




# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE from Natalie Beechler, ALRC President




# ALRC ELECTIONS

It's that time once again...elections for the Board Members of the Alta Loma Riding Club. As per the By-laws, elections

for positions on the Board of Directors for the ALRC are to be held at two-year intervals, (or every two years.) Therefore, all board positions are up for election this year, 2022. The last board election was held in 2020. This month, the month of March is designated for nominations to the board. Members who would like to run for the board must submit their names to the ALRC secretary by March 31, 2022. At the closing of nominations, the names of Board candidates will be published in April. Voting will be held in May. Voting will be in person where ballots will be distributed at a May general meeting.







### WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT EHV

Equine herpes virus, EHV, is a common virus that is seen every year. When it is

diagnosed quarantine measures are put in place so that it does not spread beyond the facility where it is diagnosed.

Desert International Horse Park hosts an international winter hunter jumper circuit. On February 11, 2022 they announced they had two cases of ehv on the premise. Isolation and quarantine measures were taken. Unfortunately some horses were moved when they canceled the horse show. As of today EHV is in 6 counties not including San Bernardino County.

The virus usually presents in 2 phases of fever-day 1 to 2 and day 6 to 7. It will unpredictably progress into the neurologic form usually in the day 6-7 timeframe. The neurologic form usually results in humane euthanasia due to the horses inability to stand and perform basic functions like voiding their bladder.

There is a vaccine and all the show horses should have been vaccinated every 6 months. Unfortunately the vaccine does not prevent infection or disease. Recommendations at this time are no social interactions because it can be contracted by both airborne and nose to nose contact. Isolate any horses that have had social contact for a minimum of 7 days and take their temperature morning and evening.

If you have concerns about your horse being febrile and possibly catching EHV then contact your horse's veterinarian and they will guide you through the care and precautions.

Time: approximately 2.5 - 3 hours


**Elevation: Relatively flat**
