# FEBRUARY FOCUS Claudia McNeill, Newsletter Editor RANCHO CUCAMONGA EQUESTRIAN PATROL

Have you seen these very distinguished, uniform-clad riders upon their trusty steeds patrolling the local trails or working a special event? Well let me formally

introduce you to the Rancho Cucamonga Equestrian Patrol! I recently had the privilege of sitting down with Joe Cowan, who has been a patrol member since 2017, and is now its commander. He shared about the unit and his experience. I would love to tell you all about our chat.



The Rancho Cucamonga Equestrian Patrol (fondly referred to as the "mounted patrol") is an all volunteer unit and part of the Rancho Cucamonga Police Department and the San Bernardino County Sheriffs. They have been an active unit for well over 30 years. Their duties include patrolling the trails (which include the Pacific Electric trail and all equine trails in the north end of Rancho Cucamonga), assisting with equine rescues, reporting trail hazards as well as loose animals and suspicious activity. They also take part in special events such as: Safe Walks to School, Memorial Day celebrations, local parades, City Open House, and provide escorts for the annual ALRC Christmas Lights ride. They may also assist in traffic control and are subject to "call outs" by the sheriff department for special emergencies.

"Rancho Cucamonga Equestrian Patrol provides opportunity to attend functions and interact with the community, allowing kids to be introduced to horses—some of whom have never been up close to a horse before", Joe Cowan fondly shares as one of the highlights of his experiences. He continues, "the training builds a steadfast horse and rider who are able to connect with the local community in a very positive way". This works quite well with the Alta Loma Riding Club and our mission to promote and preserve the rural and equestrian lifestyle of Alta Loma and Rancho Cucamonga. While not required, many on the patrol are members of our club as well.

There can be a maximum of 16 members in the patrol and they are always accepting applications. Each member, both rider and their horse are required to certify annually. But the team trains monthly, honing



their skills and staying sharp for their various duties. These trainings take place at the Heritage Park Equestrian Arena. Certification tests for horsemanship of the rider and skills of the horse at all gaits. This experience benefits both horse and rider-increasing their bond while working together on the trail and at events.

As I mentioned earlier, this is a volunteer position and there is no cost to join. Each member, both horse and rider are given their official uniform. If you look closely you will see each horse wears a badge on their uniform regulation breastplate.

Charlene Ariza, the Vice Commander shared with Joe recently, "It's the camaraderie of the unit while serving the community that is most enjoyable to me".

If anyone is interested in more information or about joining the unit, they can contact the Rancho Cucamonga Police Department. Or better yet, feel free to approach members while on patrol-stop and chat with a volunteer as they love to share with people about their Equestrian Patrol experience and answer any questions you may have.  $\bigcap$ 





