate person
- What to do with them? They may be a very valuable resource. They may bring needed resources, trucks, veterinarians, equipment, supplies and skills

#### EQUINE BEHAVIOR



- Regardless of the type of disaster horses will respond in a similar manner – shy, run away, kick, run over you, bite, rear, strike, etc...
- The basics of safe approaching, catching and handling must be adhered to
- There are two types of horses those that have kicked and those that will kick

## EQUINE BEHAVIOR

#### KEY POINTS



- How do you decide if a horse is relatively safe to approach? Look at the ears, forward is good, back is a concern.
  - What is the safest zone of approach for a standing horse? Toward their left shoulder



- What is the most DANGEROUS zone of approach? Toward their rear end
- How should you approach a horse? Few people, speak softly, approach slowly
- Stress increases difficulty and danger of moving them. Separation from herd should be avoided. Moving stall mates together should be the preferred procedure.






### **EVACUATION OPTIONS**

- 1. Move direct or indirect movement, evacuation teams with appropriate trailers, lead them out, or ride them out
- 2. Shelter in place When no time to move them, chance of survival is good given numbers of horses are too great and not enough resources

- Giant Grease Pencils



## EVACUATION OF HORSES

#### WHERE DO YOU TAKE THEM

- Back to the Staging Area temporarily
- Owner identified location
- Designated Evacuation Shelter
- Horse Hospital





#### OPTIMAL EVACUATION TRAILER

#### **Stock Trailer**

- w/ escape door-safety factor
- 2-3 horse capacity maneuverable
- Side mount fence panels








#### TRAILER LOADING 101

- Can be very dangerous confined space
- Only skilled horse handlers should attempt with a difficult horse
- Loading should never be rushed calm demeanor is a necessity
- If time and safety are in question loading should not be attempted







#### **EVACUATION OF HORSES**

- What if horses don't load?
   Leave them but document
   the situation. If
   veterinarian available
   sedation may be an option
- What if a horse is mortally wounded? Euthanasia standards should be followed preferably with veterinarian present or consulted via cell phone



#### EQUINE EVACUATION SHELTER

- Usually established through Cal Veterinarian Association
- Can be a component of Large Animal Evacuation Group
- Follow all intake procedures at the Shelter Site
- Overall design Temporary corral panels, water buckets, etc.
- Food and water sources have been arranged
- Veterinarian Services onsite





### OTHER SPECIES

- In general, all farm stock are herd animals
- Move them as a group
- Avoid separating them
- Food motivated
- Leading Animal motivated
- Many Llamas and Alpacas are halter broken and can be led. Their method of defense is to warn with a spit, chest butt and stomp with front feet. They are curious and may come up to you. Most are very kind.












