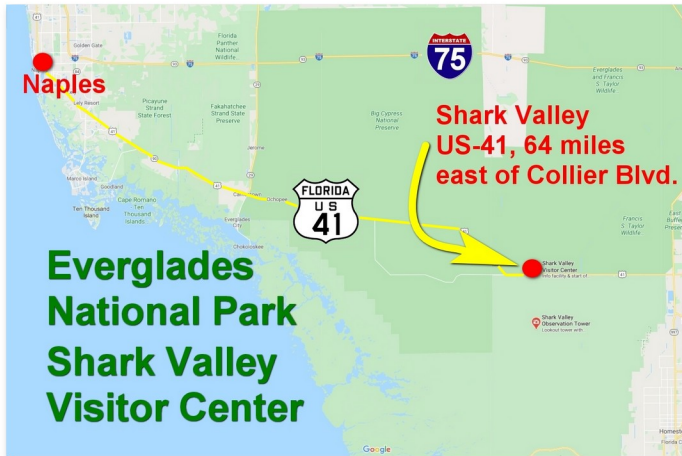




Shark Valley
 Technically Miami, but just 8 miles past the Dade County Line on US-41. A day trip from Naples.
Website:

Where: 36000 SW 8th Street, Miami, Florida 33194.
Get There: US-41 (Tamiami Trail) 70 miles east of Naples.



When: 8:30am to 5pm (visitor center opens 9am).
Admission:
 Car \$30 – good for 7 days.
 Narrated tram tour is additional \$27 per adult, \$21 per senior, \$14 per child.

Shark Valley Tram Tours: Guided two-hour narrated tram tours on a 15-mile loop trail into the "River of Grass". Half way, a 45-foot high observation deck provides panoramic views of the Everglades.
Reservations strongly recommended.
 – 8 daily tours Dec. 20 through April.
 – 4 daily tours May through Dec. 20.
Alligators, turtles, egrets, cormorants, blackbirds, herons, anhinga.
Two short walking trails. But though it's pricey, tram tours are the way to go.

You'll See Lots of These!

- Found only in southeastern USA.
- Estimated 5 million total.
- Of that, 1.25 million in Florida.
- No longer endangered.
- Live in fresh water.
- Eat fish, turtles, snakes, birds, small mammals.
- Female lays 30-50 hard-shell eggs.
- Hatch 65 days.
- Young are prey to mammals.
- Adult alligators have no prey except man.

Alligators!

Beware: Wild and Dangerous!



Alligators have been around since the age of the dinosaurs. Found only in the southeastern United States, American alligators inhabit freshwater lakes, ponds, rivers, swamps, and bayous. Occasionally you may also see their eyes, heads, or snouts protruding from the water's surface.

Alligators have several predators, most notably humans. They are also preyed upon by crocodiles, snakes, and birds. Alligators are also preyed upon by humans. Alligators are also preyed upon by humans.

Be Careful!

- Do not feed or touch alligators.
- Do not approach or attempt to touch any alligator.
- Do not approach or touch any alligator eggs.
- Do not approach or touch any alligator young.

Great Egret – Heron Family
Conservation Status: LC

Conservation Classifications

EX Extinct – No known living individuals.

EW Extinct in the wild – Known only to survive in captivity.

CR Critically endangered – Extremely high risk of extinction in the wild.

EN Endangered – High risk of extinction in the wild.

VU Vulnerable – High risk of endangerment in the wild.

NT Near threatened – Likely to become endangered soon.

LC Least concern – Lowest risk.



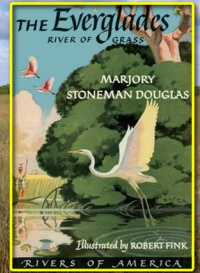
Wood Stork

North America



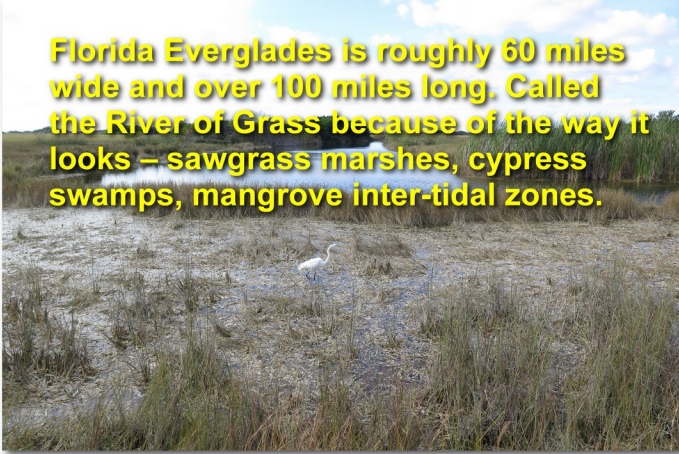
River of Grass

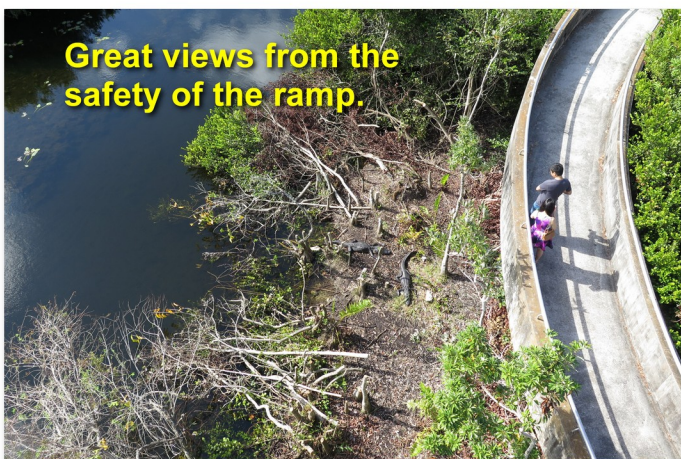
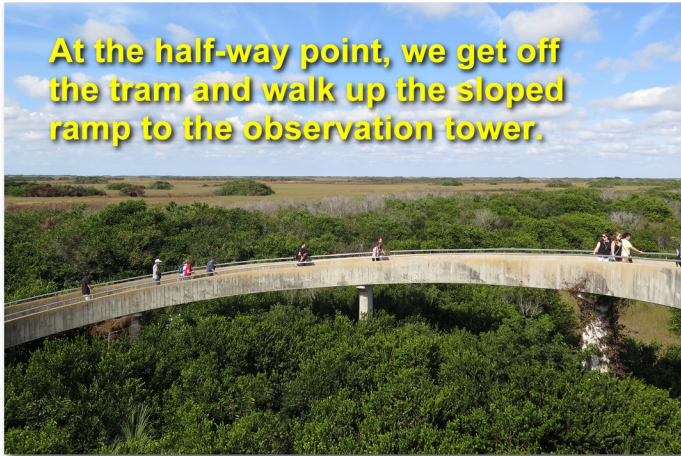


Everglades National Park

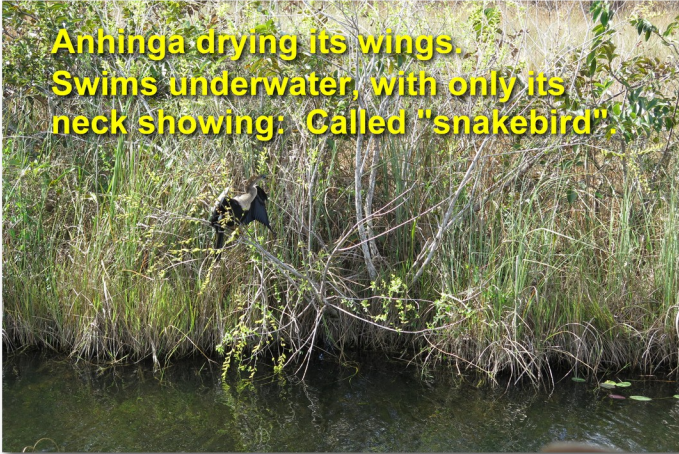




**View from the tram.
