It was a moving and informative tribute to a man who deeply loved his family and would talk with pride of it at the drop of a hat. I came away knowing that our old pal was of Danish descent and considered himself descended from Vikings. He met the lovely Ida while they were students at BU, after his tour in the US Army. That connection worked out so well that three of Arne's college pals married three of Ida's sisters! I think I got this right, but anyway it's a great story. Arne also dabbled in oil painting with more than average success and loved to garden. His last great love was his Corvette(s) and the club he joined in June, 2000. Finally, he had a long professional career, always with the same company, even though it went through four ownership changes finally ending up as Xerox. Through it all, they felt him too valuable to let go.

I first met Arne Johnson when he was still working for Xerox. We began a series of visits to his worksite at which he and his employees would prepare a feast for us at the heart of which was a fried turkey. What a deal! We became friends with all the Xerox employees. They had these huge printers for doing blueprints and color photographs. Arne offered to do poster sized pictures of all our cars. I had my '97 at the time. We all showed up and one by one high resolution digital pictures were taken. Finally, we all got our posters. And a great feed.

Arne went on to be a very active member, a regular at meetings. He volunteered to publish the Gazette for several years though he confided in me his real joy was in writing his regular articles. He was a good writer, in my humble opinion, always finding something to write about and always on deadline. He loved to go to car shows. His favorite was right round the corner from his house at a place named Kidde-Fenwal. It wasn't a big show but he liked them small. Another favorite was right here in my home town at the Forge Hill Assisted Living facility. He'd get there early, park, set up his chair, and that was it. He particularly liked to bring his grandson Adam and I have memories of Adam as a little boy in his own chair at the Walpole Field Day or with his grandpa (they all called him Pop) at the Collings Foundation WWII Demonstration.

We lost our pal just shy of his 82nd birthday. Cancer came and took him so quickly we hardly had time to react. First he was hospitalized; then he was released home; then he was hospitalized again and he was gone; all in a span of about two weeks. I will dearly miss finding him at the back of the room on meeting nights or in his folding chair under the tree at Static Cruises.

It's Anyone's Guess

There has been much speculation surrounding the delay of the Corvette C8 announcement for an additional six months possibly placing its release into 2020. Reasons not given but rumored and speculated on vary from serious failures to more humorous guessing.

Just a sample are:

- 1. It is the result of serious electronic failures in current testing. Could be but questionable.
- 2. Maybe it's a marketing/financial issue in that the much higher pricing (\$170,000) will leave many in the current loyal Corvette buyers unable to purchase the C8. The Mustang Bullitt is priced around (\$47,590). The Super Charged ZR1 may beat the Mustang GT and Bullitt but the ZR1 is still in a price range that maintains customer loyalty.
- 3. GM is currently making severe cuts in manpower. Is the C8 caught in part of this extensive reduction? Some in GM have said, "It isn't so." It seems a possibility due to internal strife and reorganization, there could be cause for delay.
- 4. Corvette canceled the initial showing at the 2019 Detroit Auto Show. The thought is that this show is losing its following and GM will instead display the new Cadillac XT6 Crossover.
- 5. There is also a rumor that too many other new and improved sports cars will be announced and the competition at the Detroit Show may affect GM's draw for attention. Seems unlikely that the C8 would go unnoticed with so many waiting to see it. Some, at least in theory, have waited since 1970 when a mid-engine prototype was created.

It's anyone's guess. What's yours?
