Meet Bonnie Scudder! Many may have heard this familiar name within the equine community-now get to know her a little better! it was fun for me to interview Bonnie for our March Member Spotlight.

If you are familiar with the horse properties and boarding facilities in the

area, then you probably know Baker Scudder Farms on Carnelian. It is a striking property just north of Wilson with beautiful white splitrail fences, fantastic arenas and that signature red barn! Bonnie and Steve Scudder purchased the property over 10 years ago and have been busy building their dream! How were the seeds planted and the dream cultivated? It all starts, of course, in the heart of a very young girl...



Bonnie Baker grew up in Orange county

California. At the age of 9 her soccer coach, sensing soccer was not going to be Bonnie's sport, encouraged her to seek out horseback riding lessons instead as possibly a better match. At a nearby stable she began ridingand in the process, quickly fell in love with horses! By the time she was 10 she had her very own horse! A registered quarter horse, Ottis Lisa Bar, became Bonnie's beloved "Lisa"! This darling mare was a great match



for her new young owner and together they did it all; arena riding and trail riding, in both western and english styles. It was on Lisa that Bonnie next learned to jump! They loved jumping on cross-country courses as well as the arena. It was a beautiful partnership! Bonnie grew in riding ability, and came to the place around 12 years old that a thoroughbred named Destiny would

take her to the next level of riding and competing in the show jumping arena. The high-spirited off the track thoroughbred was different than her trusty Lisa, and Bonnie began to learn dressage style techniques as she worked with her new horse.

When Bonnie was 15 her family moved from Orange county to Upland, purchasing a larger property zoned for horses, and Bonnie got to bring her sweet Lisa to her own backvard!! Her show horse, now T.J. another thoroughbred hunter/jumper, was boarded at a training barn in Chino and Bonnie showed extensively from the ages of 14 to 16. But as the story goes for most teen riders, Bonnie traded her ride with 4 legs to one with 4 wheels, and the busy collage-bound life of this high schooler left the show circuit and riding behind as she looked forward to other teen challenges. During this time, her original quarter horse Lisa was still there in the backyard, and for a time during college, Bonnie taught riding lessons to the neighborhood kids on Lisa as she was always a sweet, faithful and grounding reminder of her long time love for horses.

Lots of life happened, and fast forward to Bonnie, now in graduate school, living in Pasadena. She rode horses for trainer Marsha "Mousie" Williams in an arrangement that traded her riding the horses needing to be ridden in exchange for her own lessons and training. Bonnie gained alot of experience, riding a wide variety of "rougher" horses that really needed the extra work. "It seemed to be a good fit", Bonnie fondly reflects, "I was completing my education to become an occupational therapist and these horses needed a sort of occupational therapy."

More life happened and in 2001 Bonnie, while working as an occupational therapist, now married to Steve and beginning their family, moved to Rancho Cucamonga. They chose Rancho Cucamonga specifically because of the emphasis on the equestrian and family-oriented lifestyle. After the birth of their second child, it was time to start revisiting the idea of owning a horse again.

Through a series of serandipitous connections and events, Bonnie met many people along the way who poured in to her life, enhancing her equestrian experience; people like Kim Kulesa her dressage trainer and dear friend still to this day. Through Kim she met others who were planning a horse buying trip to Germany and they invited Bonnie to come along. "It was the chance of a lifetime and, with the support of my family,

I went on this amazing trip!" Bonnie says with a smile, "Five days of non-stop intensity-visiting the warmblood farms all over Germany, looking at horses." At the end of this successful trip. their host Joachim asked Bonnie if there was any horse that "stood out to her in particular." Long story short—a very large striking chestnut mare with beautiful white markings caught her attention. Through a series of remarkable



events, she purchased Gitana, a 5 year old Olendburg warmblood mare, and arranged to have her shipped home. Gitana arrived in California and was delivered to her new home on Carnelian, the Shadow Ridge boarding facility, that would one day in later years become Baker Scudder Farms!



The bond between Gitana and Bonnie was unparalleled. And Gitana was the driving force behind all the passion (including the logo) that became Baker Scudder Farms. Additional experiences included breeding Gitana, raising and training her foal Samson. Unfortunately at the age of 18, Gitana's life was tragically cut short by a rare illness. It truly crushed Bonnie,

but Gitana's strong consistant spirit lives on in Bonnie and Baker Scudder Farms. She fondly reflects, "I want my boarders and their horses to get the same quality of care that I want for my own horses."

It is more than evident that all of Bonnie's past experience have poured in to preparing her for what ever came next. Bonnie recently reached out to Joachim and found Talulla, a 4 year old beautiful bay Oldenburg mare—and the two of them have embarked on yet another adventure. Who knows where the future will take them, and for that matter any of us—but one thing is for sure—if you allow a horse to change the course of your life, you will truly be changed forever!

That distance usually isn't a problem for equestrians.

#### **DESCRIPTION OF TRAIL RIDE:**

Date: Saturday, March 13, 2021

Time: 8am-4pm

Staging Info: Meet at Heritage Park at 8am. It is about a 50 mile drive to our destination at Lake Perris. There is a \$10 entrance fee. Plan to be in the

saddle by 10.

Bring snacks/lunch. Distance: 10 miles

Time: approximately 4 hours

Terrain: Mostly flat single track dirt trails, one long dam to cross shared with pedestrians and cyclists,

one optional short hill climb.

Technicality: This is an easy ride as we circle the lake. There will be boaters and fishermen on the lake and a motorcycle track on the low side of the dam, but horses usually don't care or adjust quickly.

This is a relaxing ride meandering through




## Saturday, May 29, 2021 **Big Bear**


