Because they have already been through a tough time before their little lives even started, we want to be sure, you are 100% ready, committed and know what you are getting into with annual vet expenses, food, litter, attention, boarding if you go on vacation, emergencies, etc. Did you know that the average emergency vet visit ranges from \$900.00 to \$5,000.00? That is a big spread! Are you financially prepared for any emergency? These are all very important questions to ask yourself.

We strongly suggest if you do not have other cats, to consider two babies, at a discount from us to you. Why?

- 1. They will help keep one another company when you are too busy to give them attention, while you are at work, or even on vacation.
- 2. They also love to play and engage with one another, groom each other and take naps together. Kittens are also very active at night, and having a playmate can help keep them entertained while you sleep.
- 3. You are a human, they are felines. Just like humans need to interact with other humans, these precious little babies also need & deserve interaction with their own species.
- 4. Kittens learn how to behave socially by interacting with other cats. They learn how to share territory, communicate their needs, and how hard to play. This can help them avoid future behavior problems like shyness, biting, and hiding. Kittens can teach each other boundaries, so you don't have to be the one telling them when their biting is too hard.
- 5. Most cats are happier living with other cats, which can make them better pets.
