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KILLED BY AN ACCIDENTAL SHOT

Sunday, November 1, 1925, John Craig of south of Lancaster, Mo. took his shotgun about 3 o'clock in the afternoon, and started out to kill some rabbits. Coming to a wire fence he attempted to climb through the fence into W. Pruner's farm. In dragging the gun after him it in some manner was discharged, the load taking effect in the vicinity of his heart, one shot passing entirely through his body, coming out at his back, and a number of other shot could plainly be felt just under the skin in the back.

His wife becoming uneasy after he had left the house, started after him and found him on the wire fence shot as stated above. He told Mo her it was purely accidental. Help S was called and he was taken to the house where he lived until 7 o'clock

Funeral services were conducted at the Germania M. E. church, by Rev. E. A. Lacour, and the body was laid to rest in the Germania cemetery.
