

Turner River Road Website: None.

Where: Ochopee, Florida.

Get There: US-41 Tamiami Trail 30 miles east of Collier Blvd (6 miles past SR-29). Turn north on Turner River Road (CR-839).

Turner River Rd then runs 21 miles due North under and just past I-75. Then you turn around and drive back to US-41.

Admission: Free.

What: 21-mile rural wildlife drive. But you only need to do a mile or two. Road is mostly sand and crushed rock. Runs alongside a canal. Canal and its banks often have alligators, birds, other wildlife. Also kayaking or canoeing. Some hiking. No not feed gators. Be very cautious getting out of your car.

At US-41 intersection is a small boardwalk and picnic area.





You can choose to park next to the boardwalk and view wildlife from there.
Or, you can venture out on Turner River Road. The road is dirt and gravel and goes over 20 miles due north, with the river (canal) on the right as you drive north.
Where the State has posed "do not feed alligators" signs are usually good viewing places. Be careful if you leave your car!

If you do decide to drive up Turner River Road to see wildlife, some tips:

- It's a dirt and gravel road. Dusty.
- River & wildlife on the right driving north.
- 2 or 3 miles is usually all you need.
- Be very careful if you get out of your car.
- Best to take photos from the car window.
- Good photo ops where you see these signs-
- Obey the sign!
