Indians and their Horses

Ah the beauty of the American Indian astride his pony chasing the buffalo across the plains, or the brave sitting on his mount on a cliff overlooking his domain. These are the images that spring to my mind when I think of the American Indian and their horses. But when did they actually get horses and start using them for transportation, hunting and so forth?

The horse disappeared from the American continents around 11000 or 13000 years ago and didn't appear again until about 1519 when the Spaniards brought them over to Mexico. By 1540 the missionaries had moved into Texas and the Indians began working with them for the missions. Since they had never seen a horse before they referred to them as "sacred dogs". They weren't allowed to own or ride them, but the missionaries allowed to them train the horses anyway.



Around 1680 the Indians revolted against the Spanish and began to use horses for themselves. It didn't take long for them to spread across the American Southwest and beyond. The Indians found horses made it much easier to hunt buffalo since they could ride right up to the herd and take their shot instead of crawling dressed in buffalo robes to get near the herd.


Since the tribes tended to be nomadic in nature, the horse made life much easier for hauling sup-



plies and trading. Bows and Arrows had been in use in the lowa territory for over 11,000 years so it didn't take long for the southwestern Indians to start using them with their ever increasing skill on horseback.

The Plains Indians first started using horses in the early 18th century and quickly became masters of the art of riding with bows and arrows. Wealth in the tribe could be counted in how many mounts any one Indian had and stealing from white settlers and other tribes became a cultural tradition.

The romantic view of the Indian and his horse has been immortalized by countless artists, authors and even Hollywood has used the images for commercials to sell numerous items and ideas. The American Indian symbolizes a way of life that children and adults love to see on screen and read in novels. My personal favorite is Zane Grey, but there are so many authors out there to read and enjoy.
