

#### **Famous Movie Horses**

We've covered the two most famous EQUINE Stars that I think Silver, but there were many more.

The first equine star was in the silent pictures and was ridden by Tom Mix. His name was Ol' Blue and when he broke a leg when he was 21 and had to be euthanized, it was quite a sce-

ne. He was buried on the ranch in Mixville, which later became Echo Park. After Ol' Blue, most people remember his highly trained horse Tony. Tony outlived his master by two years when Tom Mix was killed in an auto accident.



Most of us will also remember Gene Autry's horse Champion. There were actually 3 horses that portrayed Champion and the last one died when he was 42 years old!

Hopalong Cassidy's horse, Topper, was 2 different horses after the first one was injured in 1939. The second one stayed with William Boyd for the rest of his television career.

There were many more horses that were very identifiable with their owners in the 1940's thru the heyday of the western movies and TV. Certainly most of us remember Jim Arness with his horse Buck in Gunsmoke and The Virginian (James Drury) rode two different appaloosa's that were nearly twins of each other. Trampas (Doug McClure) had two buckskins that he dearly loved and many sidekicks were featured with their own mounts. Dale Evans Buttermilk, Pancho's Loco, Tonto's Scout, Smiley Burnette's Ring Eye, Gabby Hayes rode 3 horses Calico, Eddie and Blossom and let's not forget Andy Devine's mount Joker. And did you know that one actor, Key Maynard had a horse named Tarzan!

Even more recently, there was a series called Briscoe County Jr back in 1993-1994 starring Bruce Cambell and his "Wonder

Horse" Comet. For those of you who missed that series, it was most people think of, Roy Rogers Trigger and The Lone Rangers campy, funny, and lots of fun as it made fun of just about every western before it!

#### **July 4th Pet Safety**

Information taken from the AVMA

Fireworks, picnics and other Fourth of July traditions can be great fun for people; but all of the festivities can be frightening and even dangerous for animals.

#### Preparing in advance:

- Make sure your pets cats and dogs alike have **identification tags** with up-to-date information. If you have horses, you might consider marking a safety (breakaway) halter with your contact information and leaving it on your horse during this stressful time.
- If your pets aren't already **microchipped**, talk with your veterinarian about microchipping. This simple procedure can greatly improve your chances of getting your pets back if they become lost.
- If your pets are microchipped, make sure your contact information in the microchip registry is up-to-date.
- Take a **current photo** of all of your cats, dogs and horses just in case.
- If your pet has historically been anxious on this holiday, or if you have reason to expect potentially harmful reactions, consider **behavioral therapy** or consult your veterinarian for possible medications
- Make sure the environment is safe and secure. If your neighbors set off fireworks at an unexpected time, is your yard secure enough to keep your pet contained? Are pasture fences secure enough to keep horses or other livestock confined? Evaluate your options, and choose the safest area for your animals; and make improvements if needed to make the area more secure.

#### Safety during July 4th celebrations:

- Leave your pets at home when you go to parties, fireworks displays, parades and other gatherings.
- Consider putting your pets in a **safe**, **escape-proof room or crate** during parties and fireworks.
- Keep horses and livestock in **safely fenced areas** and as far from the excitement and noise as possible.
- If you're hosting guests, ask them to help keep an eye on your pets to make sure they don't escape. Placing notes on exit doors and gates can help both you and your guests remain vigilant.
- Avoid the urge to feed your pets **table scraps** or other foods intended for people. Be especially careful to keep them away from these common foods that are actually toxic.
- If you're **travelling out of town** for the holiday, consider leaving your pets at home with a pet sitter or boarding them in a kennel. If you need to bring them with you, be sure you know how to keep them safe.

#### After the celebrations:

- **Check your yard** for **food scraps or other debris** that might be dangerous to pets, such as food skewers. Animals are curious and may pick it up to play with or eat things left out.
- Check your pastures and remove debris to protect horses and livestock.
