Languages

Singapore government recognises four official languages: English, Malay, Mandarin, and Tamil.

Main language spoken at home:

English 48% 30% Mandarin Chinese Dialects 9% Malay 9% Tamil 3% Others

Schools and Univ: English dominant.

Singapore History - 1

14th c: Settled by Malay people.

1611: Portuguese invade.

1641: Dutch take control from

Portugal.

1819: British arrive, led by Sir Stamford Raffles. Dutch withdraw. Singapore population at the time 1,000 - mostly Malays.

Singapore History - 2

1820-1871: Substantial migration from China, India, Malaya. Economic boom -- shipping and trading.

1871: Singapore population 100,000 – more than half Chinese.

1867-1942: Britain converts Singapore to a separate colony called Straits Settlements.

Singapore History - 4

1948: Armed insurgencies by communists. British defend. But independence movement began, led by students and unionists.

1959: Britain grants full internal self-government. Lee Kwan Yew becomes Prime Minister. But still a colony of Britain.

Singapore History - 6

August 9, 1965: Parliament of Malaysia votes 126–0 to expel Singapore from the federation.

Same day: Parliament of Singapore creates the independent Republic of Singapore.

Since 1965: Prosperity, stability, growth.





Singapore History - 5

Early 1960s: Public sentiment for full independence from Britain.

1963: Singapore leaders decide to join British Malaya to form new independent country: "Malaysia".

1963-1965: Malaysia race riots – Malays vs Chinese. Hundreds killed and injured. Chaos. Prices skyrocket. Talks between Chinese and Malay leaders fail.




























































































































Peranakan

But, more recently (past 50 years) much more assimilation and Westernization.



































































Behind the Movement is a steering committee made up of individuals who are passionate about the English language. A secretariat supports the running of the Movement's programmes and activities.
