This initiative would increase the minimum wage to \$15 per hour by July 1, 2027. It would also provide employees the ability to accrue a certain amount of sick leave based on how many employees the employer has.

- Increase the minimum wage to \$15 per hour by July 1, 2027
- Provides employees the ability to accrue up to 56 hours of paid sick leave per year if their employers have 15 employees or more.
- Provide employees the ability to accrue up to 40 hours of paid sick leave if their employers have under 15 employees.
- Prohibits employers taking adverse action against employees who refuse to attend employer-sponsored meetings regarding religious or political matters.

Ballot measure 2 would repeal ranked choice voting and eliminate open primaries.

What is ranked choice voting?

In Alaska, under ranked choice voting, ballots are counted in rounds: A candidate can win outright during the first round of counting if they receive more than 50% of the vote. If no one hits that threshold, the candidate with the fewest votes is eliminated. Voters who chose that candidate as their top pick have their votes count for their next choice. Rounds continue until two candidates remain, and then whoever has the most votes wins.

What is an open primary?

An open primary allows everyone to vote regardless of party affiliation. In Alaska, before 2022, political parties determined who was allowed to vote in their primary.

RANKED CHOICE VOTING

How does Ranked Choice Voting work?

In each race, voters will rank their choices in order of preference. Votes are counted in rounds.

Round One: The Division counts all 1st choices. If a candidate gets more than 50% of the vote in round one, that candidate wins and the counting stops. If not, counting goes to Round Two.

Round Two (and beyond): The candidate with the fewest votes gets eliminated. If you voted for that candidate, your vote goes to your next choice and you still have a say in who wins. If your first choice candidate was not eliminated, your vote stays with them. Votes are counted again. This keeps happening in rounds until two candidates are left and the one with the most votes wins.

How to mark your ballot?

- Vote by ranking candidates of your choice.
- Rank as many or as few candidates as you like
- Completely fill in no more than one oval for each candidate or column
- For your 1st choice, fill in the oval in the 1st choice column
- For your 2nd choice, fill in the oval in the 2nd choice column, and so on

- If you skip a ranking, your next ranking moves up. If your first choice candidate is eliminated, your third choice counts as your second choice and your fourth choice would count as your third choice.
- If you skip two or more rankings in a row, only the rankings before the skipped rankings will count. Your first choice counts and the fourth choice would not count.
- If you give more than one candidate the same ranking, those rankings and later rankings will not count. Only your first choice counts.
- Your vote only counts once, even if you rank a candidate more than once. When a candidate is eliminated in a round, they are eliminated from all future rounds.



HOW TO VOTE

VOTE IN PERSON

When entering your polling place, the election worker will ask you for a piece of identification. Any of the following documents may be used for identification:

- signed voter ID card
- driver's license
- state ID card or military ID card
- passport, hunting or fishing license
- other current or valid photo identification



You may also present one of the following forms of identification if it includes your name and current address

- current utility bill or pay check
- government check or bank statement

VOTE BY MAIL!

Any registered Alaska voter may apply for an absentee ballot and vote by mail. Mail, fax, email, or hand-deliver the completed form to the Alaska Division of Elections. Find the absentee ballot application here:

HOW TO VOTE *(Continued)*

Your absentee by-mail ballot application must be submitted by **October 26**

VOTING BY MAIL *(Continued)*

Your absentee ballot should arrive within a week. If it doesn't, contact the Alaska Division of Elections to follow up, or to resubmit your application if necessary. Once you receive the ballot, carefully read and follow the instructions.

Mail your completed ballot back to the address indicated on the return envelope.

DON'T FORGET TO:

- Add an identifier (last 4 SSN, DOB, driver license number)
- Get a witness signature
- Use proper postage or in-person drop box
- Postmark or drop off absentee ballot before Nov 5th. (The earlier, the better!)

VOTE EARLY

Beginning October 21 and continuing through election day, voters may vote early:

In person at Regional Elections Office in the jurisdiction where the voter is registered. Regional offices are located in Juneau, Anchorage, Wasilla, Fairbanks, and Nome.

Drop Box: Dropping off your absentee ballot in an **Election Drop Box** at any regional Elections Office or absentee voting location.
