





Recipe of the Month

Pumpkin Crisp

Pumpkin Pie Layer

- 1 (15 oz) can pumpkin puree
- 1 cup Dixie Crystals Extra Fine Granulated Sugar
- •3 large eggs
- 2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- ¾ cup heavy cream

Cinnamon Streusel

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 ½ cups Dixie Crystals Extra Fine Granulated Sugar
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 12 tablespoons (1 1/2 sticks) unsalted butter, melted

Instructions

- Preheat oven to 375°F. Butter a 12-inch cast iron skillet or a medium casserole dish. Set aside
- In a large bowl, whisk together pumpkin, sugar, eggs, pumpkin pie spice, salt, and vanilla extract. Whisk in heavy cream until smooth. Pour into prepared skillet and set aside
- In a medium bowl, whisk together flour, sugar, cinnamon, and salt. Add melted butter and stir with a fork until crumbly. Spread cinnamon streusel topping on top of pumpkin pie mixture in an even layer. You can also beat with a hand mixer until crumbly if needed
- Bake until filling is set and top is golden brown, 40 to 45 minutes. If the crumb topping happens to brown too quickly, you can lightly cover the top with foil to prevent it from browning any more.
- Let cool for 10 minutes, so the pie filling can firm up. Then serve warm topped with ice cream or whipped cream.
- My personal favorite combination is to serve this pumpkin crisp with cinnamon ice cream if you can find it!

As most of our members know Debbie and I have been involved with the motorcycle club for many years. After Victory closed its doors we decided to open the club up to all motorcycles and ventured further into camping. We received a lot of participation in camping, but as we were all getting older we started migrating into campers and RVs.

Debbie and I put quite some time into researching what we wanted and found a great deal on a 30 foot toy hauler with one pull out for a queen bed. This year was our first time taking this trip utilizing our new toy. Our close friend and Corvette owner, Steven Manni, started a camping group that is planning on visiting many of the great National Parks that the United States has to offer.

This year we took to the Mid Atlantic section of the country and visited Shenandoah Valley, New River Gorge, Mammoth Caves, Nashville (ok, just a party stop and not a National Park), the Great Smoky Mountains, Assateague Island, and a Reindeer Farm.





We took care allowing time for travel as driving these larger rigs or trailering a camper is mentally and physically exhausting. We used what is known as Harvest Host for some of the longer rides as our stopovers. This consists of businesses that offer free overnight stays on their property if you frequent their business while staying. These are typically distilleries, farms or golf courses, with large tracts of land, the only catch being you must be completely self contained (i.e. bathroom, showers, kitchen all within the unit). We were joined by long time friends that used tents and/or hotels for their stays, while we were at the Harvest Hosts. The majority of us did take our motorcycles, as we have many trailer conversions, my camper holds two motorcycles in a small garage and one of the RVs has a motorcycle carrier.

Shenandoah Valley is spectacular and we got quite a bit of exploring done on the bikes up and down the Blue Ridge Parkway and around the area.

The majority of us took advantage of whitewater rafting while in the New River Gorge, and it was so much fun that the risk of drowning faded out of concern, and I swore I would never do it previously. Just look at the grins!


Kiddie-Fenwal Car Show!



OBITUARY

Steele J Lightbody, a treasured soul whose laughter and kindness warmed the hearts of all who knew him, passed away peacefully on September 22, 2024, in his beloved hometown of Walpole, MA. Born on October 11, 1948, Steele's life was a testament to service, family, and passion.

Steele was the devoted husband of Mary Jane (Fraser) Lightbody, with whom he shared 44 fun years of marriage filled with love and unwavering partnership. A devoted father, his legacy continues through his children: Eric Lightbody and his wife Kristin, Jason Lightbody and his wife Julie, Daniel Sullivan, and Kerin Beauchamp, along with her husband Paul. He exuded pride in his role as a loving "Pop" to Samuel, Catherine, Jack, Colin, Abigail, Dillon, Kristoff, and Kayah, who filled his days with laughter and purpose.

A brother in both blood and spirit, Steele is fondly remembered by his siblings John LeRoy Lightbody, David Lightbody, Frank Lightbody, and Susan Peet, whose shared memories echo a lifetime of familial devotion. A proud graduate of Walpole High School's class of 1966, he led as Class President, setting the tone for a life marked by leadership and community involvement.

Steele's professional life was dedicated to the safety and wellbeing of his community; as Walpole's first full-time fireman, he bravely served the Walpole Fire Department, rising to the rank of Captain before retiring after an honorable 35-year career. Parallel to his service, he managed Lightbody Electric, showcas-

ing his skill as an electrical contractor. His entrepreneurial spirit further shined alongside his wife, Mary Jane, as they delved into the world of real estate from 2005 until 2015.

Before his admirable career in fire service, Steele served his country with distinction as a seaman in the U.S. Navy, a chapter of his life that instilled in him a profound sense of duty and patriotism. Steele's heart was equally invested in his community, contributing time and talent as a Senior High School Youth Group Leader through CMA Church in Foxboro. His commitment to service spanned international borders with mission trips to the Dominican Republic and Mexico, where he assisted in building churches and strengthened communities.

Steele pursued his interests with the same vigor he dedicated to his work and service. A craftsman at heart, he skillfully built barns and made his dream home on South Street with his own hands. His love for snowmobiling led him to explore the snowy expanses of New Hampshire and Maine. Driving over the Bridge to Maine was his gateway to Heaven. Steele lived his high school dream of owning a Corvette and, in a twist of fate, a lottery win allowed him to purchase a 2001 Corvette and join the Eastern Mass Corvette Club.



My Pal Whitey!

EMCC, and I, along with the community of Walpole lost a great friend this past week. Steele Lightbody succumbed to complications of Alzheimer's disease this past week.

Whitey, as we all knew him, was quite a guy. He was a retired firefighter, a Captain at retirement and we both shared a lot of stories together because we both shared the same occupation and rank, just we worked for different departments.

When Whitey first joined and was introduced to the club, I immediately recognized him from our meeting many years past. We both were called to a neighboring town as mutual aid assignments. At the time we both were Lieutenants, company officers. A company officer's assignment is a truck or vehicle and the crew. This could be an engine (pumper), ambulance, rescue truck, ladder truck, etc. When you see fire apparatus on the streets the person seated on the right side is the company officer. The driver, operator, and the crew are seated behind in the cab. Company officers are of the rank of Lieutenant or Captain. Above that rank is Deputy Chief, District Chief, and then, Chief of the department. This is standardized in North America.

Well, this night, Walpole and Millis were called to this neighboring town because the town's department had used much of its resources handling an incident. I think that it started out as a structure fire, but upon arrival the fire had previously been extinguished. Normally, a report of a fire will bring in resources from neighboring towns in the mutual aid pact that our towns share.

This night the town's chief had brought in a lot of resources for what was a very small incident. So, both Walpole and Millis were there covering the station as stand by or "ready" assignments. The Lieutenant from Walpole (Whitey) and I started talking, bitching really, as to why we both were needed for station coverage. One company was sufficient. Anyway, we both agreed that this sucks, kept it to ourselves not letting our crews know we were pissed, and then went to raid the stations refrigerator. Whitey was quite a guy, and I really enjoyed our friendship and time together. We shared a lot of things in common, and I for one, will really miss him.




