












ALRC 21in21 CHALLENGE!!

Staying cool at Walnut Creek, San Dimas

Date: Saturday, July 17, 2021 Time: 8am-1pm

STAGING INFO: Meet on Beryl by Heritage Park at 8am for a quick 25 minute drive to our staging area. If you are going to meet us there, please RSVP in the Facebook event or contact Julie so we have a count of the trailers. There are several parking options depending on the size of the group. Most likely we will stage at Raging Waters. If it is a small group, however, we will park off of Scarborough.

DISTANCE: The trail is 3.8 miles long so we will be riding 7 miles or so depending on what the group wants to do.

TIME: approximately 3 hours*

TERRAIN: Trails are fairly flat although we may do one short hill.

TECHNICALITY: We will encounter hikers and an occasional evil umbrella (Sammy wanted to make sure I mentioned that). Generally, we don't see many bikes. There will be many water crossings. Water should be fairly shallow this time of year and the crossings are often rocky but safe. Many photo opportunities on this is easy, relaxing ride.



The Alta Loma Emergency Response Team (ALERT) will be conducting an

Informational Seminar on Large Animal Evacuations and Horse Rescues

Saturday, September 25 • 8AM to 3PM

at Heritage Equestrian Center, 5546 Beryl Street, Rancho Cucamonga.

Topics and activities may include but not limited to:

- 1. Volunteer registrations and existing Member Updates.
- 2. Evacuation Procedures.
- 3. ALERT Team Evacuation Equipment and supplies response audit.
- 4. Horse loading practice.
- 5. Trailer backing and maneuvering clinic.
- 6. Trailer Inspections available.
- 7. Demonstrations by the Rancho Cucamonga Fire Department Heavy Rescue Unit.

This Large Animal Evacuations Seminar is open to Equestrians and non-equestrians since they are many support functions that require volunteers assistance. Come for as much time as you can.

ALERT has functioned since 2001 assisting with large animal evacuations, rescues (trapped animals), animal abuse investigations involving seized animals, and loose horses. Two of the significant events the ALRC/ALERT assisted with are the 2003 Grand Prix and 2014 Etiwanda Fires.

NOW'S THE TIME TO BE PROACTIVE —DON'T WAIT TO BE REACTIVE!

When it comes to a local wildfire occurrence, it really isn't a matter of if—but when. The fact is we live in arid southern California against a beautiful backdrop of golden rolling hills and mountains that are usually full of dry brush and vegetation (fuel). It seems every year in late summer, early fall, almost inevitably, the local landscape is set ablaze with fire. Rarely have we had to evacuate, but looming is the fact it is a possibility. So, as an equestrian, whether you board your horse somewhere or stable him on your own property, it is better to be prepared than be caught off guard during an emergency. As a horse owner, it is ultimately our own responsibility to have a good solid plan, know the community protocols available, have emergency information and contacts and supplies close at hand and be ready to go at a moments notice.





During a wildfire, power, cell and other services can be disrupted, communication can be difficult and first responders may be busy with managing the emergency. It is no time to panic. Being prepared allows you to properly care for your own animals and even be available to possibly assist others. Take the time to learn about how to best be ready for such emergencies. Have a fully stocked "go bag" prepared. Be able to properly identify your horses with their name and your contact information. Have information organized in a binder so it is readily available. Network with friends in nearby areas that have facilities to where you can evacuate your horse. And be sure to attend the informational seminar on September 25 at Heritage Park Equestrian Center. These are just a few tips to help stay safe, not sorry, during fire season.
