**Barrier Island:** Buffer between the  
 sea and the mainland.

**Land use:** More than half the island  
 is made up of wildlife refuges.

**Area:** 33 sq mi of which 17 sq mi is  
 land and 16 sq mi is water.

**Elevation:** 3 feet.

**Population:** 7,319. Half over 65.

**History**

**500 BC:** Settled by Calusa Indians.

**1513:** Ponce de Leon landed in St  
 Augustine. First known European  
 expedition to Florida. He named  
 the place La Florida.

**1513:** Sailed around the Keys and  
 up the West Coast of Florida.  
 Landed in Sanibel (then unnamed).

**Some say:** Ponce named it "Santa Isybella" after Spain's Queen Isabella.

**Others:** Sanibel evolved from "Santa Ybel" - old name for the southern tip of the island.

**1832:** First settlement.

**1849:** Settlement abandoned.

**Very small numbers until 1963:** When Sanibel Causeway replaced the ferry.

**Toll: \$6 EZPass. \$9 cash.**

**Get There:** I-75 or US-41 to Sanibel

Causeway. Right onto Periwinkle.

At end of Periwinkle, right onto Tarpon Bay Rd, then left onto Sanibel-Captiva Road.

**When:** Daily except Fridays and national holidays.

**Admission:** \$10 per car to drive 4-mile Wildlife Drive. \$1 for hikers or bikers.

**What:** 6,400 acres of mangrove forest, submerged seagrass beds, marshes, and hardwood hammocks.

One of America's largest undeveloped mangrove ecosystems.

4 mile one-way drive with spectacular views of lakes and bayous.

– Many birdwatching opportunities.

Especially December through March.

– Home to raccoons, bobcats, river otters, alligators, and marsh rabbits.

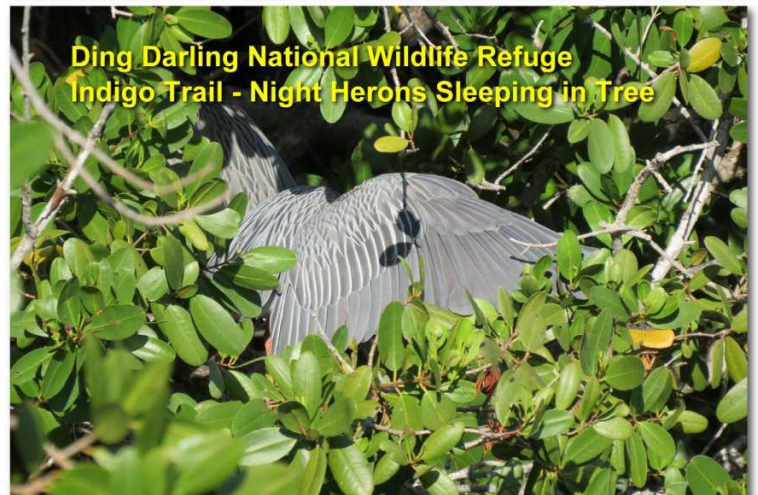

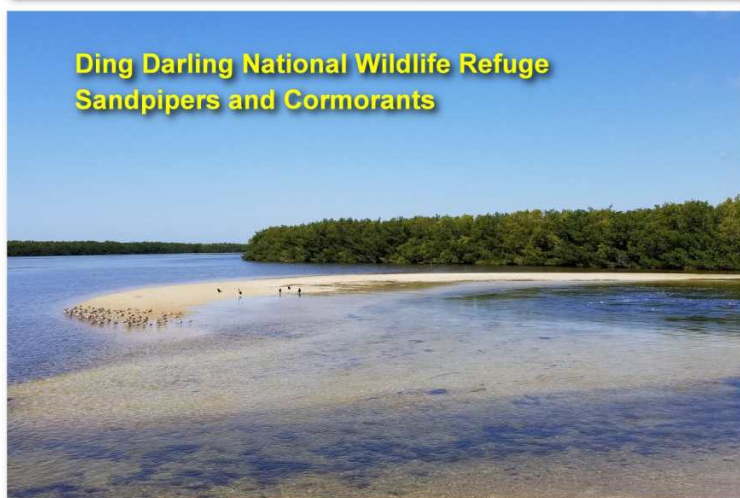

### Calusa Indians:

- Native in SW Florida from at least 3,500 BC.
- 60 villages along SW Florida coasts.
- Est. 10,000 to 50,000 people.
- Powerful military.
- Fishing, trapping, sailing. Astute traders.
- Late 1700s wiped out by invading enemy Indian tribes from Georgia and Carolinas.

**What:** The story of Sanibel from the Calusa and Spanish eras to the early pioneer families who settled on the island in the 1800s.



The 11 buildings loaded with historical artefacts and photos tell of warriors, adventures, fishermen, farmers, and proprietors.

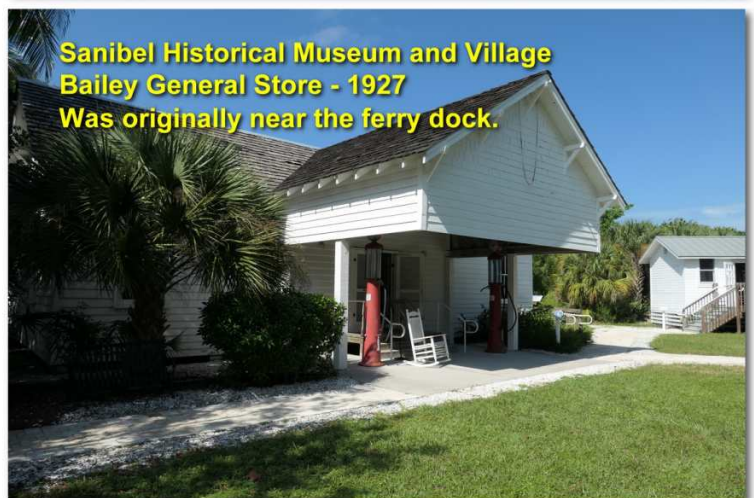
**Nine historic buildings moved from their original sites. Each restored to its original state. And replica packing house and garage:**

- Rutland House (1913).

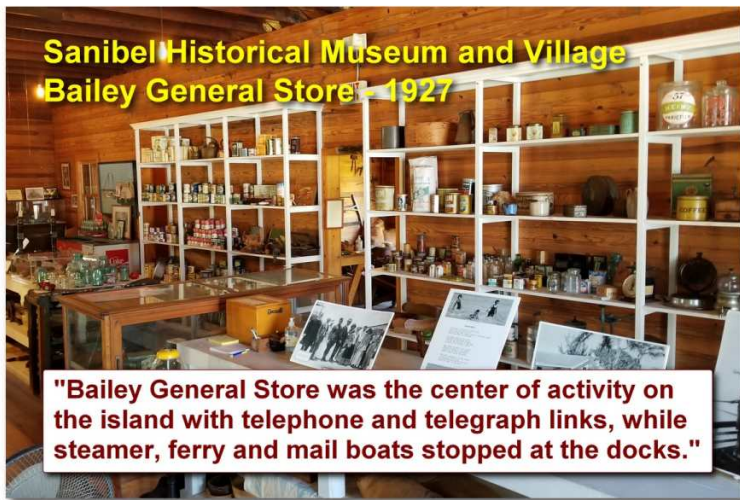

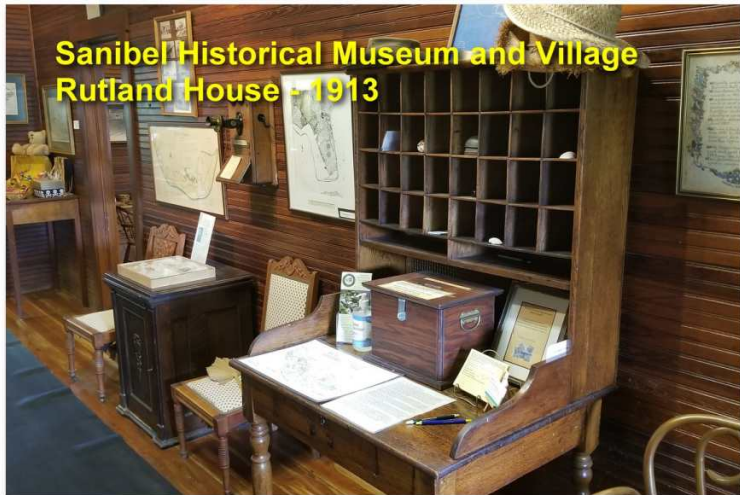

**What:** Hospital for the care of injured,  
sick or orphaned wild animals. Animal  
admissions 8am to 5pm 365 days a year.  
Education center open to public. Live  
animal exhibits. Exhibits on animal care  
and rehabilitation. Live daily  
presentations at 11am.

Hospital not open to public except on  
walking tour (extra charge).

**In 2021, 6,396 patients were  
admitted.**

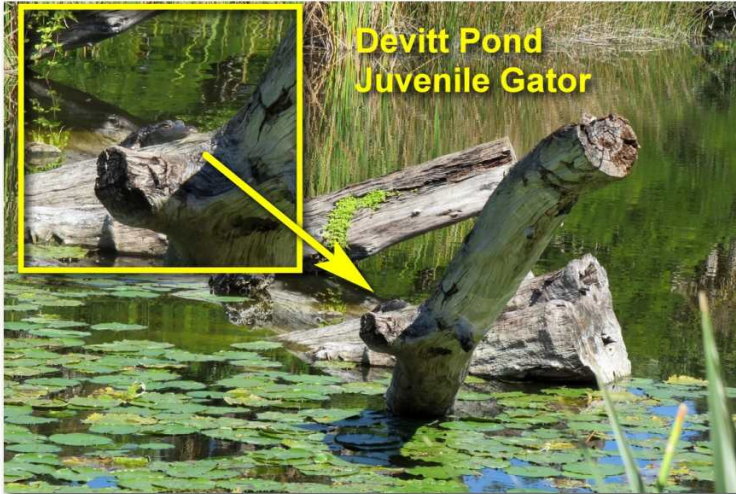
**What:** Historic home, garden center, 0.9 mile walking trail, preserved land.

**28 acres of which:**

- Front 9 acres include the Homestead, retail garden center, the Shipley Trail.
- 19 acre wildlife corridor that includes freshwater wetlands and interior ridges.
- Historic 1896 Bailey family home and 1908 windmill.
- The Baileys were Sanibel farming pioneers, business people (packing house, grocery, hardware store), and conservationists.
- Home is open only for events.

Operated by US Coast Guard.  
Grounds open to public.  
Lighthouse itself not open.  
102 feet tall.

**Hurricane Ian:**  
House Destroyed.  
Lighthouse did not fall.  
Bottom of one leg lost.  
Has a temporary support.



**Sanibel Fishing Pier**  
East end of island.  
Redfish, Snook, Sheepshead, Drum, Snapper.

**Hurricane Ian: Fishing

## Captiva Historic Cemetery - Established 1888

## HISTORIC CAPTIVA CEMETERY

The Captiva Cemetery is closely associated with the history of Captiva Island. It served as a pioneer cemetery, and contains the graves of many of the island's earliest settlers. The land for the cemetery was interment was the unnamed stillborn daughter of Herbert and Hattie Brainerd in 1897, and a second stillborn daughter was buried in 1899. Brainerd's ten year old daughter, Ann, in exchange for a gold coin she received as a birthday gift from her grandmother. Ann died a year later from tetanus after stepping on a rusty nail. She was interred with her sisters. Other pioneers are buried here, including the original Brainerd family plot. The graves of two Confederate veterans, George Washington Carter and Henry P. Knowles, are also here. Hattie Brainerd retained ownership until she deeded it to the Methodist Church in 1936. The church deeded the cemetery in 1954 to Captiva Chapel-by-the-Sea, which maintains it to the present day. The cemetery was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2013.

### Edison's Winter Home:

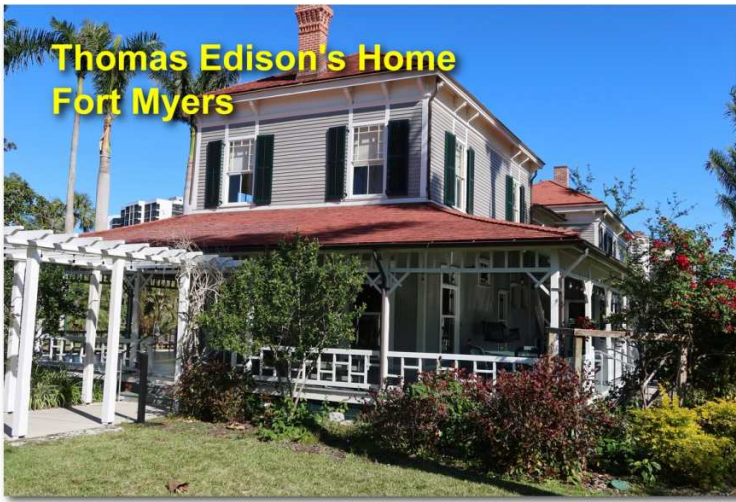
- 14-acre Site on Caloosahatchee Riv.
- Queen Anne New England Style.
- Built 1885 in parts in Fairfield, Maine.
- Sent to Fort Myers on 4 sailing ships.
- Assembled in Fort Myers in 1886.
- One of the first pre-fabricated buildings in America.

### Thomas Alva Edison was America's greatest inventor. Examples:

Electric power generators and distribution systems. Phonograph. Motion picture camera. Electric light bulb. Microphone. Fluoroscope. Rechargeable battery.

**Edison called his home "Seminole Lodge".**

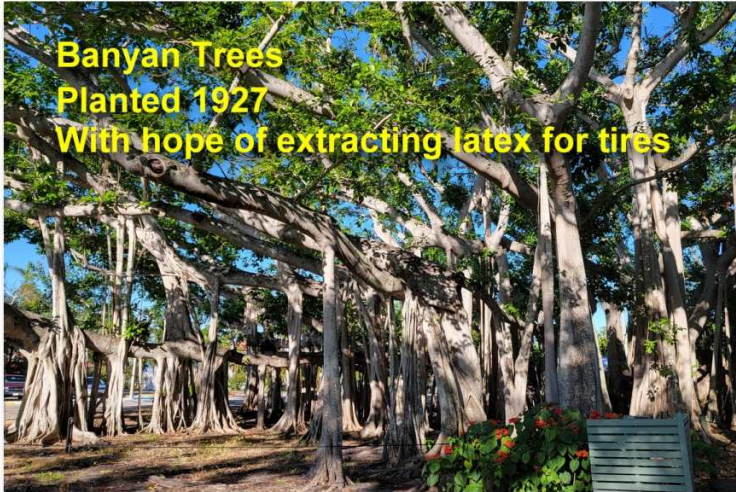
**Was his winter workplace and place of relaxation until he died in 1931.**

**Banyan Trees  
Planted 1927

**Museum:** Explore the lives, creativity, and achievements of Edison and Ford. 15,000 square feet. Thousands of artifacts including several historic cars.

**Edison's Laboratory:** Opened 1927. Focused on finding a domestic US source of rubber in case of a foreign supply shortage. 17,000 plant samples tested. Edison eventually selected **Goldenrod** as the most suitable. Lab operated until 1936.

**Edison's Botanic Research Laboratory  
Goal: Find a US plant that could produce rubber in case of foreign shortage.**

### **Ford Home:**

**Edison's good friend Henry Ford bought the house next to Edison's in 1916. It was built 1911. Named "The Mangoes".**

**Henry Ford manufactured the first automobile that many middle-class Americans could afford, starting 1910. The car became a practical conveyance that profoundly affected 20th century society worldwide.**

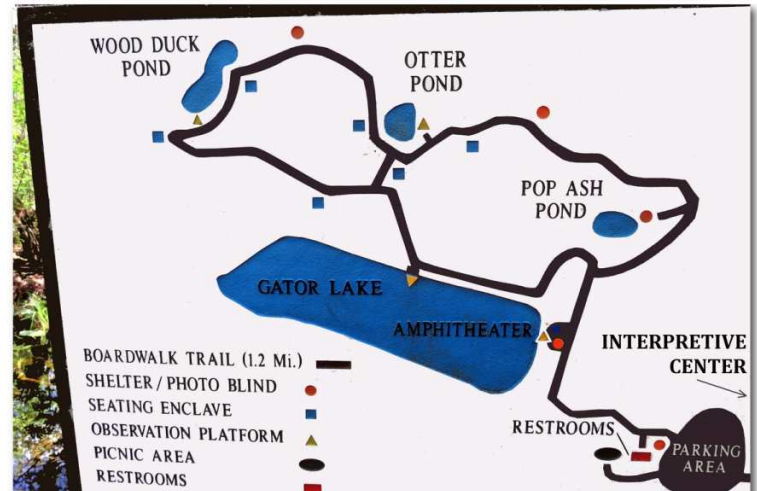

- 1.2-mile boardwalk over the water.
- Gator Lake plus three ponds.
- Four viewing platforms onto lakes.
- Many benches and shelters along the boardwalk.

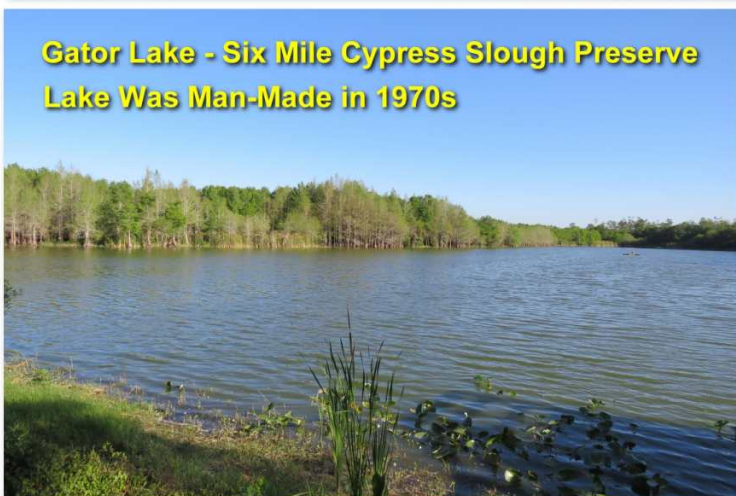

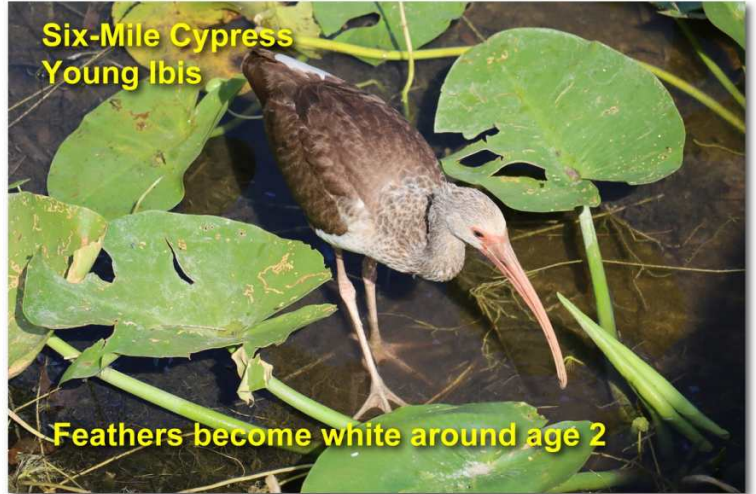

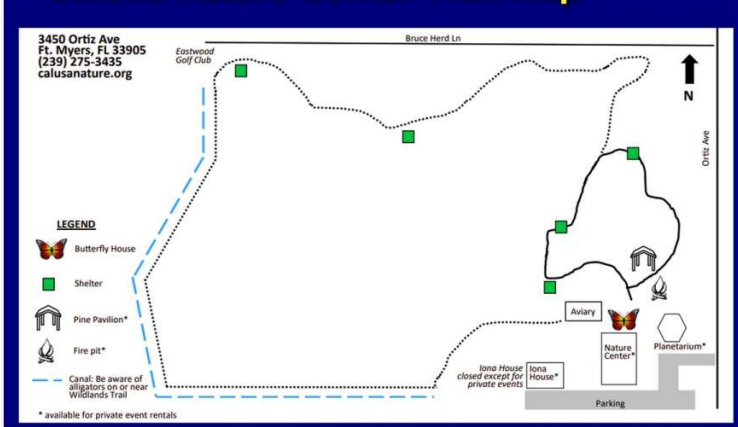

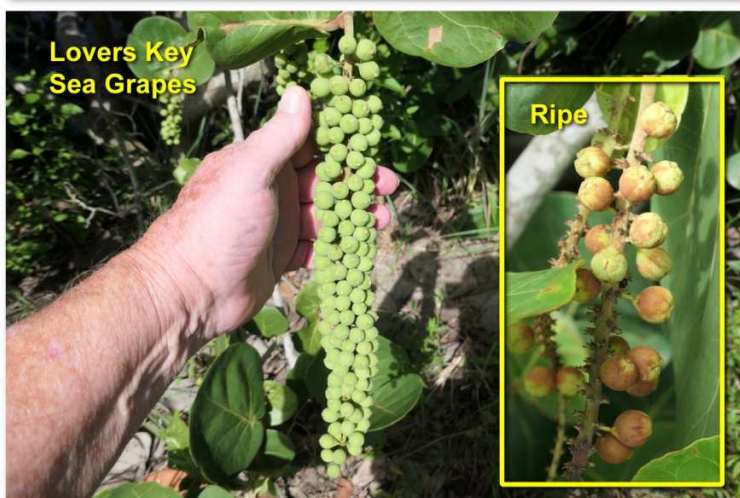
**When:** 8am to sunset, daily.

- 2.** From US 41 in Ft Myers, same road as to Sanibel, but left on San Carlos Rd and over Matanzas Pass Bridge.



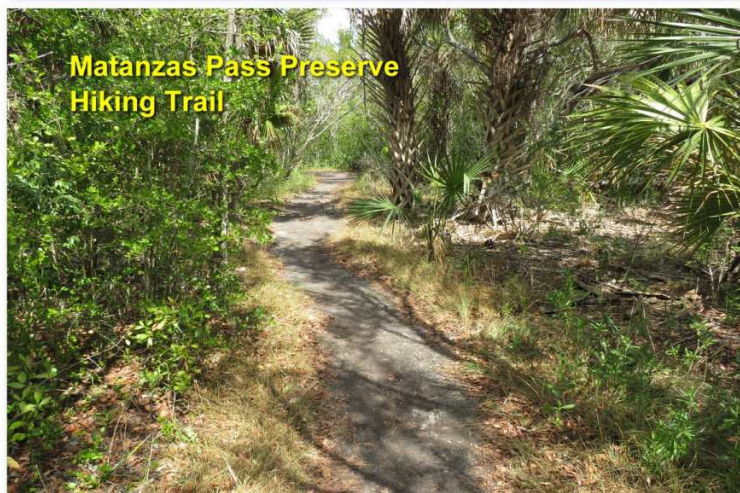

**What:** Historic house built on 2.77-acre Calusa Indian Shell Mound.

## **Calusa Indians: "The Shell Indians".**

Shore dwellers.

**Area:** Today's Charlotte, Lee, and Collier counties.

**Rough population estimate:** 10,000.

Dominated southwest Florida 500 BC to 1500 AD.

**Fierce fighters.**

**Tightly controlled society:** Consisting of commoners and nobles.

## **Calusa Indians**

**Red:** Where Calusa lived.

**Blue:** Controlled by Calusa.



**Diet:** Seafood. Did not farm.

**Ate shellfish:** Discarded shells onto mounds. Many mounds remain today.

**Forged tools and weapons from scavenged shells.**

**Mound House:** Built on a huge 2,000-year-old Calusa Indian shell mound.

## **History of Mound House:**

**1906:** One room kitchen-dining house. Settlers lived on their boat.

**1909:** Expanded house to include living room, sleeping area upstairs, porch.

**1921:** Expanded to 2,945 sq foot "mansion" with 3 bedrooms, bath, wrap-around porch, garage.

**Today house is restored to 1921 condition.**

**1970s:** In-ground swimming pool 18'x34'.

**2000:** Acquired by Town of Ft Myers Beach.

**Subsequently:** Swimming pool removed to reveal size and depth of Calusa mound.

**Visit House:** Upstairs two exhibit rooms:

1. History of Calusa Indians.
2. History of settlers on Estero Island.

**Underground:** Old swimming pool site excavated – revealing layers of shells.

1. Video narration and LED lights.
2. Huge mural: What this Calusa village may have looked like 2,000 years ago.

### Koreshan State Park

**Website:** [www.floridastateparks.org/parks-and-trails/koreshan-state-park](http://www.floridastateparks.org/parks-and-trails/koreshan-state-park)

**Where:** 3800 Corkscrew Rd., Estero FL 33928.

**Get There:** Just west of US-41 at Corkscrew Road.

**When:** Open daily. Park 8am to sunset. Historic village 8am to 5pm.

**Admission:** \$5 per car. Or annual pass.

**What:** Village was the home of a unique and eccentric pioneer group of 200 people that chose to live on the banks of the Estero River.

**In 1893, the Koreshans, a religious sect founded by Dr. Cyrus R. Teed, moved here. They built a settlement based on a commitment to communal, celibate living.**

The enterprising Koreshans established a farm, nursery and botanical gardens.

### Koreshans' Main Beliefs

- **Cellular Cosmogony (Hollow Earth Theory):** Earth is contained within a concave sphere.
- **Immortality:** People will not die. They are reborn.
- **Celibacy:** To attain immortality, abstain from any sexual conduct.
- **Collectivism:** Community ownership of all property. Work without pay.
- **Cyrus Teed as Messiah:** Teed claimed to be the 'seventh' messianic leader (Jesus was the sixth).

**Local people were unfriendly and hostile because of the Koreshans' religious, scientific and cultural beliefs. The sect did not propagate.**

Membership began to decline after Dr Teed died in 1908. In 1961, the four remaining members deeded 305 acres of their land to the State of Florida as a park and memorial.

**On National Register of Historic Places.**

Koreshan State Park has 11 immaculately restored historic buildings erected by the Koreshans between the late-19th and early-20th centuries.

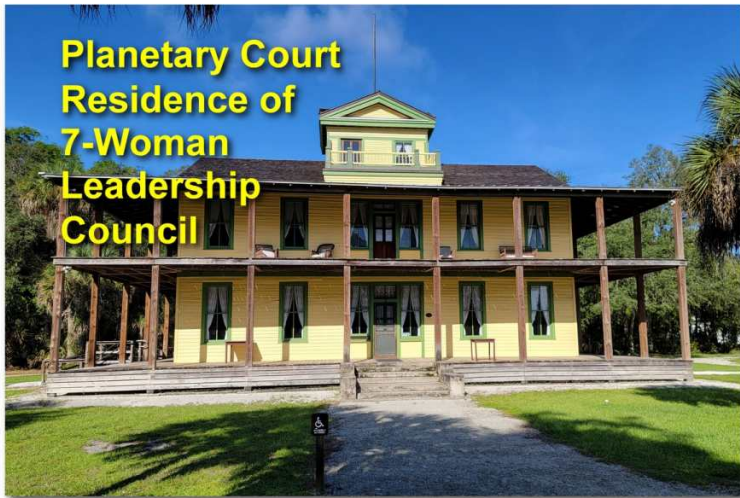

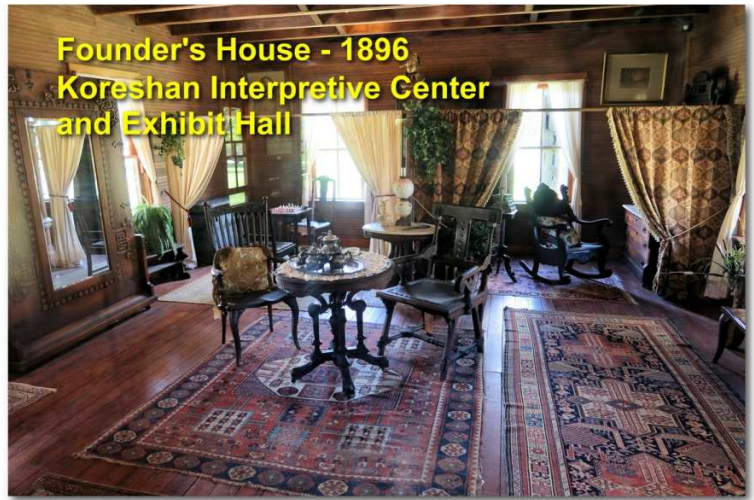

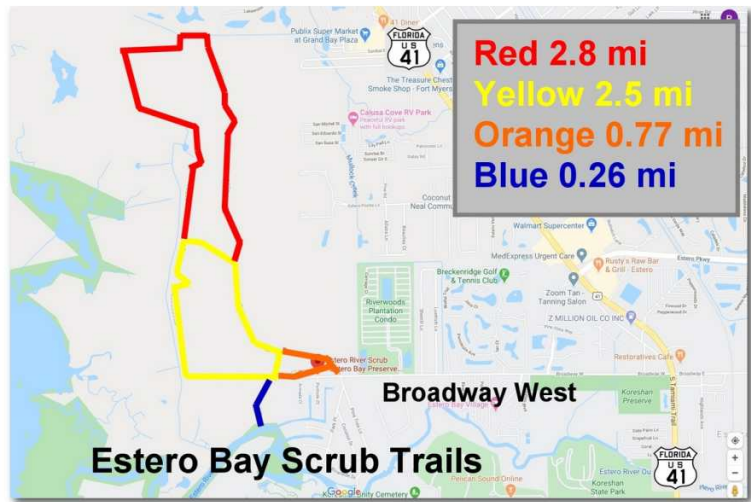

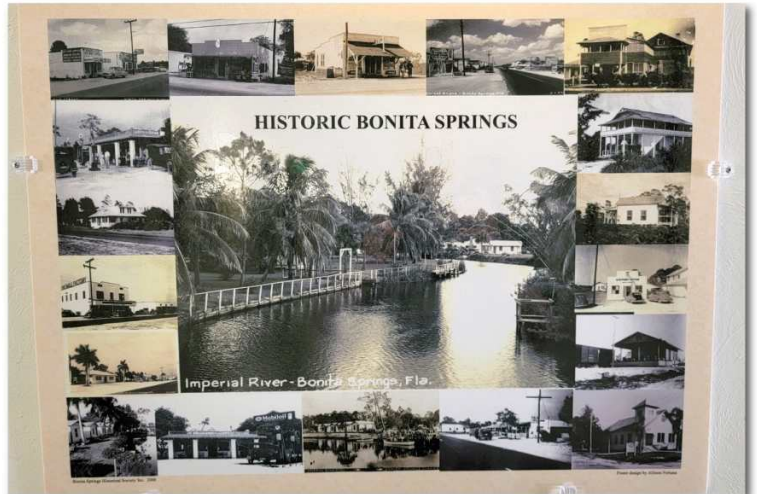
