


PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

There's something beautiful about old horses. This came to the forefront of my mind the other day watching a video of two toddlers—one in diapers and one barely knee high to a grasshopper. This dynamic duo was struggling and crawling all over this old gelding in the middle of a horse spotted pasture. The sway in the gelding's back was deep, and he was gaunt in places consistent with many winters. I could see the grey hairs around his nose and eyes as he dozed in and out, with no never mind to the antics the kids engaged in. The whole thing went on with a mom capturing the moment, chuckling behind the camera. These ranch kids were in heaven, and so was the horse.

That got me reminiscing back on the horse that carried me through my youth. A half arab/half some kind of pony—18 year old gelding with a pin in his knee from a barrel racing injury. He had the head of a Walker, neck of a Shetland, body of a quarter pony, on Arab legs that stood a bit under 14 hands. His was name was Boll Weevil. This was not the horse folks go out and purchase! He was not my first horse, but he was the smartest. He was tolerant and (mostly) forgiving of my mistakes. He was not always easy to ride,

but he was never dangerous—and he had shown it all before I got him—gymkhana events, English, western, trail, stock horse—he gave me priceless years, and he lived to 30.

I guess what I'm getting at is that those old horses that have done it all, seen it all, and may have a slight limp, or hitch in their giddy up can carry priceless qualities—qualities that forgive the mistakes and learning curves of their humans. If they've seen it all, they often don't carry the reactive concern that young horses looking for security and direction can sometimes carry. So this year, I am thankful for the old horses—may they continue to teach generations of folks with patience, tolerance, and grace.

Technicality: Riding at night, various Christmas decorations and cars.


Other Info: No carts, stallions, dogs, pedestrians or ponying.

Last year we had 33 horses and riders.


The group will be again be escorted by the Equestrian Patrol.


