Ray 3rd place Bill and Carol 4th place Joel 5th place




#### Mtn. Melee





### JUSTICE, ETC.

- An Englishman's home is no longer his castle—if he's been drinking and driving, that is. One part of Great Britain's new Transport Act gives the police in England and Wales the authority to enter the home of someone suspected of drunk driving and order a breath test.
   And the British have come up with some rather quaint defenses in the wake of their country's tough new drunk-driving laws. A Mr. Kenneth Collins managed to satisfy the court that his urine contained microorganisms capable of producing alcohol. His appeal against a drunk-driving conviction was allowed.
  - If you try to outrun the cops in California, you have a 25-percent chance of success, according to data gathered by eleven California law-enforcement agencies from 683 high-speed pursuits. But there are some more sobering statistics to consider as well.
  - —Nearly one-third of all high-speed chases result in collisions.
  - -Eleven percent of all chases studied involved injury. One in 100 resulted in death.
  - —Drivers and passengers of the pursued vehicles were killed or injured in 70 percent of the collisions, police were injured in fourteen percent, and bystanders were injured in fifteen percent of the accidents.
  - —Shots were fired in 21 of the 683 cases studied. Three people, all in cars being chased, were shot to death.

• It may be against the law, but some two to three million cars annually have their catalytic converters disconnected, says the Automotive Exhaust Systems Manufacturers Council. The group also claims that one of every five cars on the road has had its emissions controls tampered with.

• The average person who drives to work lives 11.1 miles from the office and takes 22.5 minutes to get there, says a government survey. An independent survey of the Car and Driver Gang of Fourteen indicates that they live an average of 13.1 miles from Hogback Road and need a mere 15.8 minutes to get from door to door. Which is against the law.

 And this item from the Financial Times of London: A school in Sussex, informing its pupils of upcoming driving lessons, wrote:
 "Three boys and girls will be taken on each lesson, and each will spend twenty minutes driving under instruction and 40 minutes in the back seat gaining experience."





Chopped and channeled: More than one million vehicles are stolen each year, says the Automotive Information Council, and the percentage of vehicles recovered in good condition has fallen to 52 percent from 83 percent in 1974. These days, the joy rider has been replaced by the professional thief, who fills custom orders for chop shops, which in turn sell

the car's parts for up to five times the value of the original car. Car theft, says the AIC, cost consumers \$4 billion in 1983.





The short-distance auto "trip" is a major consumer of fuel dollars. Automobile trips under 5 miles comprise about 15% of all miles driven, yet consume 30% of the gasoline consumed by an automobile. If it comes as a surprise that the short trip is so inefficient, remember that tires and lubricants do not move easily when driving from a cold start. Also, during cold-engine operation, the automatic choke causes the engine to run less efficiently because of the fuel-rich mixture which is fed to the engine. Therefore, engine and rolling resistance, along with the combined reluctance of all moving parts to move freely, results in a short trip being very undesirable from the standpoint of fuel efficiency.
